OPINION AND ORDER

By Petition for Modification No. 57 in this proceeding, California Trucking Associations, Inc., prays that the Commission make its ex parte order establishing in City Carriers' Tariff No. 2-A, Highway Carriers' Tariff No. 1-A certain rates and charges which heretofore have been established as reasonable minimum rates and charges in City Carriers' Tariff No. 1-A.¹ The rates in question are for the transportation of fresh fruits and vegetables, and are stated generally in cents per package for the various kinds of produce in described types of containers.

Petitioner points out that the East Bay tariff does not contain special rates and charges for the transportation of produce. Allegedly, carrier operations in the East Bay are conducted subject to economic conditions similar to those experienced in San Francisco, and shippers and receivers in the East Bay are competitively

engaged in distribution with their counterparts in San Francisco. Petitioner states that the lack of special produce rates and charges in the East Bay tariff creates competitive inequalities without apparent justification.

According to the petition, joint discussions on this subject have been held by carriers, shippers and other interested parties. The resulting rate proposal as set forth in the petition assertedly will result in no increases in rates and may result in some reductions, and will in all circumstances provide for the East Bay the same basis of special rates and charges for the transportation of produce as now prevails in San Francisco.

The Commission is in receipt of a letter from the secretary of the Oakland Wholesale Fruit and Produce Merchant's Association, Inc., stating that the merchant members of the association are in complete accord with the rate proposal and wish to support it unanimously. The California Farm Bureau Federation has also informed the Commission by letter that it is in favor of the proposal. California Packing Corporation, on behalf of itself and the Cannery League of California, has informed the Commission by letter that they object to the nonalternating rate provisions contained in petitioner's proposal which would preclude the use of class rates and rail switching rates provided in City Carriers' Tariff No. 2-A, Highway Carriers' Tariff No. 1-A. Petitioner is agreeable to amending its proposal by eliminating the aforementioned nonalternating rate provisions.

The Commission's transportation staff currently is making cost and economic studies of transportation within the San Francisco

and East Bay drayage areas. The Commission is informed by its staff that the development of requisite information relating to the transportation of produce within these areas must be delayed for the reason that the wholesale produce terminals are in the process of relocation. It appears that fully definitive rates for the future cannot be prescribed until the new terminal sites are definitely known and the operating experience at such sites has been studied and reported to the Commission as evidence by its staff or other parties.

In view of these special circumstances, the Commission concludes and finds that the rates set forth in Appendix A hereof should be established as the just, reasonable and nondiscriminatory minimum rates, subject to further consideration and review when the factual evidence now being developed by the staff is available.

Good cause appearing,

IT IS ORDERED that:

1. City Carriers' Tariff No. 2-A, Highway Carriers' Tariff No. 1-A (Appendix "A" of Decision No. 41362, as amended) is hereby further amended by incorporating therein, to become effective August 11, 1962, the revised pages attached hereto and listed in Appendix A also attached hereto, which revised pages and appendix are by this reference made a part hereof.

2. Tariff publications authorized to be made by common carriers as a result of the order herein may be made effective not earlier than the tenth day after the effective date of this order, and may be made effective on not less than ten days' notice to the


Commission and to the public if filed not later than sixty days after the effective date of the minimum rate tariff pages incorporated in this order.


3. Common carriers in establishing the minimum rates, charges, rules and regulations authorized hereinabove, are hereby authorized to depart from the provisions of Section 460 of the Public Utilities Code to the extent necessary to adjust long-and-short-haul departures now maintained under outstanding authorizations; that such outstanding authorizations are hereby modified only to the extent necessary to comply with this order; and that schedules containing the minimum rates, charges, rules and regulations published under this authority shall make reference to the prior orders authorizing long-and-short-haul departures and to this order.


In all other respects, the aforesaid Decision No. 41362, as amended, shall remain in full force and effect.


This order shall become effective twenty days after the date hereof.
