OPINION

Turlock Gas Company alleges that it is obliged to pay an increased price for oil of twenty-five cents per barrel, and that this and increased wages paid to its employees has created a financial burden upon the company which is more than it can carry under the present rates charged for gas; it therefore prays that the Railroad Commission investigate its operations and establish such rates for gas service as shall be found just and reasonable. A public hearing was held in Turlock on April 28, 1920, and the matter thereupon submitted.

Applicant is engaged in the manufacture and distribution of gas in the City of Turlock, County of Stanislaus, California, and is providing service to about 740 consumers. Its sales for the year 1919 amounted to 15,626,000 cubic feet, yielding a revenue of \$26,331. The operating expenses totaled \$22,660, leaving a balance of \$3,670, corresponding to a return of 5.67%

upon the investment in the properties. The rates now charged were established by this Commission's Decision No. 5709 dated August 26, 1918, whereby the following schedule was made effective:

Investigation shows that applicant's affairs have been managed with great economy and that the operation of its gas generating plant is reasonably efficient. Since the establishment of the above schedule of rates it has been compelled to pay an additional price of 25 cents per barrel for oil, as well as very material increases in its payroll. These increased costs alone will result in an increase of 18.2 cents per thousand cubic feet of gas sold, and an increase of 20 cents per thousand when proper allowance is made for fair return upon invested capital.

The following statistics summarize briefly the operations of Turlock Gas Company for the year 1919:

The valuation of applicant's properties, shown by its Annual Reports to this Commission, and which are in accord with the figures used in its previous rate proceedings, indicate a valuation of:

At the hearing herein a protest was filed against an increase in gas rates, and it was alleged that the gas service was not satisfactory. Several consumers testified on the ser-

vice rendered by applicant, and it appears that some appliance troubles have resulted from dust and other impurities carried by the gas. Applicant will be expected to take such measures as may be necessary to remedy this condition by installing filters or improving the purifying processes at its plant.

The rates hereinafter established should yield applicant sufficient revenue to meet its increased operating expenses and to earn for it a reasonable return upon the valuation of its properties.

<u>O R D E R</u>

Turlock Gas Company having applied to the Bailroad Commission for authority to increase its rates for gas, a hearing having been held and the matter submitted and being now ready for decision, the Bailroad Commission of the State of California hereby finds as a fact that the present rates and charges for gas of Turlock Gas Company are not just and reasonable rates, in so far as they do not adequately compensate it to the extent of earning proper operating expenses and a fair return upon the reasonable valuation of its properties.

Based on the foregoing findings of fact and upon other findings of fact contained in the Opinion which precedes this Order:

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that Turlock Gas Company be and is hereby authorized to charge and collect the following rates for gas, which rates shall be applicable to all regular meter readings taken on and after the 20th day of May, 1920, to-wit:

The net rate is effective if the bill is paid at the office of the company on or before the tenth day of the month next succeeding that for which the bill is rendered. If the bill is not paid on or before this date the gross rate is effective.

PROVIDED, Turlock Gas Company shall within ten days of the date of this Order file with the Railroad Commission the schedule of rates herein established.

The foregoing Opinion and Order are hereby approved and ordered filed as the Opinion and Order of the Railroad Commission of the State of California.
