O P I N I O N

Public hearing was held and the matter submitted on March 3, 1966, at Los Angeles, before Examiner Mallory.

Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 (tariff) contains class and commodity rates for the statewide transportation of general commodities. Item No. 365 of the tariff contains descriptions of articles and exception class ratings for the transportation of "Oil, Water or Gas Well Outfits and Supplies, and Other Articles". Said exception class ratings produce higher charges than the charges under ratings set forth in the governing classification.^{1/} The ratings in said

item are statewide in application and are not limited to transportation from or to well sites or other particular locations. By this petition, as amended, California Trucking Association (CTA) seeks to amend the commodity descriptions in said item.^{2/} The granting of this portion of the petition was opposed by the Commission staff.

Items Nos. 720, 720.1 and 720.2 of the tariff contain hourly rates and governing rules for the transportation of oil, water or gas well outfits and supplies and for the stringing of pipe. The petition also seeks to increase hourly rates for services other than stringing services.^{3/}

Commodity Descriptions

Evidence in support of the portion of the petition dealing with the proposed amendment of Item No. 365 was presented by the Director of CTA's Division of Transportation Economics. Petitioner seeks the restatement of the description of articles contained in Item No. 365 in terms of the governing classification. This would be accomplished by designating the articles to be included in the item by reference to the numerical listing of a particular item in the governing classification. The purposes of this restatement are the same as those advanced by petitioner in recent proceedings involving similar changes in other exception rating items in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2.^{4/}

4/ These reasons are more fully outlined in Decision No. 69994, dated November 23, 1965, in Case No. 5432, Petition for Modification No. 386, involving tariff items containing descriptions and exception ratings on canned goods and related articles.

The witness testified that in developing the proposed changes, he included in the new description all items under the generic heading in the governing classification for the Oil, Water, Gas Well Group, even though some of the items describe articles not now listed in Item No. 365 of the tariff. In explanation, the witness stated that the descriptions in Item No. 365 have remained unchanged except for minor modifications since their establishment in the tariff, pursuant to Decision No. 33263 of July 3, 1940, in Case No. 4246. The witness stated that in the period since 1940, many changes in the methods and procedures for well drilling have occurred, and new types and kinds of tools and equipment have come into being. He stated that it was the apparent intention of the Commission, in Decision No. 33263, to include in Item No. 365 all articles then listed in the classification under the generic heading of Oil, Water and Gas Well Outfits and Supplies. The witness asserted that the inclusion of all items currently listed in the governing classification under the generic heading Oil, Water, Gas Well Group would bring Item No. 365 up-to-date, and would seem to follow the intent of the Commission in Decision No. 33263.

Petitioner also proposed to list in Item No. 365 all of the various types of iron or steel pipe which may be used at and transported to well sites. The witness testified that the Commission's Transportation Division had recently issued Informal Ruling No. 166 relating to coated or lined steel pipe, indicating that in the opinion of the staff, Item No. 365 of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 is specific and applies only to pipe specified in the item; therefore, the exception ratings in the item would not apply to iron or steel pipe or tubing covered or lined with cement mortar, composition,

plastic or rubber.^{5/} The witness stated that the staff's interpretation is contrary to that placed upon the item by most shippers and carriers over the years and creates a situation where bare iron or steel pipe is included in the item but wrapped or coated pipe is excluded. The witness testified that wrapped or composition coated pipe long has been used as well drilling pipe or at well sites; that over the years new types of coatings have been developed, particularly various types of plastic coatings; and that coated or lined pipe has greater value and greater susceptibility to damage than uncoated pipe. Therefore, the witness urged that all types of iron or steel pipe having an inside diameter of four inches or over be included in Item No. 365.

The traffic manager of B.B.D. Transportation Co., Inc., a highway carrier engaged in the transportation of large-diameter pipe to locations other than oil fields, testified in opposition to the inclusion of cement or mortar-lined steel pipe in the list of articles described in Item No. 365. He stated that, in his opinion, cement or mortar-lined steel pipe has more favorable transportation characteristics than thin-wall steel pipe, because the former has greater density and is less susceptible to damage. He asserted that thin-wall steel pipe is easily crushed, especially by binder-chains used to secure the load. None of the pipe transported by this carrier is to oil, water or gas well sites or well drilling locations, and no special trucking equipment is used.

^{5/} An informal ruling of the Transportation Division of the staff of the Public Utilities Commission is made in response to questions propounded by the public, indicating what is deemed by the Division to be the correct application and interpretation of the particular tariffs involved. Such rulings are tentative and provisional and are made in the absence of formal decisions upon the subject by the Commission.

The Commission staff argued against the inclusion of any additional commodities in Item No. 365 at this time. The basic reason for staff opposition is that the staff believes that rates resulting from the class ratings in Item No. 365 (which exceed those applicable under ratings in the governing classification) already are unreasonably high for transportation performed entirely over the paved highway network of the State, where no adverse transportation conditions exist. The staff asserted that conditions surrounding oil field transportation have substantially changed since the higher ratings in Item No. 365 were established and that there is no justification for the higher ratings in said item on ordinary hauls performed over good roads. No evidence was presented by the staff in support of its position concerning the reasonableness of the present ratings in Item No. 365.

