Decision No. 1297

In the matter of the application of Southern Pacific Company for permission to construct a spur track at grade across "I" Street and Kern Street, in the town of Mojave, Kern County, California.

Application No. 346.

ORDER

By the Commission.

Southern Pacific Company, a corporation, having on December 31st, 1912, filed with the Commission an application for permission to construct a spur track at grade across "I" Street and Kern Street in the town of Mojave, Kern County, California, as hereinafter indicated; and it appears appearing to the Commission that this is not a case in which a hearing is necessary; that it is not reasonable nor practicable to avoid grade crossings with said streets; and that the application should be granted subject to the conditions hereinafter specified.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that permission be hereby granted the Southern Pacific Company to construct a spur track at grade across "I" Street and Kern Street, town of Mojave, Kern County, California, as shown by the map attached to the application, subject to the following conditions, viz:

(1) The entire expense of constructing said crossings together with the cost of their maintenance hereafter in good and first class condition for the safe and convenient use of the public shall be borne by the applicant.

(2) Said crossings shall be constructed at a width sufficient to accommodate the road traffic, in no case less than twenty-four (24) feet, with grades of approach not exceeding six (6) per cent, and shall be ballasted with suitable sand or gravel ballast.

(3) The Commission reserves the right to make such further orders relative to the location, construction, operation, maintenance and protection of said crossings as to it may seem right and proper, and to revoke its permission, if, in its judgment, the public convenience and necessity demands such action.
