INTERIM OPINION

The Commission's Transportation Division staff, having completed cost and rate studies concerning statewide transportation of general commodities subject to the provisions of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2, recommended that public hearing be held in Case No. 5432 for the receipt of evidence relating to (1) cost of transportation; (2) staff traffic flow study; (3) class-rate structures; (4) the National Motor Freight Classification ratings; and (5) such other rates and regulations as may be appropriate for the transportation of general commodities. The suggested receipt of such evidence was for the purpose of determining the extent to which Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 need be revised to reflect current transportation conditions. Since said tariff is governed by the provisions of

Exception Ratings Tariff No. 1, the staff recommended that public hearing also be held concurrently in Case No. 7858 for the receipt of evidence relating to the extent to which Exception Ratings Tariff No. 1 should be revised to reflect current transportation conditions.

Thirty-six days of public hearing were held at San Francisco and Los Angeles before Commissioner Mitchell and Examiner Gagnon. Only those matters were submitted for decision which specifically relate to the proposed adoption of the class ratings named in the National Motor Freight Classification proper, in lieu of the ratings contained in said Classification's California Supplement, to govern the statewide minimum class-rate structure set forth in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2.1

Statewide Minimum Rates

The rates prescribed in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 are

(1) Mileage Class Rates; (2) Point-to-Point Class Rates; (3) Mileage

Commodity Rates; and (4) Point-to-Point Commodity Rates. These

class and commodity rates stem from Decision No. 31606 of

statewide minimum rate structure for general commodities pursuant to the 1935 legislation giving the Commission additional regulatory responsibilities.²

Minimum Class Rates

Historically, minimum class rates have been maintained for 10 classes, corresponding to the principal ratings named in the Western Classification (1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th, A, B, C, D and E).3 Rates for the first four classes are graduated under four separate rate scales (Any Quantity, 5,000, 10,000, and 20,000-pound minimum weight brackets). Initially, rate scales for these classes were also provided for minimum weight brackets of 2,000 and 4,000 pounds. The 2,000-pound rate scale was subsequently canceled concurrently with the establishment of a 5,000-pound scale of rates, in lieu of the former 4,000-pound rate scale. The class rates for weight brackets of less than 10,000 pounds are for less-truckload traffic. The 10,000 and 20,000-pound rates for classes 1 through 4 and the rates for classes 5 through E are for truckload traffic. Only one bracket of rates is provided for the truckload ratings (5 through E) which are subject to the minimum weights contained in the governing classification or published exceptions thereto, but in no event to exceed 45,000 pounds (original truckload maximum minimum weight of 36,000 pounds was established by Decision No. 31606).

Within each minimum weight bracket a percentage relationship between the rate scales for the first four classes of 100, 90,

Western Classification No. 78 and prior issues thereof was the governing classification for the statewide minimum class rate structure until the adoption of NMFC A-7 (Cal) by <u>Decision No. 66268 of November 5, 1963</u> (61 Cal P.U.C. 655).

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80 and 70 percent, respectively, was established by D
No. 31606. Similarly, for the truckload ratings 5 th

80 and 70 percent, respectively, was established by Decision No. 31606. Similarly, for the truckload ratings 5 through E, inclusive, a percentage relationship to the first-class rate in the 20,000-pound weight bracket of 60, 65, 55, 50, 45 and 40 percent, respectively, was prescribed. While such percentage relationship did not remain constant over the years, due to subsequent general and partial adjustments in the level of the various class-rate scales, the basic format has remained relatively unchanged since 1939.

Minimum Commodity Rates

No fundamental or substantive changes are proposed to be made in the commodity rates established in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2, other than the recommendation that the commodity descriptions for such rates be amended to coincide with those contained in the governing classification. Since the issues to be resolved at this time do not directly relate to the minimum commodity rates named in the tariff, no further discussion here relative to such rates is necessary.

Staff Cost and Rate Studies

Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 is subjected periodically to a general review and study approximately every five to ten years. In the interim, partial adjustments in tariff rates and rules are made in recognition of new or revised highway carrier operating experiences and certain other related modifications in transportation conditions or shipping practices, which may be somewhat limited as to scope of application but sufficiently significant to preclude awaiting completion of full-scale studies.

Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 was last generally revised by Decision No. 66453 of December 10, 1963 (62 Cal P.U.C. 14). At

that time, full-scale cost and rate studies were introduced in evidence by the California Trucking Association. A number of interested parties took exception to the Examiner's recommendation that the Commission find the trucking association's cost study to be the best available evidence to serve as a basis for adjusting Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 rates and charges. The Commission was requested to direct its Transportation Division staff to complete its pending cost and rate studies as quickly as possible for presentation at public hearings with such proposed revisions in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 as are deemed necessary. In adopting the trucking association's cost study, the Commission directed its Transportation Division staff to "diligently proceed to complete its studies relating to transportation subject to Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 and inform the Commission when it is ready to present the results thereof at a public hearing." (Orders Setting Hearing in Cases Nos. 5432 and 7858, dated August 31, 1965 and October 5, 1965, respectively.)

