THIRD SUPPLEMENTAL OPINION AND ORDER

Prior orders in this proceeding have authorized applicants to transport flour in truckload lots within the City of San Diego at rates which are less than the minimum rates otherwise applicable. The authority is scheduled to expire October 29, 1949. Permission thereafter to continue to observe the present rates for a one-year period is now sought.

The verified supplemental application shows that operations under the authorized rates have been profitable during the past year; that, except for wage increases granted to drivers, the services are performed under substantially the same conditions as those which prevailed a year ago; and that economies resulting from improved operating procedures have offset the higher wage costs. It also shows that D. J. Glardon has acquired Floyd A. Greene's interest in the business.

Under the circumstances it appears that operations under the existing rates may reasonably be expected to be profitable during the ensuing year, and that the sought authority should be granted to Glardon. A public hearing is not necessary.

Therefore, good cause appearing,

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that Decision No. 39572 of October 24, 1946, in this proceeding, be and it is hereby amended by substituting in the ordering paragraph thereof "D. J. Glardon" for "Floyd A. Greene and D. J. Glardon, copartners," and that as so amended the expiration of the authority therein granted be and it is hereby extended to October 29, 1950.

This order shall become effective twenty (20) days after the date hereof.
