## SUPPLEMENTAL OPINION AND ORDER

Consolidated Freightways Corporation of Delaware previousiy requested authority to sell and transfer, and CF Iank Iines, Inc. requested authority to purchase and acquire, certificates of public convenience and necessity authorizing the transportation of petroleum and petroleum products, in bulk, and specified comodities between points and places within the State. In addition, the carriers requested this Commission to restate said certificates.

By Decision No. 79524, dated December 21, 1971 in this proceeding, the Commission authorized the salc and transfer of the operative rights and property referred to in the application but did not restate the certificate.

The order which follows will restate the operative rights and will provice for the revocation of the certificates presently held by applicant Consolidated Freightways Corporation of Delaware and the issuance of certificates in appendix fom to Consolidated Freightways Corporation of Delaware and CF Tank Lines, Inc. A public hearing is not necessary.

Consolidated Freightways Corporation of Delaware and CF Tank Lines, Inc. arc hereby placed on notice that operative rights, as such, do not constitute a class of property which may be capitalized or used as an element of value in rate fixing for any amount of money in excess of that omiginally paid to the State as the consideration for the grant of such rights. Aside from their purely permissive aspect, these rights extend to the holder a full or partial monopoly of a class of business. This monopoly feature may be modified or canceled at any time by the State, which is not in any respect limited as to the number of rights which may be given.

IT IS ORDERED that:
2. A certificate of public convenience and necessity is hereby granted to Consolidated Freightways Corporation of Delaware authorizing. it to operate as a mighway common carrier, as defined in Section 213 of the Public Utilities Code, between the points set forth in Appeadix A, attached hereto and made a part hercof.
2. A certificate of public convenience and necessity is hereby sranted to CF Tank Lines, Inc. authorizing it to operate as a highway common carrier and a petrolew irregular route carrier, as defined in Sections 213 and 214 of the public Utilities Code, between the points set forth in Appendices B and C attached hereto and made a. part herecf.
3. The certificates of public convenience and necessity granted in paragraphs 1 and 2 of this order supersede 212 existing certificates of public convenience and necessity authorizing the transportation of general commodities and petroleum or petroleum products heretofore granted to or acquired by Consolidated Freightways Corporation of Delaware, and presently possessed by $i t$, which certificates, together with all prescriptive rights, are hereby revoked, said revocation to become effective concurrently with the effective date of the tariff filings required by ordering paragraph 3 of Decision No. 79524.
4. The authority revoked by paragraph 3 of this order includes but is not limited to 211 prescriptive rights and the rights granted by Decision Nos. 45783, 51515, 52469, 55851, 56740, 58545, 59100, 60023, $63349,66064,69813$ and 76467.
S. In all other respects Ordering Paragraphs 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 of Decision No. 79524, dated December 21, 1971 in this proceeding are still in effect.

The effective date of this order shall be twenty days after the date hereof.
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Commission as Moran. being iocessarily absent, did not participate in tho disposition of this procooding.

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Consolidated Freightways Coxporation of Delaware, a corporation, by the certificate of puolic convenience and necessity granted by the decision noted in the margin, is authorized to conduct operations as a highway common carrier, as defined in Section 213 of the Public Utilities Code, for the transportation of general comodities, EXCEPT used household goods and personal effects, comodities in julk, in tank, dump or hopper type vehicles, motor vehicles or trailer coaches in truckaway or towaway service, livestock, comodities requiring refrigeration or temperature control, comodities requiring mixing in transit, fresh fruits and vegetables, logs, axticles of unusual value, class A explosives as defined by the J.S. Department of Twansportation, commodities requiring special equipment, and those injurious or contaminating to other lading, as follows:

1. Between the San Francisco Territory as described below and the Los Angeles Basin Territory as described Jelow over any and all routes.
2. Service over the following routes is authorized to and from all intemediate and off-route points within 10 miles of the below-deserined routes:
a. Between the San Francisco Territory and Santa Rosa: From San Francisco over U.S. Highway 101 to Santa Rosa and return over the same route.

