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4 PUBLIC COMMENTS

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6 JOEL ROTHSCHILD: Thank you. Good evening. Joel
7 Rothschild, again. I just want to make two brief points.

8 One is, that I think when you talk about the
9 pipeline alignment, it's not only important to show the
10 proposed route, I think it's very important that you show
11 the alternative routes that you considered and rejected,
12 for whatever reason, as well as explaining why you
13 rejected those routes.

14 The second point I'd like to make, Jessica, to
15 your criteria that's used for selecting the pipeline
16 alignment route, one of the criteria I noticed that was
17 not there was the trade-off between residential versus
18 nonresidential -- industrial transportation corridor
19 utility corridor areas. I think that that's an important
20 criteria to make because whether it's down Valencia or
21 down Harrison, I don't think that's really important.
22 What people don't want is industrial projects running
23 through residential neighborhoods; so I think that's an
24 important criteria to consider and should be factored
25 into your considerations. Thank you.

1 MIKE KOLENOOWICZ: Mike Kolenoowicz, San
2 Bernardino. Does everyone know where W Street is? It's
3 in the Muscoy area, and they had a train, a Southern
4 Pacific freight train, coming down Cajon Pass, and the
5 brakes failed, and it derailed on W Street. Well, when
6 it derailed there was a 14-inch gas line under the
7 ground. It busted that 14-inch gas line and the gas went
8 into the neighborhood. The people reported it. They
9 smelled gas in the area. Nobody came. The people
10 reported it. They smelled gas in the area. Nobody came.
11 The people reported it; gas in the area. Nobody came.
12 After 18 homes were destroyed and 8 people killed, then
13 they got a response.

14 This is a concern with the plate tectonics and
15 what might happen.

16 In Landers they had a 7.3 earthquake. The
17 land where both fault lines are, the North American plate
18 and the Pacific plate, which is what we're on, moved 30
19 feet. 100 people were injured. Three people were
20 killed. Now they're predicting a 30-foot movement up in
21 here in Cajon Pass where the San Andreas fault is and the
22 San Jacinto fault is.

23 If you would go behind the mountain, you don't
24 have to dig up the streets, you don't have to dig up
25 anything. There's no fault lines back there. The route

1 can go directly from there to San Diego without hindering
2 anyone here. You don't have to dig up streets or
3 anything to go behind the mountain. Thank you.

4 DON TEUNISSEN: Don Teunissen, I have been in
5 business here in San Bernardino for 54 years; so I've
6 been around for a lot of years.

7 In 1978 I built a car wash on Barton Road and
8 Washington Street. While I was building that, there was
9 a bulldozer a couple of blocks away making a big trench,
10 got my curiosity up so I went and asked him and said,
11 "What are you doing?"

12 He said, "I'm locating the earthquake fault."

13 He took me down into the cut-away and showed
14 me where the fault is. According to what I can -- I
15 don't have your exact plan on here, but it looks to me
16 like your pipeline is going across that, going up and
17 then coming back across it. If you built that pipeline a
18 few miles to the east of there, you're going to miss that
19 fault entirely.

20 I also have a business on Sierra Way, just 200
21 feet from where you're going to be on 40th Street, and
22 I'm concerned about the traffic over there when you
23 build.

24 DR. RALPH SENOUR: My name is Ralph Senour. I live
25 off of Valencia, and I just want to add the feature of

1 safety, which was not mentioned by the lady up above.
2 Every other thing she mentioned, but the safety with
3 the -- we have two schools that the students from there
4 go up and down Valencia twice a day, and it is a safety
5 factor.

6 DENNIS ROWE: My name is Dennis Rowe. I'm a
7 Valencia Avenue resident, and I am opposed to the
8 pipeline running through the residential and business
9 areas of San Bernardino. I think Southern California gas
10 has focused on a specific route that is cost effective
11 and expedient for them to the deference of all other
12 alternative routes.

13 PAGE MILLER: Page Miller, again. The safety
14 concern is certainly first and foremost in everyone's
15 mind. A lot of us are wondering why it couldn't have
16 gone further east of San Bernardino. To come and zigzag
17 through the city the way it's proposed -- although we
18 don't have documentation of that tonight.

19 we need to know what the route is. We need to
20 know what the pipeline can withstand. 5.8, 6.9, 7.5,
21 8.5? And where is that break going to be? You need to
22 lay those concerns. When this gentleman is talking about
23 the plate tectonics, this does not sound good. Somebody
24 needs to do some rethinking on their engineering. The
25 safety factor.

