BEFORE THE PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA

In the Matter of the Application of GEORGE C. OERTLY and JOHN W. OERTLY, dba OERTLY BROS. TRUCKING CO., for an extension of their present certificate of public convenience and necessity to operate an automobile truck service as a highway common carrier for the transportation of certain commodities between points in Southern California, and for authority to transport general commodities, with certain exceptions, from points in Orange County, to Bakersfield and Salinas and points north thereof, on the other hand.

$\underline{O P I N I O N}$

George C. Oertly and John W. Oertly, doing business as Oertly Bros. Trucking Co., are engaged in the transportation of property by motor vehicle as a common carrier in California pursuant to Decision No. 56890, dated June 24, 1958, in Application No. 36388.

They seek an extension of this certificate so as to permit the transportation of general commodities, with certain exceptions, from all points and places in Orange County, California, to points in Northern California, including the San Francisco and Sacramento territories and an area along U. S. Highway 99 as far south as Bakersfield and off-route points. They also seek authority to serve ·A. 41954 - 1

an area in Southern California between Santa Ana, on the one hand, and, on the other, the Los Angeles Basin territory and San Diego territory and also between the Los Angeles territory and the San Francisco territory.

A public hearing was held in this matter on May 18, 1960, at Santa Ana, before Examiner Grant E. Syphers, at which time evidence was adduced and the matter submitted. It now is ready for decision.

Upon consideration of all of the evidence presented in this matter we now find that public convenience and necessity require that the application be granted as set forth in the ensuing order. It appears that applicants possess the experience, equipment, personnel, and financial resources to institute and maintain the operation authorized herein.

There was no opposition to this application.

The ensuing order will provide for an in lieu certificate incorporating all of applicants' operating authority.

Applicants are hereby placed on notice that operative rights, as such, do not constitute a class of property which may be capitalized or used as an element of value in rate fixing for any amount of money in excess of that originally paid to the State as the consideration for the grant of such rights. Aside from their purely permissive aspect, such rights extend to the holder a full or partial monopoly of a class of business over a particular route. This monopoly feature may be modified or canceled at any time by the State, which is not in any respect limited to the number of rights which may be given. • A. 41954 - 🗩/ds 🐰

ORDER

Application as above entitled having been filed, a public hearing having been held, the Commission being fully advised in the premises and having made the foregoing findings,

IT IS ORDERED:

(1)That a certificate of public convenience and necessity is granted to George C. Oertly and John W. Oertly, authorizing them to operate as a highway common carrier as defined by Section 213 of the Public Utilities Code for the transportation of property between the points and over the routes as more particularly set forth in Appendices A, B, C, D, E and F attached hereto and made a part hercof.

(2) That, in providing service pursuant to the certificate herein granted, applicants shall comply with and observe the following service regulations:

- Within thirty days after the effective date hereof, applicants shall file a written acceptance of the certificate herein granted. By accepting the certificate of public conven-(a)ience and necessity herein granted, applicants are placed on notice that they will be required, among other things, to file annual reports of their operations and to comply with and observe the safety rules and other regulations of the Commission's General Order No. 99. Failure to file such reports, in such form and at such time as the Commission may direct, or to comply with and observe the provisions of General Order No. 99, may result in a cancellation of the operating authority granted by this decision.
- **(b)** Within sixty days after the effective date hereof, and on not less than ten days' notice to the Commission and the public, applicants shall establish the service herein authorized and file in triplicate, and concurrently make effective, tariffs satisfactory to the Commission.

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(3) That the operating authority granted by Decision No. 56890, dated June 24, 1958, in Application No. 36388, is hereby canceled, said cancellation to become effective concurrently with the effective date of the tariff filings required by Paragraph 2(b) above.

The effective date of this order shall be ninety days after the date hereof.

- (2) Bakersfield and points in the Sacramento Area as described in Appendix E attached hereto.
- (3) Santa Rosa, Gilroy, Salinas, Manteca, Tracy, Byron and Porterville.
- (4) All points on U.S. Highway No. 99 between Zakersfield and Sacramento.
- (5) All points on U.S. Highway No. 40 between Sacramento and San Francisco Territory as described in Appendix D attached hereto.
- (6) All points on U.S. Highway No. 101 between Gilroy and San Francisco Territory as described in Appendix D attached hereto, and between said Territory and Santa Rosa.
- (7) All points on State Highway No. 152 between Califa and Gilroy.
- (8) All points on U.S. Highway No. 50 between Manteca and San Francisco Territory as described in Appendix D attached hereto, and on the unnumbered county road between Tracy and Byron.
- (9) All points on State Highway No. 4 between Stockton and San Francisco Territory as described in Appendix D attached hereto.

- D. Applicant shall not transport any shipments of:
 - Used household goods and personal effects not packed in accordance with the crated property requirements set forth in paragraph (d) of Item No. 10-C of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 4-A.
 - Automobiles, trucks and buses, viz.: new and used, finished or unfinished passenger automobiles (including jeeps), ambulances, hearses and taxis; freight automobiles, automobile chassis, trucks, truck chassis, truck trailers, trucks and trailers combined, buses and bus chassis.
 - Livestock, viz.: bucks, bulls, calves, cattle, cows, dairy cattle, ewes, goats, hogs, horses, kids, lambs, oxen, pigs, sheep, sheep camp outfits, sows, steers, stags or swine.
 - 4. Liquids, compressed gases, commodities in semiplastic form and commodities in suspension in liquids in bulk, in tank trucks, tank trailers, tank semitrailers or a combination of such highway vehicles.
 - 5. Commodities when transported in bulk in dump trucks or in hopper-type trucks.
 - 6. Commodities when transported in motor vehicles equipped for mechanical mixing in transit.
 - 7. Logs.