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b. Between the San Francisco Territory and Sacramento:

From Sar Francisco over U.S. Highway 50 to Oakland, thence over State Highway 24 to Walnut Creels, thence ovex State Highway 21 to junction State Highway 4, thence over State Fighway 4 to junction State Highway 160 (near Oakley), thence over State Highway 160 (formerly State Highway 24) to Sacramento and return over the same route.
C. Between Castro Valley and junction State Eighway 266 with State Highway 99 (foxmerly U.S. Eighway 99):

From Castro Valley over U.S. Highway 59 to junction State Eighway 33 (near Tracy), thence over State Highway 33 to Maricopa, thence ovex State kighway 166 (formerly portion State Eighway 33) to junction State Eighway 99 (formerly J.S. Highway 99) and retuin over the same route.
a. Between Stockton and Contra Costa County Road J4:

From Stockton over State Zighway 4 to junction Contra Costa County Road J4 (formexly unnamed highway) and return over the same route.
e. Between junction State Eighways 33 and 152 ( 10 miles west of ios Banos) and Gilroy:

From junction State Eighways 33 and 252 ( 10 miles west of Los Banos) over State Eighway 152 to Gilroy and return over the same route.
f. Between Gilroy and Salinas:

From Gilroy over U.S. Highway 101 to Salinas and return over the same route.
5. Between Camel and Santa Cruz:

From Carmel over State Highway 1 to Santa Cinuz and return over the same noute.

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h. Between Santa Cruz and San Francisco:

From Santa Cruz over State Eighway 17 to San Jose, thence over State Elighway 32 (Formerly U.S. Highway 101.) to San Francisco and return over the same route.
3. Between San Francisco Territory and junction San Joaquin County Road J4 (near Tracy), and U.S. Highway 50, serving all intermediate and off-route points within 5 miles of the following routc:

From San Francisco over Interstate Eighway 30 (formerly U.S. Eignway 40) to junction State Highway 4. (near Eercules), thence over State Eighway 4 to junction San Joaquin County Road J4 (near Bryon), thence over San Joaquin County Road 84 to junction U.S. Highway 50 and return over the same route.
4. Between San Francisco Territory and Sacramento, serving all intermediate and off-route points within 20 miles of the following route:

From San Francisco over Interstate Highway 30 (formerly U.S. Highway 40) to Sacramento and return over the same route.
5. Between Los Angeles Basin Territory and Sacramento, serving all intemediate and off-route points within 25 miles of the following route:

From Los Angeles Basin Territory over Interstate Eigkway 5 to junction State Eighway 99 (formeriy U.S. Highway 99), thence over State Hishway 99 to Sacramento and return over the same route.
6. Between Los Angeles Basin Territory and the CaliformiaMexico Border Line, serving all points in the San Diego Territory, as described below and serving all intermediate and off-route points within 10 miles of the following routes:
a. From Los Angeles Basin Territory over Interstate Highway 5 (formerly U.S. Highway 102) to CaliformiaMexico Boxder Iine and return over the same route;

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D. From Ios Angeles Basin Territory over State Eighway 60 (fommerly U.S. Highway 50) to Riverside, thence over U.S. Highway 395 to San Diego, thence over Interstate Hignway 5 to California-Mexico Border Line and return over the same route.
7. Between Los Angeles and Palm Springs, serving all intermediate and off-route points within 10 miles of the following route:

From Los Angeles over State Highway 60 (formerly U.S. Highway 60) to junction State Eighway 111 (near white Water), thence over State Highway 111 to Palm Springs and return over the same route.
8. Between Los Angeles Territory and other points and places in Los Angeles Basin Territory and locally between other points and places in Los Angeles Basin Territory.
9. Between all points and places in the San Francisco-East Bay Cartage Zone, as described below.
10. Between Crescent City and California-Oregon State Iine via U.S. Highway 101 and intermediate points.
11. Between Orange and Los Angeles, serving intermediate and off-route points within 5 miles of the following routes:
a. From Orange over Interstate Highway 5 (Santa Ana Freeway) to Los Angeles and return over the same route;
b. From Orange over Interstate Highway 5. (Santa Ana Freeway) to junction State Highway 72 , thence over State Fighway 72 to Los Angeles and return over the same route.
12. Between Orange and San Bernardino, serving intermediate and off-route points within 5 miles of the following routes:

From Orange over State Highway 55 (Newport Freeway) to junction State Highway 91 (Riverside Freeway) to junction J.S. सighway 395, thence via U.S. Highway 395 (Riverside Freeway) to san Bernardino and return over the same routes.