1 Also, the notification, again I know you say
2 everyone was informed. I got to tell you, neighbors were
3 not informed. They had no clue. Now I'm not going to
4 dispute it with you. We asked our neighbors. Nothing in
5 writing. Nothing came to them. So when you get your
6 route down, you need to legally let everyone know. And
7 we're not talking just one or two neighbors. We're
8 talking blocks, okay. You need to have the appearance
9 and the honesty of a transparency here. And right now
10 the way it has been conducted has not been with
11 tremendous transparency. So safety and transparency and
12 put in writing.

13 We expected a little bit more tonight in the
14 presentation. Now we don't know if it's in Harrison or
15 it's Valencia or where else it is. People, when you're
16 coming to a table on a major project like this, need a
17 few more answers.

18 How many millions of dollars is this project?

19 KATHLEEN COLEMAN: Thank you. My name is Kathleen
20 Coleman, and I'm probably in the minority here tonight,
21 and maybe not as knowledgeable as many of these good
22 citizens are.

23 I live in the Mountain Shadows area and I do
24 not recall getting notice of a meeting for Highland
25 Avenue. You mentioned it's public outreach and not a

1 formal meeting like this is tonight.

2 I do come from a background of working for the
3 gas company or So Cal Gas Company; so I will speak in
4 positive aspect that I appreciate all the public outreach
5 efforts that have been made by the gas company. I
6 appreciate that the scoping meeting is here tonight. I
7 did receive notification of that, at least two phone
8 calls and some e-mails and some mail that came to my
9 home; so I don't know if that's what was addressed for
10 Valencia or not, but I do not know. I do know I live in
11 the minority of the positive versus the negative.

12 My background with the gas company comes from
13 leakage control. My title at one time was leakage
14 control clerk, and so I have seen results of gas leaks.
15 I have seen how they are repaired. I've seen the
16 permitting process, again in a position to understand the
17 planning process and getting permits to install pipeline,
18 nothing as big as this 36-inch line. I've seen plenty of
19 our transmission lines go through because I have access
20 to seeing G.I.S. mapping of those, and I was responsible
21 for putting out information for leak survey. I do know
22 that the gas company has safety as a number one priority.
23 That's driven home to me every day I go to work.

24 So I side with the citizens who are here that,
25 yes, we do need to get better information out to us as a

1 public, and I appreciate that you put up the website
2 tonight, and I hope that we get a lot more information
3 through that website so that we can keep track of what's
4 actually being built, the changes that are made and in
5 the process. Thank you.

6 LETICIA GARCIA: Thank you. I'll just reiterate
7 what I had said before, and that is that the majority of
8 the residents, in fact, probably about 99 percent of them
9 on Valencia Avenue and surrounding areas, do not want a
10 pipeline in their front yard. So if I wanted to live
11 with a pipeline, you know, right directly in front of my
12 house, I would buy a house that had one already there. I
13 don't need a pipeline put in. So you're going to find a
14 lot of opposition to this particular stretch of the
15 pipeline project.

16 VALERIE LICHTMAN: At the previous meeting you held
17 in Highland, which was an unusual place to have it since
18 the pipeline wasn't going to go through there, a comment
19 was made by the gas company representative that the
20 ultimate decision for where this pipeline would go would
21 be with the public utilities commission.

22 Now, recently the state public utilities
23 commission has been in the news. In fact, the Sun, our
24 local newspaper here, had a big article on Brown's veto
25 and reform measures for the commission because apparently

1 the commission has always been in bed with the utilities
2 that it is supposed to be overseeing. And this morning's
3 public radio station had a comment about the vice
4 president of the Southern California Gas Company and a
5 member of the public utilities commission, I think the
6 assistant chair, met somewhere in Europe to discuss
7 things, which was totally illegal. So my only concern is
8 when the comment is made while the public utilities
9 commission will have the final say, that's not an
10 independent viewpoint as was promoted by the gas company.

11 TIM PRINCE: Good evening, again. My name is Tim
12 Prince. I was raised on Valencia Avenue, and I currently
13 own three properties on Valencia Avenue. I have walked
14 Valencia Avenue, literally, more than 500,000 times.
15 Thousands of those times was as a child walking to
16 Parkside Elementary and Golden Valley Middle School which
17 are a mile from where I live. Your route is right on
18 Valencia right over this proposed pipeline.

19 I am not unique. There are hundreds and
20 thousands through the years of school children that take
21 that same route. Beyond that, there are families that
22 live in the neighborhood that use Valencia for exercise,
23 for family time, to enjoy the peace, trusting the safety
24 of the area, probably the most important thing I'd like
25 to say is, that Valencia is one of the safest

1 neighborhoods in San Bernardino, one of the most historic
2 neighborhoods in San Bernardino.

