unincorporated and therefore the consent of the municipality is not
necessary; and it further appearing that it is not reasonable nor
convenient to avoid a grade crossing with said Cedar Street, and that
the application should be granted subject to the conditions hereinafter
specified,

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that permission be hereby granted Southern
PACIFIC COMPANY to construct a side track at grade across Cedar Street
in the Town of Bloomington, San Bernardino County, California, on the
main line, to serve as an interchange track with
the San Bernardino Railway Company and the Crescent City Railway Company's
yard, as shown by the map attached to the appli-
cation, subject to the following conditions, viz.:

SOUTHERN PACIFIC COMPANY, a corporation, having
on August 12, 1913, filed with the Commission an application for
permission to construct a side track at grade across Cedar Street,
Town of Bloomington, San Bernardino County, California, as hereinafter
indicated, and it appearing to the Commission that this is not a case
in which a public hearing is necessary, that said town of Bloomington
is unincorporated and therefore the consent of the municipality is not
necessary; and it further appearing that it is not reasonable nor
practicable to avoid a grade crossing with said Cedar Street, and that
the application should be granted subject to the conditions hereinafter
specified,

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that permission be hereby granted Southern
Pacific Company to construct a side track at grade across Cedar Street
in the town of Bloomington, San Bernardino County, California, on the
south side of its main line, to serve as an interchange track with
Pacific Electric Railway Company and the Crescent City Railway Company's
proposed interchange yard, as shown by the map attached to the appli-
cation and subject to the following conditions, viz.:

- (1) The entire expense of constructing the crossing together
with the cost of its maintenance hereafter in good and first-class
condition for the safe and convenient use of the public shall be
borne by applicant.

(2) Applicant shall provide the necessary plank or guard rails for the construction of said crossing, and shall construct same of a width not less than twenty-four (24) feet, with grades of approach not exceeding six (6) per cent. Said crossing shall be ballasted with first-class stone or gravel ballast to a depth of not less than six (6) inches.

(3) The Commission reserves the right to make such further orders relative to the location, construction, operation, maintenance and protection of said crossing as to it may seem right and proper, and to revoke its permission if, in its judgment, the public convenience and necessity demand such action.
