O R D E R

The City of Stockton is authorized to construct Harding Way at separated grades under the tracks of Southern Pacific Company and The Western Pacific Railroad Company in the City of Stockton, San Joaquin County, at the location and substantially as shown by Exhibits A to E, inclusive attached to the application, to be identified as Crossings Nos D-92.0-B and 4-94.7-B, respectively. Construction and maintenance expense shall be borne in accordance with an agreement to be entered into between the parties relative thereto, and copy of said agreement, together with plans of said crossing approved by the Southern Pacific Company and The Western Pacific Railroad Company, shall be filed with the Commission within 180 days from the date hereof. Should the parties fail to agree, the Commission will apportion the cost of construction and maintenance by further order. Clearances shall conform to the provisions of General Order 26-D.

Upon completion of the underpass, Crossings Nos. D-92.0 and 4-94.7, Harding Way crossings at grade, shall be abandoned and closed to public use.

Within thirty days after completion pursuant to this order applicant shall so advise the Commission in writing. This authorization shall expire if not exercised within two years unless

time be extended or if conditions are not complied with. The effective date of this order shall be twenty days after the date hereof.
