ORDER OR DISHISSAL

Luke Peak has petitioned the Mailroad Commission for an order declaring that public convenience and necessity require the operation by him of an auto trucking service in an area covering a large part of the San Josquin Valley, and between valley points and other parts of the state.

A public hearing was conducted by Examiner Austin at Fresho and the matter temporarily removed from the calendar following a decision (No.15818) by the Railroad Commission in the matter of the application of Ben Moore for a certificate of public convenience and necessity, in which decision the Commission held that it had no certificating jurisdiction over any suto transpor-

tation service other than a service between fixed points or over a regular route.

Theodore M. Stuart, Attorney for the applicant herein, after having been granted an extension of time to enable him to determine whether he would amend the application herein so as to propose a service between fixed points or over a regular route, requested the Railroad Commission under date of April 28, 1926, to dismiss said application without prejudice.
