## SUEELEVENTAL OPINION AMD OROER

Desext Express and Western Gllette, Inc. seek authority to merge, and for the former to transfer its highway comon carrier certificate of public convenience and necessity to the latter. In addition, the surviving corporation requests this Comission to restate said certificate.

By Decision NO. 78839 dated June 22, 1971, the Commission stated that the Interstate Comerce Comission had exclusive and plenary jurisdiction to authorize applicants to merge, and that after the merger consideration would be given to authorization for transfer of the certificate.

Applicants are California corporations operating as certificated and permitted carriers under the jurisdiction of this comonssion. In addition, they operate wnder the jurisdiction of
the Interstate Comerce Comission. The application shows that since November 30, 1970, Desert Express bas becn a wholiy owned subsidlary of Western Gillette, Inc., and by a subsequent filing that the Interstate Comerce Comission, Review Joard Nuber 5 in Docket No. MC-F-III88, dated September 21, 1971 authorized the merger.

In compliance with Decision No. 78839, dated June 22, 1971, Westem Gillette, Inc. has filed with the Compission a certified copy of the document filed with the Califomia Secretary of State effecting the mergex, together with a copy of the order of the Interstate Comerce Comission authorizing the mergex.

After consiaeration the Comission fincs that the proposed transfer would not be adverse to the public interest and concludes that it should be authorized. A public hearing is not necessery. The order which follows will provide for the revocation of the certificates presently held by applicants and the issuance of a certificate in appondir form to western Giliette, Inc.

Western Gillette, Inc. is hereby placed on notice that operative rights, as such, do not constitute a class of property which may be capitalized or used as an element of value in rate fixing for any amome of money in excess of that originaliy paic to the State as the consideration for the grant of such rights. Aside from their purely permissive aspect, these rights extend to the holder a full or partial monopoly of a class of business. This monopoly feature may be modified or canceled at any time by the State, which is not in any respect limited as to the number of rights which may be given.

II IS ORDERED that:

1. On or before September 2, 1972 Desert Express may sell and transfer and western Gillette, Inc. may purchase and acquire the operative rights referred to in the application.
2. Certificates of public convenience and necessity are hereby granted to Westem Gillette. Inc. authorizing it to opezace as a hl fhwey commor carilex and a petroleum liregular roure cerrier, as defined in Sections 213 and 214 respectiveiy, of tixe jublic Ütilitles Cocie, between the points and ovez the routes set forth in Appencices of through in attacined hereto and mede a part hereof.
3. Westem olilette, Inc. shail amend of reissuc the tariffs on file with the Cownission, maxing rates and rules governing the bighway comon carrier operations herein to show that it has adopted or established, as its own, said rates and rules. The tariff filings shali be made effective not eariiex than five days after the effective date of this order on not less than five days" notice to the Comission and the public, and the effective date of the taxiff filings shall be concurrent with the effective date of the transfer herein authorized. The tariff filings made pursuant to this order shall comply in all respects with the regulations goveming the constriction and filing of tariffs set forth in the Comission's General Order No. 80-A. Failure to comply with and observe the provisions of General Jrder No. 80-A may result in cancellation of the operating authority granted by this decision.
4. The certificate of pubilc convenience and necessity granted in paragraph 2 of this order shali supersede the certificates of public convenience and necessity granted by:

The above certificates are revoked concurrently with the effective date of the tariff filings required by paragraph 3 hereof.
5. On or before the end of the third month after the consumation of said transfer, Western Giilette, Inc. shall cause to be filed with the Comission, in such form as it may prescribe, an annul report of the operations of Desert Express covering the
period commencing with the first day of the current year to and including the effective date of the transfer herein authorized. 6. Within thirty days after the transfer herein authorized is consummated, Western Gillette, Inc. shall file a written acceptance of the certificates. Western Gillette, Inc. is placed on notice that, if it accepts such certificates, it will be required, among other tidings, to comply with and observe the safety rules of the California Highway Patrol and the insurance requirements of the Compulsion's General Order No. 100-Series.
7. Wester Gillette, Inc. shall maintain its accounting records on a calendar year basis in conformance with the applicable Uniform System of Accounts or Chart of Accounts as prescribed or adopted by this Compulsion and shall file with the Commission, on or before March 31 of each year, an annual report of its operations in such form, content, and number of copies as the Commission, from time to time, shall prescribe.
8. Western Gillette, Inc. shall comply with the requirements of the Commission's General Order No. 84-Serles for the transpotation of collect on delivery shipments. If purchaser elects not to transport collect on delivery shipments, it shall make the approprimate tariff filings as required by the General Order.

The effective date of this order shall be twenty days after the date hereof.

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3. Liquids, compressed gases, commodities in semiplastic form and commodifies in suspension in liquids in bulk, in tank trucks, tank trailers, tank semitrailers or a combination of such highway vehicles.
