ORDER EXTENDING TIME

Finding 2 of Decision No. 82896 dated May 21, 1974 found that public convenience and necessity require that applicant be authorized to transport baskets and ladders in interstate and foreign commerce within the area covered by its current certificated authority which is registered with the Interstate Commerce Commission. The decision also granted applicant an extension of its intrastate certificated authority to include the entire Los Angeles Basin Territory.

By letter dated November 7, 1974, applicant's attorney advised that application was made to the Interstate Commerce Commission in June 1974 for registration of the interstate rights granted by Decision No. 82896 but that the registration has not as yet been received. The letter requests a 90-day extension of time within which to comply with the tariff filing requirements of Ordering Paragraph 2.b. of the decision in order to avoid the substantial expense of publishing tariffs twice, once for this Commission and again when the Interstate Commerce Commission Registration is received.

IT IS ORDERED that:

1. The time period specified in Ordering Paragraph 2.b. of Decision No. 82896 dated May 21, 1974 within which Webster Delivery Service, Inc. shall establish the authorized service and amend tariffs, in triplicate, in the Commission's office is extended to February 28, 1975.

2. In all other respects, Decision No. 82896 shall remain in full force and effect.
