William H. Worth requests authority to sell and transfer, and Intemational Air Courier, Inc. requests authority to purchase and acquire, a certificate of public convenience and necessity authorizing operations as a freight forwarder.

International Air Courier, Inc. is presently operating as a freight forwarder of general comodities in interstate and foreign comerce. William H . Worth presently holds authority as a freight forwarder and as an express company between points and places in California pursuant to a certificate of public convenience and necessity issued by Decision No. 60691. The cash consideration is $\$ 13,750$. A balance sheet as of March 31, 1974 for International Air Couriex, Inc. indicated a net worth in the amount of $\$ 673,948$. No protests have been received.
After consideration the Commission finds that the proposed transfer would not be adverse to the public interest and concludes that it should be authorized. We further find with reasonable certainty that the project involved in this proceeding will not have a significant effect on the environment. A public hearing is not necessary. The order which follows will provide for, in the event the transfer is completed, the revocation of the certificate presently held by William $H$. Worth and the issuance of a certificate in appendix form to International Air Courier, Inc.

International Air Courier, Inc. is placed on notice that operative rights, as such, do not constitute a class of property which may be capitalized or used as an element of value in rate fixing for any amount of money in excess of that originally paid to the State as the consideration for the grant of such Iights,
Aside from their purely permissive aspect, such rights extend to the holder a full or partial monopoly of a class of business. This monopoly feature may be modified or canceled at any time by the State, which is not in any respect limited as to the number of righes which may be given.

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IT IS ORDERED that:

1. On or before March 3, 1975, William H. Worth may sell and transfer the operative rights referred to in the application to Intemational Air Courier, Inc.
2. Within thirty days after the transfer the purchaser shall file with the Comoission written acceptance of the certificate and a true copy of the bill of sale or other instrument of transfer.
3. Purchaser shall amend or reissue the tariffs on file with the Commission, naming rates and rules governing the freight forwarder operations transferred to show that it has adopted or established, as its own, the rates and rules. The tariff filings shall be made effective not earlier than five days after the effective date of this order on not less than five days' notice to the Commission and the public, and the effective date of the tariff filings shall be concurrent with the transfer. The tariff filings made pursuant to this order shall comply in all respects with the regulations governing the construction and filing of tariffs set forth in the Commission's General Order No. 117-Series. Failure to comply with the provisions of General Order No. 117-Series may result in a cancellation of the operating authority granted by this decision.
4. On or before the end of the third month after the transfer, the purchaser shall cause to be filed with the Commission, in such form as the Comission may prescribe, an annual report, or reports, related to the operations of the seller for the period commencing with the first day of the current year to and including the effective date of the transfer.
5. In the event the transfer authorized in paragraph 1 hereof is completed, a certificate of public convenience and necessity is granted to Intemational Air Courier, Inc. to operate as a freight forwarder, as defined in Section 220 of the Public Utilities Code, as particularly set forth in Appendix A attached hereto and made a part hereof.
6. The certificate of public convenlence and necessity granted by Decision No. 60691 is revoked effective concurrently with the effective date of the tariff filings required by paragraph 3.
7. Purchaser shall comply with the requirements of the Comission's General Oxder No. 84-Series for the transportation of collect on delivery shipments. If purchaser elects not to transport collect on delivery shipments, it shall make the appropriate tariff filings as required by the General Order.
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8. Purchaser shall comply with the requirements of the Commission's General Order No. 100-Series if purchaser intends to operate a motor vehicle under this authority.

The effective date of this order shall be twenty days after the date hereof.