The Staff Cost Study

A report on the estimated cost of transporting general freight by for-hire carriers operating within California was introduced into evidence on May 4, 1966 by the Commission's Transportation Division staff (Exhibit No. 5).

Comprehensive cost data was obtained from selected highway carriers, deemed to be representative general freight haulers, for the development of complete estimated costs for the highway transportation of general class-rated traffic. Time and motion studies were conducted by staff engineers for the period 1962-1964. Information obtained from the books and records of carriers led to the development of separate payroll factors to be applied to the

existing wage scales. During the course of the proceeding, the staff's basic cost information was updated on three separate occasions to reflect increases in labor and allied payroll expenses which became effective subsequent to the submission of staff cost Exhibit No. 5. The last of such adjustments reflected labor and related payroll costs effective generally as of July 1, 1967.

The staff cost study was subjected to a most thorough and probing cross-examination by counsel on behalf of the California Trucking Association. Upon request of the trucking association, the staff was directed to submit substantial portions of its working papers or so-called "back-up" information as supporting addendate its basic cost study (Exhibit No. 5). Over one-half of the hearing time allocated to this proceeding was consumed through cross-examination of staff cost witnesses. As such cross-examination evolved, it became apparent that the thrust of the vigorous inquiry was intended to disclose, if at all possible, sufficient infirmities in the staff cost development to make its employment inappropriate for ultimate construction of statewide minimum class rates.

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The Staff Rate Proposal

The Commission's Transportation Division staff also rec-

The Commission's Transportation Division staff also recommended comprehensive revisions in the present statewide minimum class-rate structure. In addition to the suggested reissue of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2, the most salient features of the staff rate proposal are as follows:

- 1. Complete the classification changeover from NMFC A-10 (Cal) to the National Motor Freight Classification proper (NMFC A-10) to govern Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2.
- 2. Establish minimum class-rate scales compatible with the NMFC A-10 percentage ratings for weight brackets of Any Quantity, 2,000, 6,000, 10,000 and 20,000 pounds. Separate class-rate scales are also proposed for NMFC A-10 ratings subject to truckload minimum weights not to exceed 45,000 pounds. Three separate rate scales are suggested for the 20,000-pound weight bracket, the NMFC A-10 ratings subject to truckload minimum weight provisions, and volume incentive truckload shipments, respectively. Application of these nine latter truckload rate scales depends upon whether the shipment was accorded power loading and/or unloading services.

3. Revise the historical percentage relationship between the various class-rate scales as shown in the following table:

4. Establish a level of class rates, based on the staff cost evidence, which the staff estimates would reduce the less-truckload rates by approximately 16 percent and produce a slight increase in the present truckload class rates.

Cancel exception ratings set forth in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 initially established as exceptions to the former governing rail-oriented Western Classification No. 78, containing numerical classification ratings which were brought forward into NMFC A-7 (Cal), now NMFC A-10 (Cal). 6. Cancel the application of the Commission's Exception Ratings Tariff No. 1 insofar as it governs the class rates prescribed in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. Traffic Flow Study A limited traffic flow study was first initiated by the staff to provide information required to evaluate the circumstances surrounding the contemplated classification changeover from the California Supplement to the National Motor Freight Classification to said Classification proper. Thereafter, shipper and carrier interests requested that the staff conduct a comprehensive traffic flow study which could be used as a basis for developing appropriate minimum class rates. Traffic flow data was obtained from 148 highway carriers and four major California rail lines and their subsidiaries. The highway carriers selected were engaged in the transportation of general freight as highway common carriers, radial highway common carriers, and highway contract carriers, representing statewide and regional long- and short-haul operations. The highway carriers were requested to furnish copies of all freight bills issued on a single specified day for traffic subject to the provisions of Minimum Rate Teriff No. 2. In addition, each highway carrier was requested to furnish a statement showing the number and aggregate weight of intrastate shipments not transported under the aforesaid tariff on the sample days. -9A total of 41,276 shipments were analyzed according to type of rate, weight, distance and classification mixture. The staff rate proposal relies upon the traffic flow data as a means for distributing the proposed class-rate burden over the spectrum of commodities moving intrastate in California under the provisions of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. It was also used to evaluate the possible overall effects of the staff's alternate rate proposal which is hereinafter considered.