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13. Between Orange and Pomona, serving intermediate and ofsroute points witiin 5 miles of the followins routes:

From Orange over State Eighway 55 (Newport Freeway) to junction State Highway il (Riverside Freeway), thence over Scate Highway 81 to junction State Highway 90 , thence over State Jighway 80 to junction State Highway 57 (Brea Canyon Road), thence over State Fighway 57 to pomona and return over the same routes.
14. Between Oxange, Tustin, San Diego and Long Beach, over irregular routes. Service is authorized at all points within $\hat{C}$ miles of San Diego.
15. Between Chester and the California-Nevada State Line near Peavine, including all intermediate points, via state Highway 36 and U. S. Eighway 395.
15. Between Birci Flat Schoolhouse (junction U.S. Highway 395 and unnumered Eigiway) and Herlong (Sierra ordnance Depor).
17. To, from and between any and all points situated witixin a distance of ons air mile laterally of the followins routes:
a. Eetween Chester and junction U.S. Highway 395 (Eallelujah Junction), and intermediate points, via State Eighway 35 riom Claester to junction with State Eighway 99 , thence via State Highway 85 to junction with State Zighway 70, thence over State Highway 70 to junction U.S. Eighway 395 and return over the same route.
b. Between Westwood and junction point of Plumas County Highway A-21 and State Eighway 39 , east of lake Almanor, via Lassen and plumas county Sign zoute A-21 along tine east side of Lake Almanor to junction with State Eighway 89 (near Big Meadows Dam).
C. Between Johnstomville and Alturas, and intemediate points, via U.S. Highway 395.
15. Through routes are authorizec between any and all authorized service points on routes described. Carrier may use any and all availaie streets and highways iotween the points deseribed for operating convenience oniy.

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## SAN FRANCISCO TERRITORY

San Franciseo Territory includes all the city of San jose and that arca embraced by the following boundary: Beginning at the point the San FranciscoSan Moteo County Line meets the Pacific ocean; thence easterly along soid: County Line to a point 1 mile west of State Highway 32 ; southerly along an imeginary line 1 mile west of and paralleling State Highway 32 to its intersection with Southern Pacific Company right-of-way at Arastradero Road; southeasterly along the Southern pacific Company righe-of-way to pollard Road, including industries served by the Southern pacific Company spur line extending approximately 2 miles southwest from Simla to Permanente; easterly along Poilard Road to W . Parr Avenue to Capri Drive; southerly along Capri Drive to Division Street; easterly aiong Division Street to the Southern Pacific Company right-of-way; southerly along the Southern Pacific right-of-way to the Camplelt-Los Gatos city Limits; easterly along said limits and the prolongation thereof to South Bascom Avenue (formeriy San Jose-Los Gatos Road); northeasterty along South Bascom Avenue to Foxworthy Avenue; easterly along Foxworthy Avenue to Almaden Road; southerly along Almaden Road to Hillisdale Avenue; easterly along Hillsdale Avenue to State Highway S 2 ; northwesterly along State Highway 82 to Tully Road; northeasterly along Tully foad and the prolongation thereof to White Rosd; northwesterly along white Road to Mckee Road; southwesterly along mekee Road to Capitol Avenue; northwesterly along Capitol Avenue to State Highway 230 (Oakland Road); northerly along State Highway 238 to Warm Springs; northerly along State Highway 238 (Mission Blvd.) via Mission San Jose and Niles to Hoyward; northerly along Foothill Bivd. and Mae Arthur Blvd. to Seminary Avenue; easterly along Seminary Avenue to Mountain Blvd.; northerly along Mountain Blvd. to Warren glvd. (State Highway 13); northerly along Warren Blvd. to Brosdway Terrace; westerly along Broadway Terrace to College Avenue; northerly along College Avenue to Dwight Way; easterly along Dwight Way to the Berkeley-Oakland Boundary Line; nortineri, along said boundary line to the Campus Boundary of the University of California; westerly, northerly and easterly along the campus boundary to Euclid Avenue; northerly along Euclid Avenue to Marin Avenue; westerly along Marin Avenue to Arlington Avenue; northerly along Arlington Avenue to San Pablo Avenue (State Highway 123); northerly along San Pablo Avenue to and including the city of Richmond to Point Richmond; southerly along an imaginary line from Point Richmond to the San Francisco waterfront at the foot of Market Sereet; westerly along

