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The California Trucking Association requests the cancellation of the present third class exception rating on drugs, medicines, chemicals and related articles named in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 1-B (East Bay Drayage Area). The rating in question is published as an exception to the classification rating named in the governing classification. 1

Public hearing in this matter was held before Examiner

Gagnon at San Francisco on April 5, 1966. Copies of the petition

and notice of hearing were served in accordance with the Commission's

procedural rules. The petition is not opposed.

Minimum Rate Tariff No. 1-B is governed by the provisions of National Motor Freight Classification A-8 (Cal) as governed by National Motor Freight Classification A-8, collectively referred to herein as the governing classification.

Petitioner states that the exception provisions proposed to be canceled from Items 460 and 461 of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 1-B have not been changed basically since they were added to the tariff in 1937 by Decision No. 29594 (unreported) and no longer reflect the circumstances surrounding the distribution of the commodities involved. The commodity listing set forth in Item 460 and continued in Item 461 of the tariff has not been updated to reflect new products or to reflect relationships with other commodities and with changes in other tariff provisions which have affected their application.

The record discloses that certain commodities named in Item 460 are also named in other items in the tariff for which a lower exception rating of fourth class is provided. Petitioner also presented a comparison of commodities listed in Items 460 and 461 with the corresponding commodity descriptions and otherwise applicable class ratings set forth in the governing classification. The comparison demonstrated that the governing classification, in most instances, also provides a third class less-truckload rating, subject to certain released value requirements. In this connection petitioner makes reference to Decision No. 69857 of October 27, 1965, in Case No. 5432, wherein the Commission authorized cancellation of a third class less-truckload exception rating, named in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2, applicable to intercity movements of toilet preparations, drugs, medicines and related articles. In authorizing that tariff revision, the Commission referred to testimony of the California Trucking Association as follows:

[&]quot;... The third-class, less-truckload exception rating is based on a released value of the property not exceeding 50 cents per pound per article. It is alleged that under the provisions of the Governing Classification, the commodities in question

are also subject to a third-class, less-truckload rating based on released value provisions which are the same as those now set forth in MRT No. 2. Petitioner avers that, since the aforementioned classification provisions are now applicable in California, the need for an exception rating ... is no longer necessary"

The California Trucking Association contends that both shippers and carriers of drugs, medicines and related articles between points within the East Bay Drayage Area also have like intercity shipments moving under the recently amended provisions (Decision No. 69857) of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. Petitioner further explains that shippers, as a matter of course, generally utilize the released value provisions of the governing classification on all their shipments of drugs, medicines and related articles, even though such action is not required in connection with local movements within the East Bay Drayage Area. Petitioner contends that, in the light of the Commission's recent action in Decision No. 69857 and the classification ratings applicable under the released value provisions of the governing classification, there no longer is any justification for retaining the asserted outmoded and conflicting exception rating provisions of Items 460 and 461 of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 1-B.

The Commission finds that petitioner's proposal is reasonable and that the resulting minimum rates will be just, reasonable and nondiscriminatory minimum rates for the transportation of the commodities involved. We conclude that the petition should be granted. Minimum Rate Tariff No. 1-B will be amended accordingly by the order herein.

ORDER

IT IS ORDERED that:

- 1. Minimum Rate Tariff No. 1-B (Appendix B of Decision No. 65834, as amended) is hereby further amended by incorporating therein, to become effective August 6, 1966, the tariff pages attached hereto and listed in Appendix A, also attached hereto, which pages and appendix by this reference are made a part hereof.
- 2. Tariff publications required to be made by common carriers as a result of the order herein may be made effective not earlier than the tenth day after the effective date of this order on not less than ten days' notice to the Commission and to the public and such tariff publications shall be made effective not later than August 6, 1966; tariff publications which are authorized but not required to be made by common carriers as a result of the order herein may be made effective not earlier than the tenth day after the effective date of this order, and may be made effective on not less than ten days' notice to the Commission and to the public if filed not later than sixty days after the effective date of the minimum rate tariff pages incorporated in this order.
- 3. Common carriers, in establishing and maintaining the rates authorized hereinabove, are hereby authorized to depart from the provisions of Section 460 of the Public Utilities Code to the extent necessary to adjust long- and short-haul departures now maintained under outstanding authorizations; such outstanding authorizations are hereby modified only to the extent necessary to

comply with this order; schedules containing the rates published under this authority shall make reference to the prior orders authorizing long- and short-haul departures and to this order.

4. In all other respects, Decision No. 65834, as amended shall remain in full force and effect.
