

OBINION

Madera Gas Company alleges that it is forced to meet increased costs of production and distribution of gas due to recent advances in the costs of oil and labor, and asks the Rail-road Commission to so fix the rates and charges for gas to its consumers that it may hereafter earn a reasonable return upon its capital invested. A public hearing was held in Madera on April 27, 1920, and the matter thereupon submitted.

Applicant is engaged in the manufacture and production of gas in the City of Madera, County of Madera, California, and is supplying about 485 consumers, the total annual sales for 1919 being 12,042,000 cu.ft. The present rates were established by Decision No. 5596 of the Railroad Commission dated July 17, 1918 and provide the following schedule of charges:

The Annual Report of this utility shows that for the year 1919 its net return was but slightly in excess of 1.0% upon its investment. Since the fixing of the present rates applicant has been obliged to pay a continually increasing amount for wages and has recently been subjected to an additional price for oil of 25 cents per barrel. The Commission's engineers estimate that these increases, together with a reasonable allowance for return, will result in an added cost of \$0.325 per thousand cubic feet of gas sold during 1920.

The following statistics show briefly the operations of Madera Gas Company for the year 1919:

A valuation of applicant's gas properties was made by the Commission's engineering department in December, 1916. The historical reproduction cost with additions and betterments to date, and estimated to June 30, 1920, is as follows:

Investigations made by this Commission and evidence presented at the hearing, disclose that Madera Gas Company's operations are unduly burdened by excessive overhead charges to superintendence and general expenses. It is believed that a utility as small as the applicant's should conduct its business upon a more economical basis, combining the duties of the manager and superintendent. This has been considered in the expenses allowed for 1920 operations, and the present basis of charges for production, distribution and general expenses have been reduced to eliminate certain overhead charges which are not considered proper. The annuity for depreciation has been calculated at the rate of 3% upon depreciable property, as contrasted with applicant's allowance of 5% for the past year. The following tabulation shows the reasonable cost of service for 1920:

The rates hereinafter established should yield applicant sufficient revenue to meet the increased costs of oil, labor, materials and other proper operating expenses, and if its affairs are economically managed will permit a reasonable return upon the established valuation of its properties. Based on the foregoing I recommend the following form of Order:

ORDER

Madera Gas Company having applied to the Railroad Commission for authority to increase its rates for gas, a hearing having been held and the matter submitted and being now ready for decision, the Railroad Commission of the State of California hereby finds as a fact that the present rates and charges for gas of Madera Gas Company are not just and reasonable rates, in so far as they do not adequately compensate it to the extent of earning proper operating expenses and a fair return upon the reasonable valuation of its properties.

Based on the foregoing findings of fact and upon the other findings of fact contained in the Opinion which precedes this Order.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that Madera Gas Company be and is hereby authorized to charge and collect the following schedule of rates for gas, which rates shall be applicable to all regular meter readings taken on and after the 20th day of May, 1920, towit:

The net rate is effective if the bill is paid on or before the 12th day of the month next succeeding that for which the bill is rendered; otherwise, the gross rate is effective.

PROVIDED, Madera Gas Company shall within ten days of the date of this order file with the Railroad Commission the schedule of rates herein established.

The foregoing Opinion and Order are hereby approved and ordered filed as the Opinion and Order of the Railroad Commission of the State of California.