3 You have chosen -- you called it Valencia
4 Street because you're not familiar with it. You don't
5 know that when you buy a house or want to evaluate a
6 house, that you don't even go on the other side of
7 Waterman or the other side of Harrison, because we're
8 called the north end neighborhood association, and the
9 values of the homes and all the features for the homes
10 are unique in that neighborhood. You've chosen the worst
11 possible neighborhood in San Bernardino. The safety of
12 our children, the safety of our families -- people from
13 all over town drive to Valencia Avenue San Bernardino
14 area to exercise and enjoy the environment. You talk
15 about sensitivities. This is the worst possible
16 neighborhood in the whole area, San Bernardino Valley, in
17 terms of sensitivities.

18 Halloween is coming up in just a few weeks.
19 There are going to be literally hundreds of children that
20 are driven to the Valencia Avenue neighborhood to
21 trick-or-treat. People seek this neighborhood out.

22 A comment was mentioned earlier that San
23 Bernardino is in bankruptcy. We are a struggling city.
24 We are a city that is already under a lot of pressure.
25 To take a project like this and disrupt a neighborhood

1 that's fighting to preserve its character, its property
2 values, I can't imagine a worst choice, a more
3 irresponsible choice.

4 I've put my contact information out to the gas
5 company on numerous occasions. I've written them
6 communications. Not one person has taken up my polite
7 invitation to acquaint them with the neighborhood, to
8 walk them through the neighborhood, to make them consider
9 these features. The only conclusion is that the gas
10 company does not care about Valencia Avenue and the city
11 of San Bernardino.

12 Please locate your pipeline on an industrial
13 corridor or a nonresidential area, certainly not on
14 Valencia Avenue. Thank you.

15 JIM MULVIHILL: I'm also disappointed with your
16 choice of alignment.

17 San Bernardino, of all the cities that you go
18 through, is affected with the greatest degree. Your
19 alignment you say -- well, my opinion, it's near
20 solution. It's probably the quickest and cheapest and it
21 doesn't regard secondary impacts on social economic
22 characteristics.

23 The alignment, as I mentioned before, on the
24 original proponent's environmental assessment, on page
25 3-17, the original alignment did go down Harrison and not

1 go down Valencia Avenue. That question has been brought
2 up at one of our meetings, I think over at Jersey's on
3 Kendall Drive. The answer was given that they found a
4 fault along the Harrison Wash. Well, the point is why
5 should that bother you. I mean, you're crossing the San
6 Andreas fault, Reche Canyon, crossing the San Jacinto
7 fault. Also as you go down Kendall Drive you're crossing
8 a fault on the Shandin Hills, at Jenkins Hills, at
9 University and Kendall also. Why should the one on
10 Harris -- you don't even know if it's active or not. We
11 do know that the San Jacinto and San Andreas are active
12 faults. So the point is, there's options that you can
13 make besides going down Valencia, which is one of the
14 most nicest residential streets in the city and
15 definitely doesn't deserve this.

16 My second point is, you've also chosen to go
17 through one of the -- our busiest commercial districts
18 along Tippecanoe and Hospitality Lane. Your construction
19 shown is going to be 50 feet wide, according to your
20 documentation, and that should pretty much wipe out most
21 of Tippecanoe. So I guess my basic point is that you
22 haven't chosen an alignment that really minimizes the
23 impact on the residents whatsoever or upon the economy of
24 the city. And as you go on to Reche Canyon Road, I'm not
25 quite sure if you realize just how busy that is, and how

1 much an impact -- I hope that the people in Moreno
2 Valley, when you get there, will talk about the fact that
3 they get to the 10 by going over Reche Canyon. Again, 50
4 feet of Reche Canyon Road, even if you allow one lane --
5 I mean, it's a parking lot on a regular day. There was a
6 fireman killed and his son injured because of a rear-end
7 collision along Reche Canyon Road just recently. Thank
8 you.

9 DAMON ALEXANDER: I'd like to agree with also
10 everything that's been said here today.

11 Off of Valencia is not an option.

12 I deal with risk management, and just offer a
13 question. Do you guys have a risk management report of
14 what you did? Because obviously going down Valencia and
15 going down Harrison, if something should happen, if an
16 earthquake should occur, and if an explosion should
17 happen, going down Harrison is much to mitigate an
18 explosion than going down a residential street. Going
19 down any residential street where residents reside with a
20 pipeline is not good risk management. You should always
21 go by non or industrial streets when putting down
22 pipelines.

23 Second, who has the final say? I mean, I see
24 this e-mail up here. If we want to say "no," who do we
25 go to say "no" to? The public utilities commission? You

1 guys? It's a quandary. Thank you.

