THIRD SUPPLEMENTAL ORDER

In its Decision No. 23182, dated December 15, 1930, this Commission granted to Harold G. Laub a preliminary certificate declaring that public convenience and necessity require and will require the construction by applicant of a gas plant and system in Victorville for the distribution and sale of liquefied natural gas and the exercise by applicant of the rights and privileges granted under Ordinance No. 336 of the County of San Bernardino, in so far as such exercise is necessary for the construction of this specific project, and authorizing the construction of such plant and system, all subject to certain conditions, among which is the following:

- (5) That Harold G. Laub shall, on or before March 1, 1931, begin the service of gas covered by this order.

The Commission, by its Decision No. 23417, dated February 16, 1931, extended to April 1, 1931, the date upon which the applicant, Harold G. Laub, was required to begin service covered

by the application.

Applicant herein having again, on March 19, 1931, requested the Commission for a further extension of time of thirty (30) days of the limit of time mentioned in the Commission's Decision No. 23417, dated February 16, 1931, within which to comply with Condition (5) of Decision No. 23182, and it appearing to the Commission that this request is reasonable and should be granted, therefore

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that the time of compliance with Condition (5) of Decision No. 23182, of December 15, 1930, and contained in the above opinion, be and it is hereby extended to May 1, 1931.

In all other respects this Commission's Decision No. 23182, of December 15, 1930, in this matter shall remain in full force and effect.
