SUPPLEMENTAL OPINION

By petition, Pillsbury Mills, Inc. seeks the establishment of reduced minimum rates for the transportation of prepared edible flour.

A public hearing was held at San Francisco on June 6, 1952, before Examiner Mulgrew.

Highway Carriers' Tariff No. 2 names state-wide minimum class and commodity rates established by the Commission for the transportation of general commodities by common and highway carriers. Commodity rates are provided for grain, grain products and related articles and for food preparations as described and listed in the tariff. These rates are lower than the class rates which would otherwise apply. The rates for grain and grain products are applicable to prepared edible flour when ingredients other than flour do not exceed 40 percent of the mixture. Neither these rates nor the somewhat higher commodity rates for food preparations are applicable to edible flour when other ingredients of the mixture exceed 40 percent.

Petitioner proposes that prepared edible flour with more than 40 percent but not more than 75 percent of other ingredients be accorded the same commodity rates as the articles now listed as "food preparations" in Tariff No. 2. Its traffic manager testified that the types of prepared edible flour with which it is here concerned are the so-called "ready mixes," chiefly cake, pie crust and hot roll mixes. These and similar products, he said, are relatively new and their use replaces the older method of mixing flour and other required ingredients by the housewife or baker. According to the traffic manager, ready mixes are now sold in a substantial volume. In a recent tenmonth period, he said, petitioner delivered in California more than 5,000,000 pounds of its cake mixes, one of the more popular types of edible flour mix products. All of petitioner's ready mixes are distributed to California points directly from its plant in Los Angeles or from warehouses in that city and in San Francisco, Sacramento, Fresno and San Diego. The services of rail and highway carriers are used in making this distribution.

The traffic manager, referring particularly to less-truck-load and less-carload rates, pointed out that the transportation of ready mixes is subject to 4th class rates, while the transportation of edible flour with lesser percentages of other ingredients and of various cereal food preparations is subject to lower commodity rates. He also pointed out that petitioner is not seeking rate equality with the prepared edible flour with lower percentages of other ingredients than the ready mixes, but rate parity with the food preparations. A rate study he made indicated, he said, that the rates for the food preparations are around 11 percent higher than the rates on grain and grain products, including edible flour with less than 40 percent of other ingredients.

The cereals which are listed in the "food preparations" tariff description, he testified, are in transportation parlance described as "light and bulky" articles. Using corn flakes as an illustration, he showed that a package weighing eight ounces has a displacement of 152 cubic inches. He contrasted this with a package of cake mix weighing 17 ounces but having a displacement of only 46 cubic inches. Thus, he said, while the corn flakes package weighs less than one-half of the cake mix package, it is some three and onehalf times more bulky. With respect to relative values, he testified that the sales price of these packages was 15 cents (30 cents per pound) for the corn flakes and 36 cents (34 cents per pound) for the cake mix. Shipping containers for these products, the traffic manager said, contain two dozen packages. He said further that a shipping container of ready mixes has much more stability and compactness than a container of the bulkier cereals and is therefore less liable to damage in transit. These circumstances, he asserted, are reflected in his company's claim records which show practically no damage involved in the distribution of the ready mixes. He expressed the opinion that carrier costs are lower on compact commodities such as the mixes than on lighter and more bulky articles like corn flakes and other such food preparations.

A representative of Merchants Express Corporation stated that his company agreed that the rates in question should be adjusted as petitioner requests and for the reasons advanced in support of the proposed adjustment.

No other appearances were entered. The customary notice of hearing was given shippers, carriers and other interested parties.

Upon consideration of all the facts and circumstances of record we are of the opinion and hereby find that prepared edible

flour of the type herein involved has been shown to possess transportation characteristics justifying its being grouped with the cereal food preparations in the minimum rate tariff. The petition will accordingly be granted.

ORDER

Based on the evidence of record and on the conclusions and findings set forth in the preceding opinion,

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that Highway Carriers' Tariff No. 2 (Appendix "D" to Decision No. 31606 as amended) be and it is hereby further amended by incorporating therein, to become effective August 4, 1952, the revised pages attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof, which pages are numbered as follows:

IT IS HEREBY FURTHER ORDERED that tariff publications of Common carrier respondents filed pursuant to this order may be made effective not earlier than August 4, 1952, and on not less than five (5) days' notice to the Commission and to the public; and that said respondents be and they are hereby authorized to depart from the provisions of Article XII, Section 21, of the Constitution of the State of California and from the provisions of Section 24(a) of the Public Utilities Act to the extent necessary to exercise the authority granted herein.

In all other respects said Decision No. 31606, as amended, shall remain in full force and effect.

This order shall become effective twenty (20) days after the date hereof.
