OPINION_AND_ORDER

Simpson Timber Company, a corporation, engages, among other activities, in the manufacture of lumber and plywood in Arcata, Eureka and Korbel, California. It seeks, in this petition, a temporary exemption of sawmill refuse from the rates and provisions of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2.

The verified petition states that sawmill refuse is used as fuel at lumber and plywood mills; that the use of sawmill refuse as an industrial fuel is a further step in total utilization of the cut trees; that special trucking equipment is necessary to provide the transportation service; and that per "truckload" rates rather than rates based on weight or other measurement are necessary. The petition alleges that economic conditions severely limit the distance that sawmill refuse may be transported.

The petition further states that the circumstances and conditions surrounding the transportation of sawmill refuse are substantially similar to those for wood chips and wood shavings, which are now temporarily exempted from the rates and provisions of

Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. Petitioner proposes the same expiration date, of March 9, 1969, for sawmill refuse as is now applicable to wood chips and wood shavings.

Petitioner requests that the petition be granted without hearing. The petition was listed on the Commission's Daily Calendar of November 22, 1967. There are no protests. Letters received from The Pacific Lumber Company, The Greater Eureka Chamber of Commerce, California Manufacturers Association, and Georgia-Pacific Corporation (collectively received herein as Exhibit 1) support the granting of the petition. By letter dated November 22, 1967 (received herein as Exhibit 2), the California Trucking Association advised the Commission that it has no objection to the ex parte consideration requested by petitioner, subject to the understanding that the exemptions on sawmill refuse, wood chips and wood shavings will be subject to review by the Commission prior to the expiration date of March 9, 1969. By notice dated December 5, 1967 (received herein as Exhibit 3), the Commission's Transportation Division states that its staff plans to schedule studies commencing next spring looking toward the establishment of minimum rates on sawmill refuse, wood chips and wood shavings before the March 9, 1969 expiration date.

In the circumstances, it appears and the Commission so finds, that a temporary exemption of sawmill refuse as proposed in the petition herein is justified. The Commission concludes that the petition should be granted. A public hearing is not necessary. When the staff studies relating to sawmill refuse, wood chips and wood shavings are completed, an appropriate proceeding will be instituted for their consideration by the Commission.

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IT IS ORDERED that:

1. Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 (Appendix D of Decision ______ No. 31606, as amended) is further amended by incorporating therein, to become effective February 24, 1968, Forty-eighth Revised Page 15, attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof.

2. Tariff publications authorized to be made by common carriers as a result of the order herein may be made effective not earlier than the tenth day after the effective date of this order, and may be made effective on not less than ten days' notice to the Commission and to the public if filed not later than sixty days after the effective date of the minimum rate tariff pages incorporated in this order.

3. In all other respects said Decision No. 31606, as amended, shall remain in full force and effect.

The effective date of this order shall be twenty days after the date hereof.