Motion to Separate Issues

At the July 25, 1967 adjourned hearing it was apparent that major participating shipper and carrier representatives had combined forces to express joint opposition to the staff's proposed general revision of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. The carriers' objections, while varied, centered upon the suggested reduction in the current level of less-truckload class rates; whereas the shippers' apprehension was directed primarily toward the recommended elimination of exception ratings previously established, in lieu of the otherwise applicable rail-oriented Western Classification ratings. Shippers were concerned that the adoption of the staff rate proposal in its entirety, at one time, would cause undue hardship generally; disrupt established traffic flow or shipping practices; and disturb existing relationships as between various competitive commodities. The shippers desire further opportunity to (1) examine their transportation problems in the light of the staff rate proposal; (2) develop evidence, wherever deemed appropriate, in support of new exceptions to the proposed ratings named in NMFC A-10; and (3) justify substitute exception ratings for those proposed to be canceled by the staff. The California Trucking Association, while somewhat sympathetic to the position expressed by the shippers, C.5432 OSH 8-31-65 C.7858 OSH 10-5-65 NB vigorously opposed on behalf of its member carriers, any substantive reduction in the present less-truckload minimum class rates without first being granted ample opportunity to develop and introduce rebuttal evidence. It was obvious at this juncture of the proceeding that receipt of additional evidence and continued protracted crossexamination, relative to the staff's full-scale cost and rate proposals, would not resolve the overall dichotomy existing between the staff, on the one hand, and shipper and carrier representatives, on the other hand. There was, however, common agreement among all parties over the desirability and immediate need for completing the classification changeover from the present interim NMFC A-10 (Cal) to the National Motor Freight Classification proper as the governing classification for the statewide minimum class rate structure. In order to bring this proceeding to at least partial fruition, a motion presented by the Director of Traffic, Fibreboard Corporation, with the support of shippers and the California Trucking Association, was granted on July 25, 1967 with minor modifications. The motion, as approved, restricted the receipt of further evidence to the following issues: 1. Changes which are inherently required to effect a cancellation of NMFC A-10 (Cal); provide a class-rate structure compatible with the ratings prescribed in NMFC A-10, which will result in a minimum of change in freight charges presently paid by shippers and collected by carriers under the established provisions of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. 2. The development and subsequent presentation of an alternate staff rate proposal, for the consideration of interested -11C.5432 OSH 8-31-65
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parties and the Commission, necessary to accomplish the objectives enumerated in paragraph 1 above, and which is necessary and inherent in implementing cancellation of NMFC A-10 (Cal) but does not incorporate tariff changes other than technically required.

In view of the classification transition program noted

In view of the classification transition program noted above, interested parties were instructed that, upon receipt of the staff's alternate rate proposal for their advance review and prior to further adjourned hearings, they should give it consideration and be prepared to submit evidence in support of any desired exceptions to NMFC A-10.

The sought publication of an exception rating on a permanent basis would, of course, require conclusive evidence that the transportation characteristics or conditions in California intrastate traffic of the item in question are different than elsewhere, or that their characteristics are similar to many other articles presently enjoying the sought rating (Decision No. 65639 of July 2, 1963, 61 Cal P.U.C. 162). If the parties desire only temporary relief, it was generally understood that a prima facie case of "undue hardship" would at least have to be established in order to merit favorable consideration of (1) a temporary retention of current class ratings, redesignated as exceptions to the NMFC A-10 ratings; or (2) a temporary sought publication of any new and different exceptions to the ratings prescribed in NMFC A-10. Such interim relief, if authorized, contemplates that the parties involved would be prepared to introduce evidence in full support of any sought continuance of said interim relief.

In granting the motion to consider only the classification issues involved, it was understood that the Commission would provide

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a program for the receipt of evidence concerning the ultimate disposition of matters involved in this proceeding not resolved or otherwise terminated by the Commission's order herein.

Alternate Rate Proposal

The Commission staff, on or about December 27, 1967, distributed to approximately 700 interested parties a report (Exhibit No. 62) containing class-rate scales, redesignated classification and exception ratings, and related tariff amendments.

Under the alternate rate proposal the present Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 class rates have been restated in terms of the NMFC A-10 to the extent practicable. To provide rates for the increased number of ratings in NMFC A-10, additional class-rate scales were computed through the process of interpolation. Proposed Class 100 rate scales are the same as the current First Class rates named in the tariff. Proposed Class 85 and Class 70 rate scales are the same as the present Second and Third Class rate scales, respectively. Class 55 rates are the same as the current Fourth Class rates. Classes 45 and 35 scales of rates are proposed at the level of the established Class A and Fifth Class truckload rate scales, respectively. The current minimum truckload rate scales for Classes B, C, D and E (including the existing ratings for which said rate scales are applicable) have been retained as exceptions to the proposed governing NMFC A-10, and have been redesignated as Classes 35.2, 35.3, 35.4 and 35.5 rate scales, respectively. A Class 35.1 rate scale is suggested for existing less-truckload rates resulting from the application of the present 90 percent of Fourth

Class exception rating. A comparison of the present and proposed redesignated class ratings is set forth in the table below:

The traffic flow study indicates that 73 percent of the statewide truckload class-rated traffic would be subject to NMFC A-10 Class 35 rating. The was not feasible to make a direct conversion from the existing multiple truckload rate scales (Classes B, C, D and E) to any single corresponding NMFC A-10 rating and, at the same time, preserve the level and general character of the established truckload rate scales. Therefore, the staff recommends

C.5432 OSH 8-31-65 C.7858 OSH 10-5-65 NB that a new Section 2-A be published in Exception Ratings Tariff No. 1, wherein all articles currently subject to truckload ratings B through E, inclusive, be identified by NMFC A-10 item numbers, together with the present applicable ratings, redesignated as shown in Table 2 hereof. The staff conducted a comprehensive analysis as to the estimated effect its alternate rate proposal would have upon carrier revenues from Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 class-rated traffic (Exhibit No. 63). A summary of the staff analysis, based upon its traffic flow study, is as follows: TABLE 3 Estimated Percentage Change in Carrier Revenues
Resulting under the Commission Staff's Alternate Rate Proposal Type of Traffic Percent of Change Less-truckload class rate traffic - 0.10 Truckload class-rate traffic + 0.67It will be noted from Table 3 above that the alternate rate proposal is expected to have no appreciable effect upon carrier revenues earned under Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 class-rated traffic. The alternate rate proposal would provide a vehicle for the immediate classification changeover to NMFC A-10 with but a minimum of change in the level of the present class rates. Such contemplated action met with the general approval of all interested carrier and shipper representatives. The California Trucking Association conducted a rather exhaustive review of the staff's alternate rate proposal. As a result thereof, it submitted a number of suggested corrections, modifications and technical revisions in the staff's recommended -15-

classification transition program for the adoption of National Motor Freight Classification A-10 as the governing classification for Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. The witness for the trucking association explained that the suggested changes were intended to bring the staff's alternate rate proposal into closer alignment with the announced objectives underlying the Commission's approval to consider separately the limited issues involved in the contemplated classification changeover. The staff had no fundamental objections to the suggested modifications and technical revisions and were in general agreement with the recommended corrections to its alternate rate proposal. While the suggestion that the staff's proposed NMFC A-10 less-truckload rate scale for Class 35.1 (currently 90% of Fourth Class) be published together with other less-truckload rate scales, in lieu of being aligned with the truckload rates, has merit, the rationale for such an amendment is best served if the 90 percent of Fourth Class rate scale is redesignated as Class 50.1 (90% of Class 55, the converted Fourth Class rating). Such action would require a renumbering of the proposed ratings as follows:

The general level of the alternate rate proposal has been found previously to be just, reasonable and nondiscriminatory (Decision No. 73816). The alternate proposal of the staff is fully responsive to the Commission's July 25, 1967 ruling and, if authorized, would achieve the desired objective, viz., the adoption of NMFC A-10 as the governing classification for Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2.

National Motor Freight Classification

In the interest of clarity a historical resume of the National Motor Freight Classification, as it relates to the Commission's statewide minimum rate program, is hereinafter set forth.

National Motor Freight Traffic Association, Inc., a non-profit corporation consisting of common carriers of property, is the agent and publisher of the National Motor Freight Classification (NMFC). The Association appoints a National Classification Committee to consider and prescribe the ratings and rules, and to publish the provisions of the NMFC. The National Classification Board consisting of a fixed number of employees of the Association, considers all proposals for changes in the Classification. Rules of Procedure of the Board call for the filing of proposals by shippers or carriers and public hearings thereon in locations throughout the United States. Appeals to the full Classification Committee may be filed relative to the disposition taken by the Board within thirty days after notice of such disposition.

The Chairman of the National Classification Board testified (Decision No. 68324, 1964, 63 Cal P.U.C. 728) relative to the facilities and criteria utilized by the Board in its disposition of requests for classification changes. He alluded to the extensive library available to the Board, which contains a vast fund of technical information relative to the transportation characteristics of literally thousands of articles. Reference was made to the general expertise of the Board members relative to classification matters and the fund of knowledge represented by the National Classification Committee, composed of representatives from all parts of the United States and Canada. The Chairman stated that, among

others, density and value were the two major classification factors. (The witness also referred to such factors as liability, damage, fragility, hazard, package requirements, shipping characteristics, stow-ability, risk, competition, volume and cost of service.) The Chairman explained that, while there was no precise formula to relate class ratings with density of articles, the following density ranges were used as a guide:

The National Motor Freight Classification is widely used by highway carriers throughout the United States. Its adoption as the governing classification for the Commission's statewide minimum class-rate structure was first considered in Decision No. 46022, 1951 (51 Cal P.U.C. 3). At that time it was decided to retain the then governing rail-oriented Western Classification which was also being used by the western railroads. Adoption of the NMFC at this time would not obviate the continued use of the Western Classification by highway carriers when computing competitive rail carload rates. Secondly, the Interstate Commerce Commission had a nationwide classification study underway in its Docket No. 28310, Consolidated Freight Classification, and it was generally agreed that "the revision of interstate ratings would require further consideration of the ratings for California intrastate traffic and that in the circumstances extensive changes ... were not warranted."

Pending completion of staff full-scale cost and rate studies (ultimately introduced in the instant proceeding), the Commission, by its <u>Decision No. 66268</u>, 1963, (61 Cal P.U.C. 655), adopted National Motor Freight Classification A-7 (Cal) Supplement to National Motor Freight Classification A-7 (presently NMFC A-10 (Cal) and NMFC A-10, respectively) as the governing classification for Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. The adopted NMFC A-7 California Supplement replaced Western Classification No. 78 and contains, for each item named in National Motor Freight Classification A-7, lesstruckload and truckload ratings (as prescribed in the former governing Western Classification No. 78) to be used in lieu of those named in the classification proper. The Commission stated, in Decision No. 66268, that steps would be taken to eliminate the California Supplement and alluded to a system of transition from one classification to the other, worked out jointly by shippers and carriers, so as to cause a minimum effect upon established shipping practices.

By <u>Decision No. 70771, 1966</u> (65 Cal P.U.C. 601) the Commission removed the final obstacle, referred to in Decision No. 46022, precluding adoption of the National Motor Freight Classification. The former decision authorized the western railroads to cancel their California intrastate class rates set forth in Pacific Southcoast Freight Bureau Tariff No. 255-G and to cancel their participation in Western Classification No. 78 and Pacific Southcoast Freight Bureau Exception Sheet No. 1-S. Concurrently, the rail lines were authorized to establish, on all California intrastate rail traffic, the class rates named in Pacific Southcoast Freight

C.5432 OSH 8-31-65 C.7858 OSH 10-5-65 NB Bureau Tariff No. 1016, which is governed by the rail lines' Uniform Freight Classification.8 The partial adoption of the National Motor Freight Classification by Decision No. 66268 and the finding therein that the class rates resulting from the application of the ratings in NMFC A-7 (Cal) were just, reasonable and nondiscriminatory, activated a course of Commission action designed to culminate in the adoption of the classification ratings set forth in the National Motor Freight Classification proper. The only question then remaining was the appropriate methodology to employ in the desired classification changeover. The staff's alternate rate proposal contains such a method for completing the transition over to the current National Motor Freight Classification A-10 as the governing classification for Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. It has been demonstrated that the staff's alternate rate proposal will have no appreciable effect upon carrier revenues and the related transportation cost burden of the shippers. In this particular instance, the staff recommendations have the general support of both shippers and carriers. Their approval, subject to certain shipper and carrier suggested amendments, will achieve a major objective of this proceeding. Exception Ratings Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 and Exception Ratings Tariff No. 1 contain exception ratings which apply in lieu of the otherwise Tariff No. 1016 class-rate scales are generally on the level prescribed by the Interstate Commerce Commission for application within the Mountain Pacific Territory in I.C.C. Docket No. 30416 (a subsequent and related case to I.C.C. Dockets Nos. 28300 and 28310) which was a part of the Commission's nationwide class-rate study previously referred to herein. -20-

applicable ratings named in the governing classification, NMFC A-10 (Cal). Such exceptions constitute deviations from the historic Western Classification. The established exceptions are founded upon the premise that the transportation characteristics or conditions in California intrastate traffic for the various articles involved differ materially from those experienced elsewhere and observed as the norm in the governing classification, or, alternatively, are substantially similar to the transportation characteristics or conditions of other articles currently enjoying such ratings (Decision No. 65639, 1963, 61 Cal. P.U.C. 162). Therefore, it follows that when, as in the case now before us, a transition from one governing classification to another is contemplated, the exceptions to the original classification are automatically placed in jeopardy, insofar as their future retention as just and reasonable exceptions to the new governing classification is concerned.

Adoption of National Motor Freight Classification A-10 ultimately (if not concurrently) requires that either the established exceptions to NMFC A-10 (Cal) be canceled or their retention and redesignation as exceptions to NMFC A-10 proper be fully justified. Such action is, of course, in addition to the like justification required for any new exceptions that may be sought to the otherwise applicable ratings in NMFC A-10.

The staff alternate rate proposal restates the current exception ratings in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 and Exception Ratings Tariff No. 1 in terms of the corresponding class ratings set forth in National Motor Freight Classification A-10. Such conversion was accomplished as directly as practicable under the circumstances and with a modicum of change in the resulting level of the present minimum class rates. While it was not specifically urged that the

exception ratings be authorized as a temporary bridge to overcome problems involved in the final classification changeover to NMFC A-10, the evidence will only support a finding that such exceptions be authorized on a temporary basis. The California Trucking Association recommends that any shipper or carrier request for exception ratings to be authorized at this time be made subject to an expiration date of December 31, 1969. This would allow the parties ample time to develop the required evidence to support a sought continuance of any exception ratings that may be authorized herein, including such other exception ratings that may be desired in lieu of the otherwise applicable ratings named in the governing classification.

In response to the Commission's invitation, the California Trucking Association and a number of shippers submitted requests for (1) the retention of certain existing class ratings, redesignated to conform with like items named in NMFC A-10; and (2) the establishment of new ratings as exceptions to the proposed otherwise applicable ratings named in NMFC A-10.

The California Trucking Association requests that the present class ratings, restated to correspond with the like ratings named in NMFC A-10, be retained temporarily as exceptions to said classification for the following articles: (1) Paper Articles; (2) Bags; (3) Plastic or Rubber Articles (Tires and Related Items); (4) Acids; and (5) Chemicals. The witness, on behalf of the trucking association, explained that it desired to retain certain existing classification ratings, which are higher than the corresponding NMFC A-10 ratings, for the purpose of maintaining carriers' revenue balance by offsetting shippers' sought retention of selected current ratings which are lower than the like ratings named in NMFC A-10. The sought retention of existing class ratings for

Acids and Chemicals is predicated upon the trucking association's desire to maintain the status quo pending completion of an evaluation study of certain classification factors pertaining to shipments of various acids and chemicals.

Relatively few shippers sought relief from the adoption of NMFC A-10 as recommended in the staff's alternate rate proposal. The majority of shipper requests for the retention or establishment of lower class ratings than would otherwise apply under NMFC A-10 centered around the so-called light and bulky articles, where the impact of the upward adjustments in class ratings resulting from the proposed adoption of NMFC A-10 would be greater than in other areas of higher density commodities. 9 With respect to Furniture and Related Articles, the Commission by its Decision No. 74150, of May 21, 1968, in Case No. 5432 (Petition for Modification No. 498, et al.) authorized, among other matters, its Exception Ratings Tariff No. 1 to be amended so as to provide that updated commodity descriptions for Furniture and Related Articles, as currently described in NMFC A-10, be made subject to exception ratings which, in general, are the same as currently applicable in the governing NMFC A-10 (Cal). Such action, for the most part, granted the relief initially sought herein by the Furniture Manufacturers Association of California (Exhibit No. 75, Amended). All that now remains of such original request is the restatement of the exception ratings authorized in the aforesaid decision to conform with the like ratings named in NMFC A-10.

⁹ The shippers' sought relief included ratings on Building Metal Work; Sheat Steel Articles; Pads, Sanitary; Facial Tissue; Air Coolers; Pot Scourers; Cooked Cereal Food Preparations; Cartons, Egg, Molded Pulp; and Furniture and Related Articles.

In the main, the testimony of various interested shippers presented a plausible case of temporary "undue hardship", under the contemplated classification transition program, to merit favorable consideration of their requests to withhold the proposed application of NMFC A-10 ratings to their particular commodities so as to afford the shippers involved additional time to study and make whatever adjustments in their shipping practices are deemed necessary under said proposed classification. It is equally clear that the trucking association's suggested postponement of the application of certain NMFC A-10 ratings to maintain the carriers' so-called "revenue balance" is similarly justified as a counter measure to the shippers' efforts to delay the proposed application of certain NMFC A-10 ratings which, if permitted to become effective, would be to the obvious advantage of the highway carriers.

The relief sought by both shippers and carriers is within the framework of the Commission's classification transition program only to the extent such relief is for the purpose of obtaining more time for the parties to further evaluate the relationships between certain NMFC A-10 ratings and such rating factors as (1) the cost of service; (2) the shippers' transportation cost burden; and (3) the marketing and shipping practices of a given commercial firm, industry or product. On the other hand, it should be made perfectly clear that there is no evidence which would even tend to support a finding that the sought exceptions to the NMFC A-10 ratings satisfy the required proof necessary to establish such exceptions as being just and reasonable per se. Such a determination is a matter for subsequent and separate determination by the Commission.

C.5432 OSH 8-31-65 C.7858 OSH 10-5-65 NB Findings We find that: 1. The program initially established by Decision No. 66268 of November 5, 1963 (61 Cal P.U.C. 655) and carried forward in this proceeding for the gradual transition from one classification to another to govern Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2, without incorporating any substantive tariff changes therein, other than technically required, should now be concluded. 2. The classification ratings and rules named in National Motor Freight Classification A-10 are appropriate to govern the minimum rates set forth in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. The classification, as developed and maintained by the National Motor Freight Traffic Association, Inc., Agent, reflects current conditions and needs of commerce in the transportation of property by highway carriers; it is administered under procedures providing fair and full opportunity for public hearing for determination of changes and revisions as required. The National Motor Freight Classification A-10 is in general use by motor carriers throughout the United States, and its adoption for use in California will promote national uniformity and standardization in billing and collecting practices. 3. The ratings and rules set forth in National Motor Freight Classification A-10 should now replace those prescribed in National Motor Freight Classification A-10 (Cal) as the governing classification for Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. 4. The increases resulting from the application of the truckoriented ratings and rules prescribed in National Motor Freight Classification A-10, in lieu of the current governing rail-oriented -25C.5432 OSH 8-31-65 C.7858 OSH 10-5-65 ratings named in National Motor Freight Classification A-10 (Cal), bave been shown to be justified. The minimum rates resulting from the application of the class ratings provided in National Motor Freight Classification A-10 are, and for the future will be, the just, reasonable and nondiscriminatory minimum rates and charges for the transportation of property by highway carriers subject to the provisions of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. 6. Common carriers, subject to the provisions of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2, should be authorized to adopt National Motor Freight Classification A-10 as their governing classification in lieu of National Motor Freight Classification A-10 (Cal). 7. The comprehensive staff cost and rate studies recommend, in addition to substantive revisions in the level of the present statewide minimum class-rate structure, broad changes in both the fundamental characteristics and scope of application of the existing minimum class-rate structure set forth in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. Such cost and rate proposals do not come within the framework of the program instituted for completing the clasification changeover from the National Motor Freight Classification's California Supplement A-10 (Cal) to said classification proper (NMFC A-10) to govern Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. 8. The comprehensive changes and revisions proposed to be made in the established provisions of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 should not be further considered at this time but deferred as separate issues for ultimate consideration and determination by the Commission. 9. The Commission's Transportation Division staff alternate rate proposal, designed to complete the adoption of National Motor -2E-

