In the Matter of the Application of MISSION CITIES FREIGEI IINES, INC., for a certificate of public convenience and necessity authorizing the transportation, as a bighway common carrier, of general comodities between points within the San Francisco territory, and of specified comodities between various points within Californfa.

## OㅍINION

Applicant operates pursuant to a radial highway common carrier permit which authorizes the transportation of general comodities, with the usual exceptions, between all points within a radius of 350 miles from Sante Clera.

By the application herein, applicant seeks a certificate of public convenfence and necessity to transport in intrastate; inte=state, and foreign commerce general comodities with certain exceptions between all points and places In the San Francisco Temitory and floor coverings, paint, condult fittings, and appliances between San Jose, Santa Cruz, Watsonville, Monterey, Salinas, Hoilistex, and intermediate points. The San Francisco Territory covers generally the area surrounding San Francisco Eay. A copy of the appifcacion has been filed with the Interstate Comerce Comission under Section 206 (a) (6) of the Interstate Comerce Act, and notice thereof appeared In the Federal Register on October 4, 1972. No protects to the granting of the sought authority have been received.

Applicant will provide service, Monday through Friday, witin same-day or overnight service depending on when the goods to be deilvered are recelved. The rates to be assessed will be the same scale as those contained in the Comission's Minimum Race Tarifis 2 and other appilcable minum rate tariffs. A tariff containing such zates and related ruTes and regulations will be filled
by applicant upon receipt of the sought authority. Applicant's Statement of Exnancial Position as of August 31, 1972, shows total assets of $\$ 17,069.72$, total liabilities of $\$ 9,203.11$, and stockholders: equity of $\$ 7,866.61$. For the five months ending August 31, 1972, it had gross operating income and expenses of $\$ 80,008.82$ and \$89,590.61, respectively, with a resulting net loss of \$9,582.39. The application asserts that applicant is a newly formed corporation and initial costs of incorporation have detracted from the profitablifty of its overall operation during the first months of operation. Applicant leases six bobtail trucks. It owns no equipment.

The application alleges that within recent months, the number of customers served by applicant within the area involved herein has increased considerably; that as a result thereof, applicant has increased the frequency of its service within this area to such an extent that a cextificate is a more appropriate authority to continue this operation; and that the sought authority will enable applicant to afford the character of service that will meet the requirements of its shippers.

Upon consideration, the Comission finds as follows:

1. Applicant possesses the experience, equipment, personnel and financial resources to fnstitute and maintain the proposed service.
2. Public convenience and necessity require that applicant be authorized to engage in operations in intrastate comerce as proposed in the appilcation and also require that applicant be authorized to engage in operations in interstate and forefgn comerce within limits which do not exceed the scope of the fntrastate operations authorized by the order herein.
3. Public hearing is not necessary.

The Comission concludes that the application should be granted as set forth in the ensuing order. The territorial description of the authority granted herein reflects the manes of redesignated hizhways and roads and does not in any way exceed the goographical scope of the proposed operation as prabished in the Federal Register.

Applicant is hercby placec on notice that operative
rights, as such, do not comstitutc a class of propezty which may
be capitalized or used as an element of value in rate fixing for any amount of money in excess of that originally paid to the State as the consideration for the grant of such rights. Aside from their purely permissive aspect, these rights extend to the hoider a full or partial monopoly of a class of business. This monopoly feature may be modified or canceled at any time by the State, which is not in any respect inmited as to the number of rights which may be given.

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II IS ORDERED that:

1. A certificate of public convenfence and necessfity is granted to ijssion Cities Frelght Iines, Inc., authorizing it to operate as a highway common carrier, as defined in Section 213 of the Public Utilities Code, between the points particularly set forth in Appendix $A$ attached hereto and made a part hereof.
2. In providing service pursuane to the certificate herein granted, applicant shail comply with and observe the following service regulations. Failure so to do may result in a cancellation of the operating authority granted by this lecision.
(a) Within thirty days after the effective date hexeof, applicant shall file a written acceptance of the certificate herein granted. Applicant is placed on notice that, if it accepts the certificate of public convenfence and necessity berein granted, it will be requixed, among other things, to comply with anci observe the safety zules of the California Hfghway Patrol and the insurance recuirements of the Comission's Generai Order No. 100-Series.
(b) Within one hundred twenty days after the effective date hereof, applicant shall estabifsh the service herein authorized and file tariffs, in triplicate, in the Comission's office.
(c) The tariff filings shali be made effective not earlier than thirty days after the effective date of this order on not less than thirty dayst notice to the Comosission and the public, and the effective date of the tariff fillags shail be conccirent with the establishment of the service herein authorized.
(d) The tariff filings made pursuant to this order shall comply with the regulations governing the construction and filing of tariffs set forth in the Commission's General Order No. 80-Series.
(e) Applicant shall maintain its accounting records on a calendar year basis in conformance with the applicable Uniform System of Accounts or Chart of . Accounts as prescribed or adopted by this Commission and shall file with the cominssion, on or before March 31 of each year, an annual report of its operations in such form, content, and number of copies as the Commission, from time to time, shall prescribe.
(f) Applicant shall comply with the requirements of the Comonssion's General Order No. 84-Series for the transportation of collect on delivery shipments. If applicant elects not to transport collect on delivery shipments, it shall make the appropriate tariff filings as required by the General Order.
The effective date of this order shall be twenty days after the date hereof.