Increases in Hourly Rates

The hourly rates in Items Nos. 720, 720.1 and 720.2 were last increased effective August 21, 1965, pursuant to Decision No. 69404, dated July 13, 1965, in Case No. 5432, Petition No. 376. The full amount of the increases sought in said petition were not authorized.^{6/}

^{6/} With respect to the denial of increases related to indirect costs, Decision No. 69404 states as follows:

"In his calculation of the cost increases, petitioner's witness included an amount equal to 26 percent of the increases in wage and fuel tax costs to provide for increases in indirect costs which, he said, the carriers will also experience. Allegedly, the indirect costs of the carriers' operations increase in proportion to the increases in direct costs. Petitioner's witness admittedly had nothing to offer in the way of specific evidence to support this allegation. Neither could he testify as to when and in what amounts the asserted increases in indirect costs would become effective. In the circumstances we find that the asserted increases in indirect costs are too indefinite, both as to amount and effective date, to be adopted as a basis for the prescription of increases in the minimum rates."

In the instant petition, CTA seeks increases in the hourly rates to give effect to the portion of the sought increases denied in Decision No. 69404 covering indirect costs and to increases in payroll taxes effective subsequent to July 1, 1965.

Evidence in support of these requests was presented by the Assistant Director for Southern California of CTA's Division of Transportation Research.

The witness placed in evidence his study of the operating results of six carriers covering the first nine months of 1965, and showing the ratio of indirect expenses to direct expenses of such carriers for that period. Assertedly, these carriers are the only carrier-members of CTA which derive more than 25 percent of their revenues from oil field hauling. Based upon this study, the witness developed a ratio of indirect expenses to direct expenses for the nine-month period of 36 percent. A ratio of 26 percent was used in the cost study which was presented in the proceeding in which the current oil field rates were initially established. The witness concluded from the results of his study that increases in indirect expenses follow increases in direct expenses, that such increases are concurrent, and that the ratio used in the cost study in the initial proceeding understated the actual ratio of indirect to direct expenses of oil field carriers.

A separate portion of the study presented by this witness showed that since July 1, 1965, so-called Social Security taxes and other related payroll taxes have increased by 38.2 percent.

Petitioner developed the specific amount of increases sought herein by determining the amount of increase (exclusive of profit) granted in the prior proceeding and increasing said amount to reflect the changes in payroll tax costs and indirect expenses (calculated at 36 percent of direct expenses).

Discussion, Findings and Conclusions

With respect to Item No. 365, it is petitioner's asserted purpose to redescribe the articles subject to the exception ratings in that item without material change, except that petitioner proposes to include in that item all articles described under the generic heading Oil, Water, Gas Well Group in the governing classification, and to include all iron or steel pipe having inside diameter of 4 inches or greater.

It appears that all articles described under the generic heading in the classification covering Oil, Water and Gas Well Outfits and Supplies were included in the description of articles in Item No. 365 at the time that item was established; that the descriptions in said item have not been kept up-to-date to reflect additions or changes in such articles; and that it was the Commission's intention when the exception ratings were first established that they apply to all articles described in the governing classification under the generic heading referred to above. This portion of petitioner's proposal should be adopted; the increases, if any, resulting therefrom are justified.

Appendix A attached hereto shows the present provisions of Item No. 365 relating to iron and steel pipe, together with the commodity descriptions which would be substituted therefor under petitioner's proposal. A careful review indicates that some of the types of pipe proposed to be included, while they may be used in connection with well drilling or well maintenance, have their principal use for other purposes. The effect of listing these types of pipe in Item No. 365 is that the higher rates resulting from the exception ratings in Item No. 365 would be assessed to all shippers even though the principal use for such commodities would be other than at oil, water or gas well sites. Petitioner has shown that the

inclusion of iron or steel pipe or tubing, as described in Items Nos. 51190, 51200, 51960, 51970, 52090 and 52200 of the governing classification is justified. Pipe and tubing described in Items Nos. 51960 and 51970 also embrace pipe and tubing wholly or partially coated or lined with compounds having a tar or asphalt base or coated with impregnated fabrics or paper (wrapped or composition coated pipe). Petitioner has not shown that the inclusion of lined or coated pipe, other than that embraced in the foregoing items, is justified.

With respect to the proposed increases in hourly rates, petitioner has shown that indirect costs have increased in proportion to the increase in direct costs since the last general increase in said rates (Decision No. 68811). The adjustment in hourly rates hereinafter authorized will give effect to the increases in payroll taxes incurred since the last adjustment in the hourly rates (Decision No. 69404) and will include as an adjustment for indirect costs an amount equal to 26 percent of the increases in wages, fuel taxes and payroll taxes incurred since the last general increase in said rates.