C.5432 OSH 8-31-65 C.7858 OSH 10-5-65 Freight Classification A-10 as the classification for Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 while at the same time not recommending any substantive changes in said tariff other than technically required, is fully responsive to the Commission's announced classification transition program. 10. The staff's alternate rate proposal, subject to certain corrections, modifications and additions thereto, as suggested by shipper and carrier interests, should be authorized, thereby completing the transition to National Motor Freight Classification A-10 as the governing classification for Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. 11. The classification and exception ratings, redesignated herein as exceptions to National Motor Freight Classification A-10, have been shown to be justified, for a temporary period, to the extent that they maintain a status quo or do not result in any appreciable changes in the level of rates or rules, other than technically required, presently set forth in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 and previously found to be just, reasonable and nondiscriminatory. 12. The evidence does not demonstrate whether the aforesaid temporary exceptions to the otherwise proposed classification ratings named in National Motor Freight Classification A-10 will, in fact, for the future be appropriate or otherwise justified to govern the rates named in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. 13. The exception ratings found to be justified herein should be authorized on a temporary basis; it being understood that those exception ratings authorized herein, pursuant to shipper and carrier requests therefor, shall not be continued in effect beyond December 31, 1969, unless such continuance is fully justified pursuant to the filing of a petition on or before June 1, 1969. -27C.5432 OSH 8-31-65 C.7858 OSH 10-5-65 NB 14. To the extent sought exceptions to the ratings and rules named in National Motor Freight Classification A-10 have not been adopted herein, such requested exceptions have not been shown to be justified. 15. The increases attributable to the application of the staff's alternate rate proposal, as amended herein, have been shown to be fully justified; and the resulting increased rates and charges established by the order which follows are the just, reasonable and nondiscriminatory minimum rates and charges for the transportation governed thereby. 16. To the extent that the provisions of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 have been found heretofore to constitute reasonable minimum rates and rules for common carriers, as defined in the Public Utilities Act, said provisions, as hereinafter adjusted, are, and will be reasonable minimum rate provisions for said common carriers. To the extent that the existing rates and charges of said common carriers for the transportation involved are less in volume or effect than the minimum rates and charges herein designated as reasonable for said carriers, to the same extent the rates and charges of said carriers are hereby found to be, now and for the future, unreasonable, insufficient, and not justified by the actual competitive rates of competing carriers or by the costs of other means of transportation. 17. Common carriers should be authorized to make corresponding changes in their rates for the transportation of exempt commodities, commodities which are not subject to the rates in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2, to the same extent as heretofore found to be justified in those instances in which exempt commodities are -28C.5432 OSH 8-31-65 C.7858 OSH 10-5-65 NB transported at the level of the minimum class rates and under the same transportation conditions as those found applicable to transportation subject to such minimum class rates. 18. Where common carriers have been heretofore authorized to depart from the so-called long- and short-haul prohibitions of Article XII, Section 21, of the Constitution of the State of California and of Section 460 of the Public Utilities Code, such outstanding authorities should be modified to the extent necessary to carry out the effect of the order herein. Conclusions Based on the above findings, we conclude that: 1. National Motor Freight Classification A-10 should replace National Motor Freight Classification A-10 (Cal) as the governing classification for Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. 2. The classification ratings and rules named in National Motor Freight Classification A-10, except to the extent that said ratings and rules are different from and are superseded by authorized exceptions thereto contained in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 and Exception Ratings Tariff No. 1, should be adopted and approved to govern the rates and charges established by the Commission in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. 3. The staff's alternate rate proposal, as amended herein, should be authorized in order to complete the Commission's planned transition to National Motor Freight Classification A-10 as the governing classification for Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. 4. The rates, rules and charges resulting from the application of the ratings and rules named in National Motor Freight Classification A-10, including the exceptions to be authorized thereto, -29C.5432 OSH 8-31-65 C.7858 OSH 10-5-65 NB are, and will be the just, reasonable and nondiscriminatory minimum rates, rules and charges for the statewide transportation of property by highway carriers subject to the provisions of Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. The procedure to be observed for the ultimate disposition of matters deferred herein shall be as follows: 1. Exceptions to National Motor Freight Classification A-10 The Commission's Transportation Division staff shall, on or before December 31, 1969, be prepared to present at formal public hearing recommendations, together with complete evidence in support thereof, concerning the final disposition of those existing exception ratings named in Min-imum Rate Tariff No. 2 and Exceptions Ratings Tariff No. 1 which have been temporarily redesignated herein as exceptions to NMFC A-10. Public hearings to be set upon the filing of petitions therefor on or before June 1 1969 concerning the classification ratings which have been restated as exceptions to NMFC A-10 pursuant to requests from shipper and carrier interests, subject to an expiration date. Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 Class and Commodity Rates, Rules and Charges Public hearings to be set upon request pertaining to the minimum class and commodity rate structure. b. Tariff rules may be combined with 2.a above. INTERIM ORDER IT IS ORDERED that: The ratings and rules contained in National Motor Freight Classification A-10, as amended, are hereby approved and adopted to become effective September 1, 1968, as the just, reasonable and nondiscriminatory ratings and rules to govern the minimum rates and rules promulgated by the Commission in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2; and concurrently, National Motor Freight Classification A-10, as -30C.5432 OSH 8-31-65 C.7858 OSH 10-5-65 amended, will supersede National Motor Freight Classification A-10 (Cal), as amended, as the governing classification for said Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2. 2. The National Motor Freight Traffic Association, Inc., Agent, is hereby authorized to publish, on behalf of the common carriers participating in National Motor Freight Classification A-10 (Cal), as amended, the classification ratings and rules set forth in National Motor Freight Classification A-10, as amended. 3. Common carriers participating in National Motor Freight Classification A-10 (Cal), as amended, are hereby authorized to cancel their participation in said classification effective concurrently with their adoption of National Motor Freight Classification A-10, as amended. 4. Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 (Appendix D to Decision No. 31606, as amended) is further amended by incorporating therein, to become effective September 1, 1968, the revised pages attached hereto and listed in Appendix B, also attached hereto, which pages and appendix by this reference are made a part hereof. 5. Exception Ratings Tariff No. 1 (Appendix A to Decision No. 66195, as amended) is further amended by incorporating therein, to become effective September 1, 1968, the revised pages attached hereto and listed in Appendix C, also attached hereto, which pages and appendix by this reference are made a part hereof. 6. Common carriers subject to the Public Utilities Act, to the extent that they are subject also to Decision No. 31606, as amended, and Decision No. 66195, as amended, are hereby directed to establish in their tariffs the increases necessary to conform with the further adjustments herein of the aforesaid decisions. -31C.5432 OSH 8-31-65 C.7858 OSA 10-5-65 NB 7. Any provisions concurrently maintained in common carrier tariffs which are more restrictive than, or which produce charges greater than, those contained in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2, are authorized to be maintained in connection with the class ratings, rates and rules authorized and directed to be established herein. Carriers maintaining exception ratings expressed. as a percent of a basic classification rating, and no specific conversion of such combined exception rating factor has been provided by the order herein, are hereby authorized to apply the same percentage rating factor to the aforementioned basic classification rating, as redesignated herein, for purposes of rate determination. 9. Except as otherwise provided in ordering paragraphs 7 and 8 hereof, common carriers are not to publish ratings and rules which are different from, and are superseded by, the exceptions authorized herein and set forth in Minimum Rate Tariff No. 2 and Exception Ratings Tariff No. 1. 10. The class rates, ratings and rules authorized and directed to be established by ordering paragraphs 3 and 6 hereof are authorized to be made applicable also for the transportation of: Commodities for which minimum rates have not been established, or Commodities which are subject to higher rates than, or more restrictive provisions than, the minimum rates or provisions otherwise applicable. 11. Tariff publications resulting in increases required or authorized to be made by common carriers as a result of the order herein shall be filed not earlier than the effective date of this order and may be made effective not earlier than September 1, 1968, on not less then ten days' notice to the Commission and to the -32C.5432 OSH 8-31-65 C.7858 OSH 10-5-65 NB public: such tariff publications as are required shall be made effective not later than September 1, 1968; as to increases which are authorized but not required, the authority herein granted shall expire unless exercised within sixty days after the effective date of this order; and tariff publications resulting in reductions may be made effective not earlier than September 1, 1968, on not less than ten days' notice to the Commission and to the public if filed not later than sixty days after the effective date of the minimum rate tariff pages incorporated in this order. 12. Common carriers, in establishing and maintaining the rates authorized hereinabove, are hereby authorized to depart from the provisions of Section 460 of the Public Utilities Code to the extent necessary to adjust long- and short-haul departures now maintained under outstanding authorizations; such outstanding authorizations are hereby modified only to the extent necessary to comply with this order; and schedules containing the rates published under this authority shall make reference to the prior orders authorizing long- and short-haul departures and to this order. 13. Common carriers are hereby authorized to depart from the tariff filing requirements of the Commission's General Orders to the extent necessary to publish tariff changes authorized or required to be made by the order contained herein. 14. The ratings and rules established herein pursuant to requests received from shippers and carriers as exceptions to the classification ratings and rules prescribed in National Motor Freight Classification A-10 shall be made subject to an expiration date of December 31, 1969. -33-

15. In all other respects said Decision No. 31606, as amended, and Decision No. 66195, as amended, shall remain in full force and effect. The effective date of this order shall be July 15, 1968.
