SUPPLEMENTAL OPINION DIRECTING REFUNDS

On August 8, 1972, General Telephone Company of California was ordered¹ to refund to subscribers amounts affecting General Telephone collected over and above Pacific's rate levels in effect prior to July 23, 1971, less the rate increments authorized in Decisions Nos. 79873 and 79941, for the period beginning July 23, 1971 and continuing until the effective date of tariff schedules filed as authorized in Decisions Nos. 80347 and 80348, issued August 8, 1972.

As directed by paragraph E, Appendix B of Decision No. 80346, General Telephone on October 30, 1974 reported refunded and unrefunded amounts as follows:

General Telephone proposed that of the unrefunded amount \$165,082 be applied to the expense of administering the refund and the balance applied to its uncollectible accounts.

While the Commission is concerned with any increase in uncollectibles the application of the unrefunded amount toward uncollectibles is not the solution to the uncollectible problem. This proceeding is not the proper vehicle to deal with General Telephone's uncollectible problem.

General Telephone has approximately 1,742,000 active accounts. The unrefunded amount of \$1,000,256 yields approximately 57 cents per active account.

Finding

General Telephone should refund the amount of \$1,000,256 to its active accounts by means of a uniform credit.

<u>ORDER</u>

IT IS ORDERED that:

1. General Telephone Company of California shall, beginning thirty days after the effective date of this order, distribute the amount of \$1,000,256 remaining to be refunded to its customers by means of a uniform credit on the bill of each active account, excluding coin and special accounts, such credits to be completed at the end of one billing cycle of approximately thirty days. The credit to each account shall be equal to \$1,000,256 divided by the number of active accounts.