The Commission finds:

1. The revisions of Item No. 365 adopted herein will clarify and make more definitive the provisions of Item No. 365 and are desirable.
2. The revision of the commodity descriptions in Item No. 365 set forth in the tariff pages attached to this order will result in just, reasonable and nondiscriminatory rates, and any increases resulting therefrom are justified.
3. The increases in the rates and charges in Items Nos. 720, 720.1 and 720.2 of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 which are set forth in the order which follows have been shown to be justified, and as

so increased said rates and charges are and will be the just, reasonable and nondiscriminatory minimum rates and charges for the services to which they apply.

4. To the extent that the provisions of Items Nos. 365, 720, 720.1 and 720.2 of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 have been found heretofore to constitute reasonable minimum rates and rules for common carriers as defined in the Public Utilities Act, said provisions, as hereinafter adjusted, are, and will be, reasonable minimum rates for said common carriers. To the extent that the existing rates and charges of said common carriers for the transportation involved are less in volume or effect than the minimum rates and charges hereinbefore designated as reasonable for said carriers, to that same extent the rates and charges of said carriers are hereby found to be, now and for the future, unreasonable, insufficient and not justified by the actual competitive rates of competing carriers or by the costs of other means of transportation.

5. Common carriers, to the extent that they maintain low-bed equipment hourly rates for transportation as described in Item No. 720 on the same levels as the rates set forth in Items Nos. 720, 720.1 and 720.2, should be authorized to increase their low-bed equipment rates to the levels of the increased minimum rates in said items, and said increases are justified.

The Commission concludes that Petition No. 400 in Case No. 5432 should be granted to the extent provided in the order which follows.

In connection with the establishment of increased rates in conformity with the order herein, petitioner asks that common carriers be relieved from the so-called long- and short-haul prohibitions of Articles XII, Section 21, of the Constitution of the State of California, and of Section 460 of the Public Utilities Code.

Where common carriers have been authorized heretofore to depart from the long- and short-haul prohibitions, their outstanding authorities will be amended to the extent necessary to carry out the effect of the order herein.

O R D E R

IT IS ORDERED that:

1. Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 (Appendix "D" to Decision No. 31606, as amended) is further amended by incorporating therein, to become effective July 9, 1966, the revised pages attached hereto and listed in Appendix B also attached hereto, which pages and appendix by this reference are made a part hereof.

2. Common carriers subject to the Public Utilities Act, to the extent that they are subject also to said Decision No. 31606, as amended, are directed to establish in their tariffs the rate increases necessary to conform to the further increases herein in the rates and charges established by said decision.

3. Common carriers, to the extent they maintain low-bed equipment hourly rates for the transportation described in Item No. 720 of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 on the same levels of rates as set forth in Items Nos. 720, 720.1 and 720.2 of that tariff, are hereby authorized to increase said low-bed equipment rates to the levels of the minimum rates in Items Nos. 720, 720.1 and 720.2 of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 prescribed by the order herein.

4. Tariff publications required or authorized to be made by common carriers as a result of the order herein may be made effective not earlier than the tenth day after the effective date of this order, on not less than ten days' notice to the Commission and to the public; such tariff publications as are required shall be made effective not later than July 9, 1966; and as to tariff publications which are authorized but not required, the authority herein granted

shall expire unless exercised within sixty days after the effective date hereof.

5. Common carriers, in establishing and maintaining the rates authorized hereinabove, are hereby authorized to depart from the provisions of Section 460 of the Public Utilities Code to the extent necessary to adjust long- and short-haul departures now maintained under outstanding authorizations; such outstanding authorizations are hereby modified only to the extent necessary to comply with this order; and schedules containing the rates published under this authority shall make reference to the prior orders authorizing long- and short-haul departures and to this order.

6. In all other respects, Decision No. 31606, as amended, shall remain in full force and effect.

7. Except to the extent granted herein, Petition for Modification No. 400 is denied.

The effective date of this order shall be twenty days after the date hereof.

I. Description of articles now contained in Item No. 365 of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2:

Pipe or Tubing, iron or steel, inside diameter
4 inches or greater:

Cast or Wrought, (see note),
Plate or Sheet, 16 gauge or
thicker, well casing or well
drilling,

Note: Will not apply on cast iron pipe on fittings as described in Item No. 378.

(Item No. 378 applies on cast iron pressure pipe, not less than 12 feet and not more than 18-1/2 feet in length, and on cast iron soil pipe, not less than 2 feet and not more than 11 feet in length.)

II. Description of articles proposed to be included in Item No. 365 (Exhibit 400-1, Exhibit A):

Pipe or Tubing, iron or steel, inside diameter
4 inches or greater, viz.:

Cast or Wrought (see Note re Item 378),
or Plate or Sheet, 16 gauge or thicker
as described in the following items:

51190	Pipe, conduit, wrought iron or steel
51200	Pipe, iron or steel, cast, N.O.I.* with or without prepared joints.
