O R D E R

Southern Pacific Company is hereby authorized to construct a drill track at grade across Grove Avenue in the City of Orange, Orange County, at the location described in the application, to be identified as Crossing No. BM-515.25-C.

Applicant shall bear entire construction and maintenance expense.

Construction of said crossing shall be equal or superior to Standard No. 2 of General Order No. 72, and 28 feet in width, with tops of rails flush with the roadway and with grades of approach not exceeding one percent in accordance with plan attached to the application. Protection shall be by two Standard No. 1 crossing signs (General Order No. 75-B) with reflex reflecting sheet material.

No train, engine, motor, or car, shall be operated over said crossing unless first brought to a stop, and traffic on the street protected by a member of the train crew or other competent employee acting as a flagman.

Within thirty days after completion, pursuant to this order, applicant shall so advise the Commission in writing. This

authorization shall expire if not exercised within one year unless time be extended or if above conditions are not complied with. Authorization may be revoked or modified if public convenience, necessity or safety so require.

Applicant declares that the industry to be served urgently desires that rail service be available not later than September 30, 1963. For that reason, waiver of the twenty-day period is requested.

The effective date of this order shall therefore be the date hereof.
