BY THE COMMISSION:

OBINION

In this proceeding Etna Development Company, an incorporated public utility, asks for an order of the Commission authorizing an increase in the rates charged for water supplied its consumers in Etna, Siskiyou County, and vicinity. The application as filed alleges in effect that the rates at present charged were established by this Commission in its Decision No.7663 in Application No.4517, and that the revenue derived therefrom has been non-compensatory and is inadequate to return to applicant the necessary and reasonable annual charges on the system.

A public hearing was held in this proceeding before Examiner Satterwhite at Etna on November 9, 1922.

At the hearing applicant amended its application to correct certain mis-statements which had inadvertently been made therein.

These occur particularly in Paragraphs 5, 6, 8 and 9 of the ap-

plication and refer to the present rates in effect as being those fixed in this Commission's Decision No.7663 in Application No. 4517. The application was amended to read to the effect that the rates at present being charged are those established in Decision No.2789, rendered September 30, 1915, in Application No.1868. Applicant admitted that the increased rate schedule in said Decision No.7663, while authorized to become effective by the Commission's supplemental Decision No.10691, had not been accepted or put into effect.

As stated above, this applicant furnishes water service in and in the vicinity of the city of Etna, and reference is made to the above mentioned decisions for the history and description of the system. The evidence shows that the average number of consumers on the system so far in 1922 has been 132, but that during the past few years there has been some decrease in the number of consumers served and in the quantity of water used.

A field investigation was recently made by Mr. H. A. Noble, one of this Commission's hydraulic engineers, and his report compiled from the data obtained was submitted at the hearing. Included therein is an appraisal, as of November 1, 1922, showing the total estimated original investment in used and useful property to be \$25,385, and the 6% sinking fund replacement annuity as \$388. The Commission established a rate base of \$22,251, as of June 7, 1920, in its Decision No.7663. The estimate presented by Mr. Noble was obtained by adjusting the previous rate base for retirements and additions in the system since June 7, 1920, as shown by the records of the company. No other appraisal was submitted in this proceeding.

In the matter of the expense necessary for maintaining and operating this system, Mr. Noble presented an estimate based upon the cost of these items in the past. This estimate allows for a reasonable sum to cover unusual and extraordinary expenses

not recurring at regular intervals, and assumes that careful but reasonable economies will be effected in the conduct of the affairs of this applicant which have not at all times been practiced in the past. The Commission is of the opinion, after considering all the evidence submitted on the subject, that the estimate presented by Mr. Noble is ample, and will therefore include the sum of \$1,850 in the annual charges as the fair cost of operation and maintenance.

Based upon the foregoing, the annual charges to which this applicant is properly entitled are as follows:

The revenues reported by this utility have been as follows: In 1919, \$2,901.94; in 1920, \$3,671.25; in 1921, \$3,077.97.

From the above showing it appears that the Etna Development Company is entitled to an increased annual revenue from its water operations. The schedule of rates set out in the following order is designed to produce the amount of the above annual charges and at the same time more equitably distribute the charges among the various classes of consumers than did the rate schedule heretofore in effect.

ORDER

Etna Development Company having applied to this Commission for an order authorizing it to increase the rates charged for water service, a public hearing having been held and the matter being submitted for decision,

It Is Hereby Found as a Fact that the present rates of the Etna Development Company in so far as they differ from the rates herein set out, are unjust and unreasonable, and that the rates

herein established are just and reasonable rates to be charged by said company for the service of water to its consumers.

And basing its order on the foregoing finding of fact and the further statements of fact contained in the opinion preceding this order.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that Etna Development Company be and it is hereby authorized and directed to file with this Commission within twenty (20) days from the date of this order, the following schedule of rates, said rates to be charged for all service rendered subsequent to December 31, 1922:
