<u>OPINION</u>

A public hearing of the above matter was held on February 17, 1959, at San Francisco, before Examiner Thomas E. Daly.

The record discloses that prior to October 31, 1957, complainant and her husband were subscribers and users of telephone services furnished by defendant under telephone number VAlencia 4-3229, at 405 Clipper Street, San Francisco, California; that on or about said date and as a result of a joint raid by representatives of the San Francisco Police Department and the United States Treasury Department, Internal Revenue Service, complainant's husband was placed under arrest for alleged bookmaking activities; that upon the receipt of letters from the Chief of Police of San Francisco and the United States Treasury Department, Internal Revenue Service, defendant discontinued complainant's telephone service; that by Decision No. 57722, dated December 16, 1958, the Commission ordered temporary restoration of service; and that complainant, who was not implicated

in any unlawful use of said telephone facilities, has separated from her husband and now resides at said premises with her eighteen-year-old daughter.

After consideration, the Commission is of the opinion and finds that the evidence does not show that complainant used the telephone facilities for an unlawful purpose. The Commission also finds that the defendant telephone company's action in discontinuing said telephone service was based upon reasonable cause as that term is used in Decision No. 41415.

ORDER

A complaint having been filed and the Commission being informed in the premises,

IT IS ORDERED that the order of the Commission in Decision No. 57722, dated December 16, 1958, temporarily restoring telephone service to the complainant, be made permanent, such restoration being subject to all duly authorized rules and regulations of the telephone company and to the existing applicable law.

The effective date of this order shall be twenty days after the date hereof.
