BY THE COMMISSION:

ORDER

Southern Pacific Company, a corporation, on September 8th, 1931, applied for authority to abandon its agency at Bayshore Station in the City and County of San Francisco, State of California.

Applicant alleges that the passenger revenues at said station are principally derived from the sale of commutation tickets which can be accured at other agencies of applicant; that the billing for carload and L.C.L. freight shipments from and to said station is now handled through petitioner's freight office at Fourth and Berry Streets, San Francisco, and can be so handled in the future; that the abandonment of said agency will not involve the abandonment of any facilities; that the station will be continued as a non-agency station; and that the continued maintenance of the agency is not necessary for the business of the applicant or for the public.

It appearing that a public hearing is not necessary herein and that the application should be granted,

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that Southern Pacific Company is

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hereby authorized to abandon its agency at the station of Bayshore in the City and County of San Francisco, upon ten (10) days
notice to the public by posting a notice in said station, and to
change its station records and tariffs accordingly, provided
that said station be continued as a non-agency station.

Applicant shall, within thirty (30) days thereafter, notify this Commission, in writing, of the abandonment of the facilities authorized herein and of its compliance with the conditions hereof.

The authorization herein granted shall lapse and become void if not exercised within one (1) year from the date hereof unless further time is granted by subsequent order.

The authority herein granted shall become effective on the date hereof.