Mission Cities Ereight Lines, Inc., by the certificate of public convenience and necessity granted by the decision noted in the margin, is authorized to conduct operations as a highway common carrier as defined in Section 213 of the Public Utilities Code for the transportation of:

1. General commodities, except as hereinafter provided, between $a l l$ points and places in the San Francisco Territory, as described in Note A.
II. Specified comnodities, viz; Iile, Linoleun, Carpet, Carpet Padding, Paint, Conduit Fittings and Appliances between any and all points on or within ten miles of the following routes and all off-route points encompassed by the outer perimeters of the designated routes:
A. State Highway 17 between its intersection with State Highway 9 at Los Gatos and its intersection with State Highway 1 at Santa Cruz, inclusive.
B. State Highway 1 between its intersection with State Highway 17 at Santa Cruz and its intersection with State Highway 68 at Monterey, inclusive.
C. State Highway 156 West from its intersection with State Highway 1 at Castroville to its intersection with J.S. Highway 101, inclusive.
D. State Kiginway 68 between its intersection with State Highway 1 at Montercy aad its intersection with U.S. Highway 101 at Salinas, inclusive.
E. U. S. Highway 101 between its intersection with State Highway 68 at Salinas and its intersection with Tully Road at San Jose, inclusive.

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F. State Highway 150 East between its intersection with D. S. Highway 202 near San Juan Batista and its intersection with State Highway 152, inclusive.
G. State Highway 252 between its intersection with State Highway 156 East and its intersection with State Highway 1 at Watsonville, inclusive.
III. Through routes and rates, for the specified commodities, nay be established between any and all points specified in paragraphs I and II above.

Pursuant to the authority granted herein, carrier shall not transport any shipments of:
I. Used household goods, personal effects and office, store and institution furniture, fixtures and equipment not packed in accordance with the crated property requiremeats set forth in Item 5 of Minimum ante Tariff 4-B.
2. Automobiles, trucks and buses, viz.: new and used, finished or unfinished passenger automobiles (including jeeps), ardulacees, hearses and taxis; freight automobiles, automobile chassis, trucks, truck chassis, truck trailers, trucks and trailers combined, buses and bus chassis.
3. Livestock, viz. = barrows, boars, bulls, butcher hogs, calves, cattle, cows, dairy cattle, ewes, feeder pigs, gilts, goats, heifers, hogs, kids, lambs, oxen, pigs, cans (bucks), sheep, sheep camp outfits, sows, steers, stags, swine or wethers.

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4. Liquids, compressed gases, comodities in semiplastic form and comodities in suspension in liquids in bulk, in tank trueks, tank trailers, tank semitrailers or a combination of such highway vehicies.
5. Commodities when transported in bulk in dump trucks or in hopper-type trucks.
6. Commodities whea transported in motor vehicles equipped for mechanical mixing in transit.
7. Portland or similar cements, in bulk or pacikages, when loaded substantially to capacity of motor vehicle.
8. Loss.
9. Axticles of extraoritinary value.

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NOTE A.

MISSICN CITIES EREIGHI IINES, INC. (a corporation) SAN ERANCISCO TERRITORY

San Francisco Territory incluces all the City of San Jose and that area embraced by the following boundary: Beginning at the point the San Francisco-San Mateo County Line meets the Pacific Ocean; thence easterly along said County Line to a point one mile west of State Highway 82 ; southerly alons an imaginary line one mile west of and paralleling State Highway 62 to its intersection with Southern Pacific Company right-of-way at Arastradero Road: southeasterly along the Southern Pacific Company right-of-way to Polland Roat, including industries served by the Southern Pacific Company spur line extending approximately two miles southwest from Simla to Permanente; easterly along pollard Road to W. Parr Avenue; easterly along W. Parr Avenue to Capri Drive; southerly along Capri Drive to Division Strect; easterly along Division Street to the Southern Pacific Company right-of-way; southerly along the Southern Pacific might-of-way to the Campbell-Los Gatos City Limits; easterly along said limits and the prolongation thereof to South Bascom Avenue (formerly San JoserLos Gatos Road) ; northeasterly along South Bascom Avenue to Foxworthy Avenue; easterly along Foxworthy Avenue to Almaden Road; southerly along Aimaden Road to Hillsdale Avenue; easterly along Hillsdale Avenue to State Highway 82; northwesterly along State Highway 82 to Tully Road; northeasterly along Iully Road and the prolongation thereof to White Road; northwesterly along White Road to MoKee Road; southwesterly along MoKee Road to Capitol Avenue; northwesterly along Capitol Avenue to State Highway $23 S$ (Oakland Road): nottherly along State Highway 233 to Warm Springs; northerly along State Highway 238 (Mission Blva.) via Mission San Jose and Niles to Hayward: northerly along Foothill BIvd. and MacArthur Blvd. to Seminary Aveaue; easterly along Seminary Avenue to Mountain BIvd.; northerly along Mountain Blvd. to Warren Blvd. (State Highway 13); northerly along Wamren Blvd. to Broadway Terrace; westerly along Broadway Terrace to College Avenue; northerly along College Avenue to Dwight Way; easterly along Dwight Way to the Berikeley-Oakland Boundary Line; northerly along said boundary line to the Campus Boundary of the Doiversity of California; westeriy, northerly and easterly along the campus boundary to Euclid Aveaue; northerly along Euclid Avenue to Marin Avenue; westerly along Marin Avenue to Arlington Avenue; northerly along Arlington Avenue to San Pablo Aveaue (State Highway 123); oortherly along San Pablo Avenue to and including the City of Richmond to Point Richmond; southerly along an imasiaary line from Peint Richmond to the San Erancisco waterfront at the foot of Market Street; westerly along said waterfroot and shoreline to the Pacific Ocean; southerly along the shoreline of the Pacific Ocean to point of beginaing.