2 DR. PAMELA MILLER: I'm Dr. Pam Miller, and I also
3 was born and raised in this area and have a business in
4 this area, and I think that we covered an awful lot of
5 issues this evening. The biggest issue that I noticed is
6 that -- I happen to be on Valencia as well, and I was
7 born and raised there, but the biggest issue is the
8 notification of individuals who are going to be affected.

9 I know for a fact that a significant number of
10 individuals who live on Valencia were not noticed about
11 this particular meeting. It behooves this group of
12 individuals to be more open and transparent about what
13 you're doing. It's very difficult to find information,
14 and we get varying degrees of information and pieces --
15 bits and pieces of information. So as you proceed along
16 this pathway, which has good and bad about it, a lot of
17 bad, a little bit of good, personal opinion, but please
18 be a lot more transparent and make sure that you notice
19 the people who are going to be affected.

20 SCOTT LISK: Again, good evening. My name is Scott
21 Lisk. I live in Reche Canyon. To the lady that
22 mentioned how much are you guys charging or how much is
23 this project going to cost us, I guess you didn't read
24 the first paragraph of the introduction. They've applied
25 for authority to recover revenue requirements in consumer

1 rates, and for approval of related costs allocated and
2 rate design proposals. So we're going to pay for it
3 whatever it is. I don't know if that's statewide or just
4 people that are affected here tonight.

5 I want to say that I'm against any route that
6 goes through any residential area. There's plenty of
7 industrial. I probably don't even need the mic. There's
8 plenty of industrial corridors, routes that you can take,
9 but you need to coordinate once again with any master
10 plan, road alignments.

11 I specifically think you should not run any
12 gas pipeline through Reche Canyon or through the San
13 Bernardino residential area everybody's been talking
14 about tonight. You guys have so many other choices. You
15 need to think about what's best for the people. Thank
16 you.

17 SCOTT BEARD: I have to tell you how I found out
18 about this pipeline was the gas company illegally
19 surveyed my back yard. They didn't bother to knock on
20 our door. They just sent a crew out in back. Our
21 gardener was home and notified my wife there were some
22 strange people in the back yard. We asked them what the
23 hell they were doing out there, and they said, "Oh, we're
24 supposed to be out here. We're the gas surveyors."

25 I never got a notice. I never got asked.

1 when I called a representative from the gas
2 company, twice I left a message and I never got a return
3 phone call.

4 Here we are today. You have voiced, I have
5 voiced my concerns about the alignment coming down
6 Valencia Avenue, the alignment coming down 40th. We have
7 major freeway corridors coming down the Cajon Pass and
8 going to Moreno Valley. It's not the most direct route,
9 but it certainly is the safest route.

10 The disruption of these neighborhoods along
11 north San Bernardino is absolutely visible and shows how
12 the gas company has a lack of concern for our citizens.
13 I question whether or not they actually met with the
14 city.

15 I talked to public works months ago. They
16 didn't even know what we were talking about.

17 So I agree with most of the folks here,
18 transparency on the part of the gas company has been
19 terrible. We've never been noticed. Thanks to Tim
20 Prince we were aware of tonight's meeting.

21 Social media in our neighborhood is getting
22 pretty ramped up on this issue. We're not happy about
23 what I can see, and I think many residents of San
24 Bernardino can see is a gas -- major gas pipeline running
25 through our city at a time when we're struggling for

1 survival and the gas company not giving crap about our
2 citizens. Thank you.

DAVID GROUGER: I already asked a question. I just asked about the pipe.

DEBORAH PEREZ: My name is Deborah Perez. I wish you good luck. I'm retired Edison, and they had a terrible time getting things set up for Chino Hills, and they've been told now they have to go underground, and that just changes the whole complexity of the original thing; so I wish you good luck.

Solar is not the answer for everybody. My bill is about \$400 a year without solar, and I'm not spending the money for solar. It's just not worth it. And with San Onofre shutting down, yeah, we need gas in southern California. I want my heater on all winter. Thank you.

SHAWN BUTTERS: My name is Shawn Butters. I'm a homeowner in the area, and my comment would be that I would hope that the analysis that you do would reflect any changes that you may see on the land values in the area.

And then also I would like to have you address

1 what the Victorville valley will get out of this.
2 Basically, we're just kind of a conduit for the gas. I
3 don't really see us benefiting anything else other than,
4 you know, being just that, you know, being the land here,
5 having the pipeline run through it. That's about it.

