## SUPPLEMENTAL OPINION AND ORDER

)

Pursuant to written requests from the California Farm Bureau Federation, California Trucking Associations, Inc., and California-Sesame Producers, Inc., the Commission staff conducted an investigation into the minimum rates for transportation of sesame seed. A report prepared by the Commission's Transportation Division Rate Branch staff was sent on January 4, 1962, to interested parties for study and comment. The parties were informed that, in the absence of objection or request for public hearing, consideration may be given to the issuance of an ex parte order revising the tariff in accordance with the staff recommendations.

Written comments have been received from California-Sesame Producers, Inc., California Trucking Associations, Inc., and Durkee Famous Foods. These organizations support the staff recommendations and urge their adoption. No objection or request for public hearing has been received.

The staff report is received in evidence in this proceeding as Exhibit No. 0-7. The written comments thereon from California-Sesame Producers, Inc., California Trucking Associations, Inc., and Durkee Famous Foods are received together as Exhibit No. 0-8.

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It appears from the staff report that sesame is an East Indian herb, the seeds of which yield an oil and are used as food. Sesame is used as a salad or cooking oil, in shortening and margarine, and as a carrier for fat-soluble pharmaceuticals. The whole seed is used in a wide variety of confections and as a garnish for bakery goods. In normal sesame, capsules open (dehisce) when dry, allowing the seed to scatter, making necessary considerable hand labor in harvest to prevent seed loss. Discovery of an indehiscent (nonscattering) mutant in 1943 led to the possibility of complete mechanized production of this crop. In the United States, sesame has been produced commercially only since 1950. Domestic production has been increasing since World War II. Farmers in Texas, New Mexico and California planted about 15,000 acres in 1957 and harvested about 9 million pounds of seed. Present demand from the whole seed market alone would absorb production from an additional 15,000 acres. This demand is increasing each year.

According to the staff report, cultivation of sesame in California has been conducted on an experimental basis. In 1961, approximately 200 acres were grown in Fresno County. The average yield was 1,000 pounds per acre. If mechanical harvesting methods can be perfected, there are indications that sesame production in the San Joaquin Valley will be expanded. A company organized in anticipation of large-scale production plans to process and sell the seed.

Sesame seed is subject to the class rates in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2, based on the classification ratings set forth in Item No. 85270 of the Western Classification. That item provides a less-than-carload rating of third class and a carload rating of Class B, subject to a minimum weight of 40,000 pounds. The minimum class rates resulting from the application of the ratings specified in this

item of the classification are substantially higher than the commodity rates provided in Item No. 654-2 of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 for Grain, Rice, Grain Products and Related Articles (including various seeds) as described in Lists 1 through 10 of Items Nos. 652-653. The commodity rates in question are specifically designed for the transportation of the described commodities and are lower than the otherwise applicable class rates.

The staff report indicates that harvesting of sesame seed and transportation from the field to initial point of use or storage are performed in a similar manner to the harvesting and transportation of the grain and related articles that are subject to the aforementioned commodity rates. Sesame seed is hauled in bulk truck and trailer equipment of the type used to transport the other commodities. It appears from the available information that the transportation characteristics of sesame seed are similar in many respects to those of the seed and other products for which special commodity rates are provided in Item No. 65+2 of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2.

The addition of sesame seed to List No. 9 in Item No. 653 would accord to sesame seed the same commodity rates as are provided in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 for other specified seeds. It also would provide a substantial reduction in the level of the minimum rates, which may assist in promoting the expansion of California acreage devoted to this new cash crop. The staff report recommends specifically that sesame seed be added to the list of seeds described in List No. 9 of Item No. 653 of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2.

Upon consideration of the evidence in this proceeding, the Commission finds that the modification in the minimum rates as proposed in Exhibit No. 0-7 is reasonable, and that the resulting minimum rates and charges will be just, reasonable and nondiscriminatory minimum rates and charges for the transportation of sesame seed.

Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 will be revised accordingly. This is a matter in which a public hearing is not necessary.

Good cause appearing,

IT IS ORDERED that:

- (1) Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 (Appendix "D" to Decision No. 31606, as amended) is hereby further amended by incorporating therein, to become effective April 21, 1962, Twenty-third Revised Page 8 and Ninth Revised Page 50, which revised pages are attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof.
- (2) Tariff publications authorized to be made by common carriers as a result of the order herein may be filed not earlier than the effective date hereof, and may be made effective on not less than five days' notice to the Commission and to the public if filed not later than sixty days after the effective date of the minimum rate tariff pages incorporated in this order.
- (3) Common carriers in establishing the minimum rates, charges, rules and regulations authorized hereinabove, are hereby authorized to depart from the provisions of Article XII, Section 21, of the Constitution of the State of California, and Section 460 of the Public Utilities Code to the extent necessary to adjust long-and-short-haul departures now maintained under outstanding authorizations that such outstanding authorizations are hereby modified only to the extent necessary to comply with this order; and that schedules containing the minimum rates, charges, rules and regulations

published under this authority shall make reference to the prior orders authorizing long-and-short-haul departures and to this order.

In all other respects, the aforesaid Decision No. 31606, as amended, shall remain in full force and effect.

This order shall become effective twenty days after the date hereof.
