Ladies and Gentlemen:


Thank you for the opportunity to review the subject Recirculated Draft Environmental Impact Report/Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement. On behalf of the Santa Ysabel Band of Mission Indians, we strongly urge the California Public Utility Commission and Bureau of Land Management to eliminate from further consideration, the proposed Environmentally Superior Northern Alternative as depicted on Figure 5-1 due to opposition by the Tribe. After consultation with the Santa Ysabel Chairman, the Bureau of Indian Affairs would not approve a right of way for the implementation of this alternative route across lands held in trust for the Santa Ysabel without the consent of the tribal government.

We also note that portions of the proposed alternative routes cross several other Indian reservations under the service jurisdiction of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Southern California Agency and held in trust by the United States for the tribal beneficial owners. While these reservations are under our service jurisdiction, land use decisions of each of the potentially affected reservations are made by their respective tribal governments.

We advise the California Public Utility Commission and Bureau of Land Management to consult directly with the potentially affected tribal governments on a government to government basis to ensure that possible land use conflicts are disclosed. Should land use conflicts exist, only the tribal governments have the ability to provide a resolution. However, if a land use conflict is not resolved, the Bureau of Indian Affairs would not approve a right of way for the implementation of any of the alternative routes across lands held in trust without the consent of the affected tribal government.
