> In the Matter of the Application of CAITFORNIA MOTOR EXPRESS, IID., a corporation, for an in lieu certficate of public convenience and necessity to consolidate, restrict, and extend its authority as in express corporation.

## OPINION

California Motor Express, Ltd., presently operating as an express corporation as defined in Section 219 of the Public Utilities Code, requests that its operating authority be restated to conform to the operating authority of California Motor Transport Co., applicant's affiliate and underlying carrier.

It is alleged that originally both services were limited to the transportation of commodities between San Francisco Bay points and the Los Angeles area; in response to needs of the shipping public, both applicant and its affiliate, by way of purchases authorize by this Cominssion, and by way of applications for extensions granted by this Commission, have extended their operating authorities so that the authority of each company now authorizes service to and from points in a large portion of the State; there is, however, a lack of miformity in the services authorized to be performed by applicant and its affiliate, and suck lack of uniformity is confusing to the shipping public and to applicant's employees.

Upon consideration of the recori, the Comorssion finds that public convenicnce and necessity require the restatement of applicant's operating authority. Based upon the foregoing finding, the Commission concludes that the application should be granted. A public hearing is not necessary.

II IS ORDERED that:

1. A certificate of public convenience and mecessity is bereby granced to Califormia Motor Express, Ltd;, authorizing it to operate as an express corporation as defined in Section 219 of the Public Unilities Code, between the points as set forth in Appendices A, B, C and D attached bereto and made a part hereof.
2. In providing service pursuant to the cortificate berein granted, applicant shall comply with and obsezve the following service regulations:
(a) Within thirty days after the effective date hercof, applicant sinall file a written acceptance of the certificate berein granted. $3 y$ accepting the cextificate of public convenience and necessity herein grantec, applicant is placed on notice that it will be required, among other things, to file onual reports of its operations. Failure to file such reports, in such form and at such time as the commission may direct, may result in a cancellation of the operating authority granted by this decision.
(b) Within one hundred twenty days after the effective date bereof, applicant sinall establish the service hercin authorized and file in the commssion's office in triplicate tariffs satisfactory to the Comission.
(c) The tariff filings shall be mace effective not earlier than thirty days after the effective date of this order on mot less chan thirty days' notice to the commission and the public, amd the effective cate of the tariff filings shall be concurrent with the establishment of the service herein authorized:
(d) The tariff filings made pursuant to tais order shall comply with the regulations governing the construction and filing of tariffs set forth in the commission's General Order No. 0 NA.
3. The certificate of public convenience and necessity granted in paragraph 1 of this order supersedes all existing prescriptive operating rights and certificates of public conveneience and necessity authorizing the transportation of express traffic heretofore granted to or acquired by California Motor Express, Ltí., and presently possessed by it, which operative rights and certificates are hereby revoked, said revocation to become effective concurrently with the effective date of the tariff filings required by paragraph $2(b)$ hereof.

The effective date of this order shall be twenty days after the date hereof.

California Motor Express, Ltd., by the certificate of public convenience and necessity granted in the decision noted in the margin, is authorized to operate as an Express Corporation as defined in Section 219 of the Public Utilities Code as follows:
