THE DACINIC MMEPEONE AND TETEGRAPE COMPAKY asks the
Railroad Commission to declare that public convenience and necessity require the exercise by applicant of the rights and privileges onfired upon it by Ordinance No. $188 \mathrm{~N} . S$. finally adopted on November 20, 1920, by the $01 \pm 7$ Council of tie City of Modesto.

A copy of the ordinance has been fled in this proceeding and is marked applicants Exhibit "B". In general, the ordinance Granted to The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company its successors and assigns, ₹ or a term of five years, gives applicant the right and privilege to do a general telephone and telegraph business within the City of Modesto and to construct, maintain and operate the necessary telephone and telegraph lines and facilities, all subject to the conditions of the ordinance.

Among other things, the ordinance requires applicant, Its successors and assigns to pay during the life of the franchiae, to the City of Modesto, 2 per cent of the grose anmosi recelpts ariaing from the ase, operation and possession of the franchise and privileges, inciading thet portion of the long distance basiness oredited to the oxchange of the City of Modesto. The City of Modesto is also to have the use, Without charge, of certain specipiod facilities for polfoe and fire alarm porpobes.

Applicant reports that it paid $\$ 800.00$ for the franchise and privileges covered by ordinsuce 1 HO . $188 \mathrm{~N} . \mathrm{S}$. to the City of Modesto, that no other pablic utility is engaged in the telephone and telegraph
 its telephone service in Modesto.

I herewith submit the following form of order.

## ORDER.

THE PACIFIC TELEPEONE AN TETEGRAPH CONPANI having asked the Railroad Commission to deciare that pablic convenience and necessity require appificant to exercise the rights and privileges granted to it by the City of Kodesto maer Oránance No. 188 NaS . finelly passed Novemider 10, 1920, a public hearing having been held and it appearing to the Roilyoan Commission that priblic convenience and necessity rogrire the constraction, operation and maintenance of the telephone plant and system referred to fr said orainance and that there aro no pablic atilities of a like character at present operating within the territory involved in this proceeding;

The foregoing Opinion and Order are hereby approved and ordered filed as the Opinion and Order of the railroad Commission of the state of Confifornia.
