# CRICINAL

BEFORE THE PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA

In the Matter of the Application of JAKE STOKES and JOHNSON McMURPHY, partners doing business as SWANSON'S TRUCKING SERVICE for permission to remove restrictions and for an expansion and reinstatement of its Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity to operate as a Highway Common Carrier.

Application No. 41977

### OPINION

Jake Stokes and John McMurphy, doing business as Swanson's Trucking Service and presently rendering service as a highway common carrier, request authority to extend their operations.

Applicants are now authorized to transport general commodities between all points and places in the county of Stanislaus and between the San Francisco Territory, on the one hand, and points in Stanislaus County, Manteca and Ripon, on the other hand. Applicants are also authorized to transport commodities requiring refrigeration and canned goods between Stanislaus County and the Los Angeles Territory. They may also transport canned goods between Turlock and Modesto, on the one hand, and Stockton, on the other hand, as well as cement between Kentucky House, Permanente, Davenport and San Juan Bautista, on the one hand, and Stanislaus County, on the other hand.

Authority is sought to transport general commodities, with certain exceptions, in an area from Marin County and Redding on the north to the San Diego area on the south.

Applicants own and operate approximately 114 pieces of equipment. They maintain a terminal in Turlock. As of November 30, 1959 they indicated a net worth in the amount of \$106,252.61, and for

the eleven months ending November 30, 1959 realized a net profit in the amount of \$41,389.01.

It is alleged that applicants have been providing service within the proposed area for many years either as a permitted or certificated carrier; that their present certificated authority is so restricted as to competitively handicap their operations; and that they are continually requested by their customers to render the type of service herein proposed.

Copies of the application were served upon certificated carriers serving the proposed area. In addition, the Commission, by letter, requested the same carriers to indicate whether they would have any protest to the granting of the application. Only one protest was received and that was made by Nielsen Freight lines. However, the protest was withdrawn upon the filing of a formal stipulation to the effect that applicants would provide no service north of Marin County and no service to, from or between points within Napa and Sonoma Counties.

After consideration the Commission finds and concludes that public convenience and necessity require the granting of the authority sought. A public hearing is not necessary.

## ORDER

Application having been filed and the Commission being informed in the premises,

#### IT IS ORDERED:

1. That a certificate of public convenience and necessity is hereby granted to Jake Stokes and Johnson McMurphy authorizing the transportation of property as a highway common carrier between the points and over the routes as set forth in Appendices A, B, C and D attached hereto and made a part hereof.

- 2. That, in providing service pursuant to the certificate herein granted, applicants shall comply with and observe the following service regulations:
  - a. Within thirty days after the effective date hereof, applicants shall file a written acceptance of the certificate herein granted. By accepting the certificate of public convenience and necessity herein granted, applicants are placed on notice that they will be required, among other things, to file annual reports of their operations and to comply with and observe the safety rules and other regulations of the Commission's General Order No. 99 and insurance requirements of the Commission's General Order No. 100-A. Failure to file such reports, in such form and at such time as the Commission may direct, or to comply with and observe the provisions of General Orders Nos. 99 and 100-A, may result in a cancellation of the operating authority granted by this decision.
  - b. Within one hundred twenty days after the effective date hereof, and on not less than ten days' notice to the Commission and to the public, applicants shall establish the service herein authorized and file in triplicate, and concurrently make effective, tariffs satisfactory to the Commission.
- 3. That the certificate of public convenience and necessity granted in paragraph 1 of this order is in lieu of and supersedes the certificates of public convenience and necessity granted by Decision No. 58054, as amended by Decisions Nos. 58296, 58524, 58832 in Applications Nos. 36063 and 36363, which certificates are hereby canceled and revoked, said revocation to become effective concurrently with the effective date of the tariff filings required by paragraph 2(b) hereof.

The effective date of this order shall be twenty days after the date hereof.