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said waterfront and shoreline to the Pacific Ocean; southerly along the shoreline of the Pacific Oceon to point of beginning.
SAN FRANCISCO-EAST BAY CARTAGE ZONE

The San Francisco-East Bay Cartage Zone inciudes the area embraced by the following boundary:

Beginning at the point where the San Francisco-San Mateo County Boundary Line meets the Pacific Ocean; thence easterly along said boundary line to Lake Merced Soulevard; thence southerly along said Lake Merced Boulevard to South Mayfair Avenue; thenee westerly along said South Mayfair Avenue to Crestwood Drive; thence southerly along Crestwood Drive to Southgate Avenue; thence westerly along Southgate Avenue to Moddux Drive; thence southerly and easterly along Maddux Drive to a point one mile west of State Highway 32; thence southeasterly along on imaginary line one mile wost of and paralleling State Highway 32 ( $\varepsilon l$ Camino Real) to its intersection with the southerly boundary line of the city of San Matco; thence along said boundary line to U. 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C F Tank Lines, Inc., a comporation, by the cextificate of public conventence and zecessity granted by the decision moted in the margin, fs authorized to conduct operations as a highway comon carrier, as defined in Section 213 of the Public Utilities Code, for the transportstion of petroleum products in bulk, in tank vehicles, except liquefied petroleum gases and any other petroleum products requiring pressurized tanks and except liquid asphalt and hot road oils and any other petroleum product requiring insulated taniks, as follows:

Service is authorized at all points and places located on and over the following described routes, with the right to serve all points and places Iocated laterally within a radius of 50 miles of said youter:

1. Between the California-Oregon State Line and the Califomia-Mexico Border Line;
a. From the Califormia-Orcgon State Iine, over U. S. Highway 101 to junction Interstate Highway 5, near Boyle Helghts, thence over Interstate Highway 5 to the Califomia-Mexico Border Iine, and' return over the same routes.
b. From the Califorala-Orcgom State Ine, over Interstate Highway 5 to Sacramento (also over Interstate Highway 5 to Red Bluff, thence over State Highway 99 to Sacramento), thence over U. S. Elighway 50 to Stockton, thence over State Eighway 99 to Wheeler Ridge, thence over Interstare Eighway 5 to the California-Mexico Border Inc.
2. Between Redding and Altuxas, over State Highway 299.
3. D. S. Highway 395 between the Califormia-0regon State Line and the Califormin-Nevada State Iine, via Alturas and Johnstonville.
4. State Eighway 36 between junction State Highway 99 near Red Bluff and junction J. S. Highway 395 at Johnstonville.

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5. State Highway 20 between Marysville and junction Interstate Highway 80.
6. Interstate Highway 80 between San Francisco and Califorala-Nevada State Line.
7. U. S. Highway 50 between Sacramento and Califormia-Nevada State Inne.
8. J. S. Highway 395 between Califomia-Nevada State Line at Topaz Lake and junction Intexstate Highway 15.
9. Between Ios Angeles and Needles over U. S. Kighway 66 to Barstow, thence over Interstate Highway 40 to Needies.
10. Between Los Angeles and the Califormia-Arizona State Line over State Highway 60 to Beaumont, thence over Interstate Highway 10.

1I. Between Barstow and the California-Nevada State Line over Interstate IIfghway 15.
12. State Highway 127 between Baker and Califoraia-Nevada State Ine.
13. Interstate Highway 8 between San Diego and Califoraia-Arizoma State Iine.
