Joint Application of DONALD C. WHITE, holder of a certificate of public convenience and necessity to store cotton and cotton linters in bales, and UNITED CALIFORNIA EXPRESS & STORAGE CO., a California corporation, doing business as U. C. EXPRESS & STORAGE CO., for authority to transfer said certificate to United California Express & Storage Co., pursuant to Section 1052 of the Public Utilities Code.

<u>OPINION</u>

In this joint application the Commission is asked to authorize Donald C. White, doing business as White Portable Compress Company, to transfer his certificate of public convenience and necessity to store and handle cotton and cotton linters in bales to applicant United California Express & Storage Co. The application declares that the business now being conducted pursuant to this warehouse pertificate consists of storage and handling of cotton and cotton linters in bales, sampling, weighing, delivery of uncompressed cotton, compressing of cotton, and other extra services that customers request. Said business has recently been carried on at Warehouse H. Port of Oakland, Oakland. This warehouse building is constructed of reinforced concrete, contains approximately 120,000 square feet of storage space, and is near transportation facilities such as docks and a spur track. It also possesses an adequate sprinkler system. It was leased by applicant White's father, Cecil F. White, from the Port of Oakland, and has been subleased by said Cecil F. White to applicant United California Express & Storage Co. Equipment used in the warehouse business and owned by said Cecil F. White has also been leased to applicant United California Express & Storage Co.

California pursuant to the provisions of the Public Utilities Code as well as a certificate of public convenience and necessity issued by the Interstate Commerce Commission. This applicant maintains warehouses in Cakland and Berkeley. These warehouses are used primarily for the storage of household goods and personal effects but as an incidental activity the applicant stores some general commodities at the Berkeley warehouse.

United California Express & Storage Co. appears to be

United California Express & Storage Co. appears to be financially capable of assuming the responsibilities of warehouse operation; it is familiar with the storage business and has experienced personnel who can handle operations in accordance with the requirements of the certificate. Pursuant to the Commission's order in Decision No. 55262 dated July 15, 1957, in Application 39203, it purchased the Berkeley warehouse referred to for \$110,000.00, paying \$10,000.00 down and issuing a promissory note secured by a first deed of trust for the balance.

Upon review of this application we are of the opinion, and so find, that the transfer will not be adverse to the public interest and that a public hearing is not necessary. It appears that there will be no change in the service to the public and that the purchaser is in a position to assume the public utility obligations. The application will be granted.

The action taken herein shall not be construed to be a finding of the value of the properties herein authorized to be transferred.

Failure to file such reports, in such form and at such time as the Commission may direct, or to comply with and observe the provisions of said general orders, may result in a cancellation of the operating authority, the transfer of which is permitted by this decision.
