SUPPLEMENTAL OPINION AND ORDER

A. V. Sullivan is engaged in the decomposed granite business. His production facilities are situated in Montebello and near Whittier. Neither of them are within the boundaries of the production areas set forth in City Carriers' Tariff No. 6 -Highway Carriers' Tariff No. 7 (Appendix "A" to Decision No. 32566, as amended, in these proceedings). This tariff names minimum rates, rules and regulations for the transportation of specified materials, including decomposed granite, in dump trucks. Thereunder, zone rates apply to transportation between defined production areas and delivery zones, and mileage rates apply to transportation from, to or between other southern California points.

Sullivan and California Dump Truck Owners Association urge that the boundary of "Los Angeles County Production Area L" be extended so as to include the Montebello facilities and that a new

production area be established and rates provided for transportation from the plant in the vicinity of Whittier.

A public hearing was had at Los Angeles on September 23, 1947, before Examiner Mulgrew.

Sullivan testified that he marketed his granite in competition with other producers whose facilities are located within existing production areas, that the mileage rates applicable from his plants are generally higher than the zone rates available to his competitors for comparable service, and that as a result of this rate situation he is seriously handicapped in selling his material.

With respect to the Montebello plant, Sullivan said that it was within 4 blocks of the southwest boundary of "Production Area L" and closer to the principal markets for the decomposed granite produced in the Montebello area than his competitors' facilities in that area.

The secretary of California Dump Truck Owners Association claimed, and Sullivan agreed, that "Production Area L" is already too large and should, when the necessary facts are developed, be subdivided. Meanwhile, they said, Sullivan's facilities should be included in the existing production area.

In regard to the Whittier plant, Sullivan and the carrier association asked that zone rates be established for transportation from this plant to the various delivery zones on the same basis as zone rates for transportation from other production areas. In recognition of the fact that information relating to running times is necessary for such a determination, they submitted a running-time study similar to those presented at previous hearings involving zoning arrangements and rates for southern California generally.

The proposed adjustments were not opposed.

By Decision No. 40475 of June 28, 1947, "Production Area

L" was enlarged to include the pit of Monterey Granite Company on a showing essentially similar to that here made with respect to Sullivan's Montebello facilities. In that decision it was held that "the property on which petitioner's facilities are situated is adjacent to the existing production area and that petitioner is disadvantaged because its competitors enjoy zone rates while it does not." For like reasons, the proposed further extension of this production area will be established. As stated in Decision No. 40475, a request for subdivision of the area will be entertained when and if any interested party advises the Commission that full information relating thereto is available and will be supplied.

It is also evident that petitioner Sullivan is disadvantaged in operating his facilities near Whittier because zone rates are not available for transportation from that plant but are available for transportation from competitors' plants. Zone rates will, therefore, be established as requested. These rates will be determined in the same manner as the revised rates prescribed by Decision No. 40724 of September 16, 1947, and will be made effective on the same date.

Therefore, good cause appearing,

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that City Carriers' Tariff No. 6 - Highway Carriers' Tariff No. 7 (Appendix "A" to Decision No. 32566, as amended) be and it is hereby further amended by incorporating therein, to become effective November 1, 1947, Fourth Revised Page 21-F cancels Third Revised Page 21-F and Second Revised Page 21-F, and Original Page 36-A-A, which pages are attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof.

IT IS HEREBY FURTHER ORDERED that in all other respects Decision No. 32566, as amended, shall remain in full force and effect.

This order shall become effective twenty (20) days from the date hereof.
