<u>OPINION</u>

Public hearings were held before Examiner John Power at Bakersfield on December 19 and Los Angeles on December 20, 1961.

Applicant is a permitted carrier. His original application requested authority to serve between the Los Angeles Basin Territory and Delano with five-mile lateral rights. Limited commodities were requested; however, the list of commodities was very extensive.

At the conclusion of the Los Angeles hearing, dates were set in April to hear protestants' cases. The major group of protestants reached an agreement with applicant and the matter went off calendar. On May 14, 1962 applicant filed an amendment to the application. The major feature of the amendment was to restrict the area for which a certificate was sought. The Los Angeles Territory was requested instead of the Basin. On the northern end the authority requested was cut back to Bakersfield and Oildale. Laterals were reduced from five to four miles. The commodity list was substantially shortened. A stipulation was annexed to the application withdrawing the protest of those carriers represented by Mr. Glanz as shown in the appearances herein. This stipulation does not bind the Asbury Transportation Company but that company apparently did not object to the removal of the matter from the calendar or otherwise indicate to the Commission its continuing interest in the proceeding.

Applicant presented eight public witnesses at Bakersfield and five at los Angeles in support of his application. These witnesses generally testified as to the speed and dependability of applicant's service and expressed a need and desire for the proposed service and an intention to use it. Applicant delivers on Saturday, a feature that is a necessity to some of the witnesses. For the reasons indicated above no presentation was made on behalf of the protestants.

The Commission finds that public convenience and necessity require that the application, as amended, be granted.

The Commission further finds that applicant has the necessary financial resources, experience, equipment and personnel to render the proposed service.

John Allen Delliplaine is hereby placed on notice that operative rights, as such, do not constitute a class of property which may be capitalized or used as an element of value in rate fixing for any amount of money in excess of that originally paid to the State as the consideration for the grant of such rights. Aside from their purely permissive aspect, such rights extend to the holder a full or partial monopoly of a class of business over a particular route. This monopoly feature may be modified or canceled at any time by the State, which is not in any respect limited as to the number of rights which may be given.

ORDER

An application having been filed, a public hearing having been held and based on the evidence therein adduced,

IT IS ORDERED that:

- 1. A certificate of public convenience and necessity be and it is granted to John Allen Delliplaine authorizing him to operate as a highway common carrier, as defined in Section 213 of the Public Utilities Code, between the points and over the routes more particularly set forth in Appendices A and B attached hereto and made a part hereof.
- 2. In providing service pursuant to the certificate herein granted, applicant shall comply with and observe the following service regulations:

- (a) Within thirty days after the effective date hereof, applicant shall file a written acceptance of the certificate herein granted. By accepting the certificate of public convenience and necessity herein granted, applicant is placed on notice that he will be required, among other things, to file annual reports of his operations and to comply with and observe the safety rules and other regulations of the Commission's General Order No. 99 and insurance requirements of the Commission's General Order No. 100-B. Failure to file such reports, in such form and at such time as the Commission may direct, or to comply with and observe the provisions of General Orders Nos. 99 and 100-B, may result in a cancellation of the operating authority granted by this decision.
- (b) Within one hundred twenty days after the effective date hereof, applicant shall establish the service herein authorized and file in the Commission's office in triplicate tariffs satisfactory to the Commission.
- (c) The tariff filings shall be made effective not earlier than thirty days after the effective date of this order on not less than thirty days' notice to the Commission and the public, and the effective date of the tariff filings shall be concurrent with the establishment of the service herein authorized.
- (d) The tariff filings made pursuant to this order shall comply with the regulations governing the construction and filing of tariffs set forth in the Commission's General Order No. 80-A.

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John Allen Delliplaine, by the certificate of public convenience and necessity granted in the decision noted in the margin, is authorized to transport the commodities hereinafter listed between Los Angeles Territory, as described in Appendix B attached hereto, and Bakersfield and Oildale serving all intermediate points on and within four miles laterally of U.S. Highway 99, including points within a four-mile radius of Bakersfield.

Lateral and radial miles referred to in this appendix are statute miles of 5,280 feet each, measured in a straight line without regard to terrain features.

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LOS ANGELES TERRITORY includes that area embraced by the following boundary: Beginning at the intersection of Sunset Boulevard and U. S. Righway No. 101, Alternate; thence northeasterly on Sunset Boulevard to State Highway No. 7; northerly along State Highway No. 7 to State Highway No. 118; northeasterly along State Highway No. 118 through and including the City of San Fernando; continuing northeasterly and southeasterly along State Highway
No. 110 to and including the City of Pasadena; easterly along
Foothill Boulevard from the intersection of Foothill Boulevard and Michillinda Avenue to Valencia Way; northerly on Valencia Way to Eillcrest Boulevard; easterly and northeasterly along Hillcrest Boulevard to Grand Avenue; easterly and southerly along Grand Avenue to Greystone Avenue; easterly and southerly along Grand Avenue to Greystone Avenue; easterly on Greystone Avenue to Oak Park Lane; easterly on Oak Park Lane and the prolongation thereof to the west side of the Sawpit Wash; southerly along the Sawpit Wash to the north side of the Pacific Electric Railway right of way; easterly along the north side of the Pacific Electric Railway right of way to Buena Vista Street; south and southerly on Buena Vista Street to its intersection with Meridian Street; due south along an imaginary line to the west bank of the San Gabriel River; southerly along the west bank of the San Gabriel River to Beverly Boulevard; southeasterly on Beverly Boulevard to Painter Avenue in the City of Whittier; southerly on Painter Avenue to Telegraph Road; westerly on Telegraph Road to the west bank of the San Gabriel River; southerly along the west bank of the San Gabriel River to Imperial Highway; westerly on Imperial Highway to State Highway No. 19; southerly along State Highway No. 19 to its intersection with U. S. Highway No. 101, Alternate, at Ximeno Street; southerly along Kimeno Street and its prolongation to the Pacific Ocean; westerly and northerly along the shore line of the Pacific Ocean to a point directly south of the intersection of Sunset Boulevard and U. S. Highway No. 101, Alternate; thence northerly along an imaginary line to point of beginning.
