O R D E R

Application in the above entitled proceeding having been filed with the Railroad Commission, asking for an order of the Commission authorizing the sale by Lonny E. Dean and Gertrude Dean, owners of a small telephone line extending through a portion of El Dorado County, in the vicinity of Aukum, and a portion of Amador County lying south of Aukum and easterly of Shenandoah Valley, to Lafe Harris and Annie Harris, for the sum of \$200.00, said telephone line being described as follows:

- 131 - 12 ft. round spruce poles
- 176 - 10 ft. round pine poles
- 176 - 6 ft. split cedar rails
- 35 - miles #12 galvanized iron wire
- 8 - subscribers telephone sets
- 1 - extension bell
- 3 - #60 A - W. E. Protectors
- 3 - Single throw, double pole, knife switches and miscellaneous appurtenances.

and it appearing to the Commission that this is not a matter requiring a public hearing and that the application should be granted.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that Lonny E. Dean and Gertrude Dean be, and they are, hereby authorized to sell and transfer to Lafe Harris and Annie Harris, the telephone line and appurtenances hereinabove described for the sum of \$200.00, and

IT IS HEREBY FURTHER ORDERED that Lafe Harris and Annie Harris be, and they are, hereby authorized to purchase and acquire the same; provided, that applicants, within thirty (30) days of the date of this Order shall file with the Railroad Commission a certified copy of a bill of sale or other instrument of conveyance by which the property herein authorized to be purchased and acquired is sold and transferred to Lafe Harris and Annie Harris.