6 ROBERT KULASXA: Robert Kulasxa. I didn't fill one
7 out. When you started off in the beginning, you talked
8 about the two different lines coming in. And this line
9 here seems like a safety factor for all of us when the
10 two are connected. When this one doesn't have enough,
11 more comes down and we've got it, and it balances out,
12 thus allowing us to have the benefits of having natural
13 gas. And when I saw that -- you answered most of my
14 questions in your introduction; so I appreciate that.
15 Thank you.

16 TOM SALAZAR: My name is Tom Salazar and I'd like to
17 know will this project obstruct traffic on the 15?

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4 PUBLIC COMMENTS

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6 RAFAEL BRUGUERAS: I'm used to being in front of the
7 council standing up. Some of us do know each other.

8 Ralph Brugueras. Once again, I'm a resident
9 of Moreno Valley. I've been here for 22 years, and I do
10 support the project, okay, because I'm kind of -- like I
11 mentioned earlier, if we do nothing, the rest of the
12 south side will have a difficult time of getting gas,
13 okay, at a low cost. I mean, I know that we can hire 500
14 trucks from Blythe and ship it over. I mean, you know,
15 we'll have more trucks on the road, but the project, the
16 way you mentioned it, is supposed to be efficient
17 financially and energy and more technology, because you
18 have technology on your side to ensure us that this
19 project is going to be safe, okay.

20 And what I like about hearing and watching
21 what happened today is we have the environmental team
22 here that I want to also go out and survey to make sure
23 that everything that Southern Cal is going to propose is
24 going to be done correctly, and that's what makes me
25 support you now.

1 what I hope that when they come up with their
2 report that we, the customers, the residents of
3 California, get an opportunity to hear that report,
4 because that's very important to us to make sure that we
5 all are following the guidelines.

6 Because I got a letter or I got an e-mail from
7 the Sierra Club, okay, that's what brought me here. And
8 I'm glad I got it because it opened up my interest to
9 what's going on in the city. And there are concerned
10 customers that don't want the project to go through their
11 neighborhoods. So what I would like Southern Cal to make
12 sure whatever route you pick is the best route that's
13 efficient.

14 I know that we're going to have customers that
15 don't want anything going through their neighborhood, but
16 I'm asking those customers not to be selfish with the
17 project either, because it's not just benefiting
18 themselves getting gas, but there's others that need gas
19 on the south side also. Okay.

20 So I wait for the report. I wait to see what
21 happens, but I do support what's going on because I know
22 San Bernardino County and Riverside County and all the
23 cities can profit from the revenue and everything that's
24 coming to us here.

25 Thank you.

1 SEAN FORTINE: My name is Sean Fortine, and I'm also
2 a resident of Moreno Valley, and you've done a pretty
3 good job of addressing my concerns about gas off and
4 malfunctions, and admittedly the gas company does have a
5 good record with past disasters, but with running along
6 the fault lines, my concern is that there's a lot of
7 places for it to break down in multiple spots as compared
8 to using the existing system where it's running
9 perpendicular to the fault line. There's only like a
10 couple of spots that would break and need to be repaired.

11 So my concern is that there is considerations
12 in place to make sure that there wouldn't be a massive
13 disruption in services, especially if you're going to use
14 the system to run power plants, and just make sure that
15 everything -- make sure that everything would be able to
16 keep on running within like a day or two of a
17 hundred-year disaster. Thank you.

18 DAVID SERRANO: You answered my questions, but one
19 of the, just the last thing. I just wondered when you're
20 going to have a more specific map of the route through
21 Moreno Valley so it shows streets and it's more, you
22 know, easier to see where the route goes?

23 NANCY ALGUIRE: My name is Nancy Alguire. My
24 question is, why go through housing areas where people
25 live when you could possibly go from Needles or somewhere

1 between Needles and Adelanto, straight across the desert
2 where there's nobody living? It would be a straight shot
3 other than having to look out for the turtles, the desert
4 tortoises out there. I think it would be a better idea.

5 SEAN FORTINE: My name is Sean Fortine. And I also
6 thought if maybe there's a possibility that if there's
7 problems with the system that what about using regular
8 lines to mitigate some problems if there's problems with
9 the pipeline.

10 MARGIE BREITKREUZ: Margie Breitkreuz, my one -- I
11 wonder if you've addressed the concern of the flooding
12 through Reche Canyon and Moreno Beach. I have pictures
13 that show during El Niño the level of flooding that
14 occurred then, and there's a lot of independent grading
15 that goes on on Reche Canyon at that time that I could
16 see being a possible hazard. And I have watched people
17 that have been putting up homesteads in that area that
18 have graded hills, which I doubt that they filed permits,
19 and that would be a real concern and danger.

20 And then also, have you taken into
21 consideration the build-out of the area in which you are
22 putting the pipelines?
