OPINION AND ORDER ON REHEARING

Upon petition of A. Schilling and Company, Division of McCormick & Company, Inc., and based on the record made at a public hearing thereon, certain reductions in the San Francisco drayage rates for coffee, extracts and spices were ordered by Decision No. 46060 of August 7, 1951, in this proceeding. The Draymen's Association of San Francisco, which had opposed the reductions, thereupon sought and was granted a rehearing. By Decision No. 46114 of August 20, 1951, the rates involved were suspended until further order of the Commission.

Rehearing was held at San Francisco on November 1, 1951, before Examiner Mulgrew.

The suspended rates are set forth in Items Nos. 410-E, 415 and 417 of City Carriers' Tariff No. 1-A. Item No. 410 series covers "inhaul" traffic (freight originating beyond San Francisco and received by the drayman from another carrier)<sup>1</sup>. Item No. 410-D which is now in effect provides a special inhaul rate for green coffee, ground mustard and pepper. The change ordered therein by Decision No. 46060 is the enlargement of the item to cover various

designated spices. This revision would result in a substantially lower inhaul rate for these articles.

At the rehearing, counsel for the Draymen's Association stated that a further study had been made of the traffic and the rates therefor. He said that as a result of this study the draymen now recognized that the transportation characteristics of the spices involved were not too dissimilar from the characteristics of the commodities now enjoying the special inhaul rate. The draymen, therefore, withdrew their protest against the enlargement of Item No. 410-D proposed by Schilling and ordered by Decision No. 46060.

Schilling, at the rehearing, modified its petition so as to limit it to the above-discussed inhaul rate adjustment. Formerly, it had also requested adjustment of other rates for roasted coffee, extracts and spices. Decision No. 46060 had ordered certain new rates on these commodities. They were set forth in Items Nos. 415 and 417 of the tariff. Schilling's traffic manager stated that, upon further consideration and in recognition of the drayage rate levels for other similar articles and traffic, petitioner does not desire at this time that these rate adjustments be made.

In the light of the foregoing developments, it appears that the establishment of the reduced rates on spices named in suspended Item No. 410-E of the tariff should be reaffirmed; and that the rates on roasted coffee, extracts and spices named in suspended Items Nos. 415 and 417 should be canceled. The order which follows will so provide.

Therefore, good cause appearing,

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that City Carriers' Tariff No. 1-A (Appendix "A" to Decision No. 41363 as amended) be and it is hereby
