OPINION

San Rafael Freight & Transfer Company applies for authority to extend its existing rights as a water carrier between San Francisco and Sausalito, Belvedere, California City and San Rafael, to include a new point knownas Marin Meadows, and to establish rates to such points.

A public hearing herein was conducted by Examiner Williams at San Francisco.

A. H. Marx, President of applicant company, testified that the service to be established to Marin Meadows is to make available for the United States Army water transportation from San Francisco, of construction material and supplies. The exact landing to be served by applicant is not clearly designated, but it will be a point on the tidewater slough entering Marin Meadows at a point between San Rafael and Novato. It is the purpose of the applicant to use whatever landing the United States Army selects, and this selection will depend upon future survey by the Army.

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Lieutenant Colonel Gerald C. Brant of the United States Army Air Corps, testified that the United States Government now owns 1100 acres in Marin Meadows, and an appropriation is pending before Congress of five million dollars which is to be used in the establishment of a bombing base. This amount is to be expended for construction of barracks for five squadrons! headquarters, officers' quarters, storehouses, shops, etc. and the complete establishment will contain a population of approximately 1500 army men. He further testified that the Covernment has made arrangements with the Northwestern Pacific Railroad to build a spur to the establishment and to erect a depot, and has also made arrangements for truck transportation. The Army also requires water transportation, largely to avoid the necessity of careful packing of many commodities required in rail or truck transportation.

applicant proposes a rate of 25¢, first class; 21¢ second class; $17\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ third class, and $14\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ fourth class. The new point to be established is approximately five miles north of San Rafael and the rates proposed are in excess of the rates now charged to San Rafael, which are 25¢, 20¢, 15¢ and 7¢. The higher rate is justified by applicant on the ground of the sparsity of business, but applicant indicated its intention to adjust the rates downward at any time the volume justifies.

The application was not protested, and it appears from the record that permission sought should be granted. An order will be entered accordingly.

ORDER

A public hearing having been held in the above-entitled proceeding, the same having been duly submitted, and now being ready for decision.

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THE RAILROAD COMMISSION OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA HEREBY DECLARES that public convenience and necessity require the operation by San Rafael Freight and Transfer Company of its vessels for the transportation of property for compensation between all points now served by it on the one hand, and Marin Meadows on the other; and

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that a certificate of public convenience and necessity therefor be, and the same hereby is granted to SAN RAFAEL FREIGHT AND TRANSFER COMPANY, subject to the following conditions:

Applicant shall file acceptance of the certificate herein granted within a period of not to exceed ten (10) days from date hereof, and shall file tariff of rates, according to the rules of this Commission, setting forth the rates stated in this application, which said rates are to be supplementary to its rates as now filed in its local freight tariff No. 3-B, C.R.C. No. 5.

Applicant shall stipulate in its acceptance that this certificate is an extension and enlargement of its present operating rights, and is not a new or separate certificated right.
