 Route II-Las-29,73-Susv,C,A, in
 Lassen County.

ORDER

State of California, Department of Public Works, is hereby authorized to construct State Route 29 (Sign Route 36) at grade across a track of Southern Pacific Company near Susanville, Lassen County, at the location described in the application to be identified as Crossing No. AX-380.1. Construction expense shall be apportioned by agreement between the parties or, if they fail to agree, by further order of the Commission. Maintenance expense outside of lines two feet outside of rails shall be borne by applicant. Southern Pacific Company shall bear maintenance cost between such lines. Width of crossing shall be not less than fifty-four feet and grades of approach not greater than one percent. Construction shall be equal or superior to Standard No. 2 of General Order No. 72. Protection shall be by two Standard No. 2 crossing signals (General Order No. 75-B) supplemented by flashing light signals on cantilever arms.

Within thirty days after completion pursuant to this order, applicant shall so advise the Commission in writing. This authorization shall expire if not exercised within one year unless time be extended or if above conditions are not complied with.

Authorization may be revoked or modified if public convenience, necessity, or safety so require. The effective date of this order shall be twenty days after the date hereof.
