INTERIM OPINION

By petition filed July 13, 1970, California Builders
Council (Builders), an interested party in this proceeding, seeks
an order of the Commission reversing certain rulings of the presiding examiner. Answers to the motion have been filed by respondents San Diego Gas & Electric Company, Southern California Edison
Company and Pacific Gas and Electric Company.

Questions and Data Requests

Builders submitted numerous questions and data requests to the major electric utilities who are respondents herein. The presiding examiner sustained objections by the utilities to some of the questions and denied portions of Builders' request that the utilities be directed to develop and submit voluminous data related to three questionnaires prepared by Builders.

Builders contends that replies to certain questions on which objections were sustained and that data replies to its Residential Tract Questionnaire are pertinent to this proceeding

primarily because (1) the scope of the proceeding was enlarged by the Commission on February 20, 1970 to include consideration of the mandatory nature of underground extension rules, including those for residential subdivisions, and (2) Decision No. 77187, dated May 5, 1970, which made undergrounding mandatory (with certain stated exceptions) for all new residential subdivisions, includes only an interim order. As we pointed out in Decision No. 77187, interpretations of the provisions of the present underground rule for residential subdivisions are not at issue in this proceeding. If the rule is applied in a discriminatory manner, as suggested by some developers, appropriate relief can be sought by a formal complaint. Further, the order in that decision was "interim" only in the sense that the issue of the mandatory aspect of underground extension rules for new residential subdivisions was disposed of prior to submission of the entire proceeding. No final order is needed to confirm the interim order, but only to dispose of remaining issues.

Builders contends that data and replies to its Commercial Tract Questionnaire and Industrial Tract Questionnaire are necessary to a proper resolution of the issues raised in this proceeding. We do not agree. The record already is quite complete on possible inconsistencies and ambiguities in the rules proposed by the utilities. Builders has been given ample opportunity to suggest clarifying or modifying language to be adopted in underground rules for commercial and industrial developments and has declined to do so. Builders indicates it may make such suggestions in its brief at the conclusion of the hearings.

Finding and Conclusion

The Commission finds that California Builders Council has not shown any cause to reverse the rulings of the presiding examiner as requested in the petition. The Commission concludes that the petition should be denied.

INTERIM ORDER

IT IS ORDERED that the petition filed June 13, 1970 by California Builders Council is denied.