Jake Stokes and Johnson McMurphy, by the certificate of public convenience and necessity granted in the decision noted in the margin, are authorized to transport general commodities as follows:

- Between all points and places in the Counties of Calaveras, Contra Costa, Sacramento, San Joaquin, Stanislaus and Merced.
- 2. Between points in the Counties set forth in paragraph 1 above, on the one hand, and, on the other hand, points in the following areas and on and along the following highways:
  - a. All points located within Marin County.
  - b. All points in the San Francisco Territory as described in Appendix B attached hereto.
  - c. All points in the Los Angeles Basin Territory as described in Appendix C attached hereto.
  - d. All points in the San Diego Territory as described in Appendix D attached hereto.
  - e. All points and places on and within 25 miles laterally of the following named highways:
    - (1) U. S. Eighways 101 and 101 Alternate between San Jose and the northerly limits of the Los Angeles Basin Territory.
    - (2) U. S. Righway 101 between the southerly limits of the Los Angeles Basin Territory and the northerly limits of the San Diego Territory.
    - (3) U. S. Highway 40 between Richmond and Auburn, inclusive.
    - (4) U. S. Highway 50 between Hayward and Tracy, inclusive.
    - (5) U. S. Highways 99 and 99-W between Redding and Davis, inclusive.

- (6) U. S. Highway 99-E between Red Bluff and Roseville, inclusive.
- (7) State Highway 49 between Auburn and Mariposa, inclusive.
- (8) State Highway 140 between Mariposa and the easterly limits of Merced County, inclusive.
- (9) U. S. Highway 99 between the southerly limits of Merced County and San Fernando, inclusive.
- (10) State Highway 33 between Dos Palos and Mettler Station, inclusive.
- (11) U. S. Highway 395 between the southerly limits of the Los Angeles Basin Territory and Miramar, inclusive.
- 3.a. Through routes and rates may be established between any points in the areas or on the routes described in paragraph 2 above, on the one hand, and any other point in another area or on another route described in paragraph 2 above, on the other hand, except that applicants shall not perform local service between any points both of which are within any one territory or county or on any one route described in paragraph 2 above.
  - b. Applicants may not operate to, from or between any point within Counties of Napa and Sonoma.
- 4. Applicants may use any and all highways and roads between the areas described for operating convenience only.
- 5. Applicants shall not transport any shipments of:
  - a. Used household goods and personal effects not packed in accordance with the crated property requirements set forth in paragraph (d) of Item No. 10-C of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 4-A.

- b. Automobiles, trucks and buses; viz., new and used, finished or unfinished passenger automobiles (including jeeps), ambulances, hearses and taxis; freight automobiles, automobile chassis, trucks, truck chassis, truck trailers, trucks and trailers combined, buses and bus chassis. (See Note.)
  - NOTE: This exception does not apply when the vehicle is crated, or tendered as part of a mixed shipment with other commodities, provided said crated vehicle or vehicle tendered as a part of a mixed shipment is not transported in special truckaway equipment.
- c. Livestock, viz., bucks, bulls, calves, cattle, cows, dairy cattle, ewes, goats, hogs, horses, kids, lambs, oxen, pigs, sheep, sheep camp outfits, sows, steers, stags, or swine.
- d. Commodities when transported in motor vehicles equipped for mechanical mixing in transit.
- e. Fresh or green fruits or vegetables (not cold pack nor frozen) when:
  - (1) The point of destination is a camery, accumulation station, cold storage plant, precooling plant, or winery; or
  - (2) Transported from the field or point of growth to a packing plant, or packing shed. (See Exception).

EXCEPTION: Except for the transportation of citrus fruits in field boxes or in bulk, or avacados, the provisions of paragraph (e) will not apply when the distance between point of origin and point of destination exceeds 50 constructive miles.

Highway No. 80; thence southeasterly to Jamul on State Highway No. 94; thence due south to the International Boundary Line, west to the Pacific Ocean and north along the coast to point of beginning.