Intcrnational Air Courier, Inc., by the certificate of public convenience and necessity cranted in the decision noted in the marcin, is authorized to operate as an express corporation as defined in Section 219 of the Public Utilities code, and a freight forwarder as defined in Section 220 of tire Public Utilities code, from, to, and between all points situated on and within ten miles of the following routes:

Route 1. Between Los Angeles and San Bernardino via U.S. Fighway 66.
Route 2. Between Los Aingeies and the United States-ifexican border at Calexico via State Mishway 60 to its intersection with Interstatc Hishway 20 at Beaumont, thence via Interstate Highway 10 to its intersection with State Highway 86 at Indio, thence via Sitate Hichivay 86 , and including alternate route via state lifinway lil from its intersection with Interstate Highway 10 approximately 2 miles wost of Witewater to Calexico, and also includine offIne routc via State Hichway 62 from its intersection with Interstate Hichwoy 10 approximately 2 miles east of Whitewater to anc includinci the city of Twentynine Palms and inciuding the U.S. Varine Corps Iraining Center north of Twentymine Palms.

Route 3. Between Los Angeles and Beamont via Interstate Hichway 10, and from Pomona via State Higiway 60 to Beamont, inciudine lateral route over U.S. Hienvay 395 from its intersection witin U.S. Hichway 60 near Sunnymead to its intersection with State Hichway 74 near Romoland; thence via State Hichray 74 to Hemet.
noute 4. Eetween Los Anseles and United States-liexican border, south of San Ysidro via Interstate Highway 5, including off-route points wthin five miles of the city of brea, including Camp Pondieton U.S. Marine Base, and aiso including alternate routes:
(a) Via State Hfgimay 72 between Los Angeles and the junction of Interstate Hechway 5 and State Highway 72 In Anaincin;
(b) Routes over roads and strcets in the city of sam Diego via La Jolla, Paciffc Beach, Mission Eeach, Ocean Beach, Point Iona;
(c) Santa Ana, iewport Beach and Balboa via Main Strect, State lig ghway 55 and unmumbered hichway; and
(d) North Island, Coronado, and Silver Strand via Ferry from San Diego and over State Highway 75.

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Route 5. Between Santa Honica ani Doneny Park via State Hithway 1 from and lincluaince santa ionica to its junction with Interstate Highway 5 at Doineny Park, also including off-iine points of San Peciro and Iorminal Isiand.

Between junction of Interstate Iibhway 5 and Interstate Fighway 14, north of the city of San Fernando, and Wilnincton (Los Ameles Harbor), via Interstate Hichway 5 to Los Angeles, thence via Ficueroa Street, Avalon Boulevard or Nlameda Street to Wimington, also via lateral route commencing at the intersection of Interstate Higinway 5 and Sunland Boulevard in Sun Valley; thence via Suniand Eoulevard and State Filghway 118 through Sunland to the Intersection of State Highways 118 and 2, thence via State Iifghway 2 to its intersection with Interstate Highway 5 in clendale.

Route 7. Between Anaheim and San Bernardino via U.S. Higiway 91.

(a) Between Riversice and San Diego via U.S. Highway 395, includinc alternate route via San Diego County iood S-13 from its intersection kitio U.S. Highway 395 approximatcly 6 miles south of comecula to its intersection with State Highway 78 at Vista; thence via State ilighway 78 to its intersection with U.S. Hichway 395 at Escondido.
(b) Between Perris and Hemet via State Highway 74.

Route 9. Between San Diego anc California-Arizona Boundary near Winteriaven via Interstate Hichway 8 and also via alternate route from San Dieço via State Hignway 94 to its interscotion witi Interstate Highway 8 at Boulevard.

Route 10. Between Los Anceles and Santa ionica via State Highway 2.
تioute 21. Between Buena Park and the Pacific Ocean via State Highway 39.

Route 12. Between Pasadena and Lonc Beach via U.S. Highway 66 and State Hichway 19.

Route 23. Between Oakland and Stockton via Interstate Highway 580 serving no intermediate points between hayward and Stockton.

Route 24. Between junction of State Hishway 120 and U.S. Highway 50 east of the City of Tracy and Manteca, via State Highway 120.

Route 25. Between junction of State Highway 4 and U.S. Highway 40 northeast of Pinole and Stockton via State Highway 4, serving no intermediate points.

Route 26. Between Los Angeles and Sacramento, including Sacramento, via Interstate Hicinay 5 to its intersection with State Highway 99 northwest of Wheeler inidge, thence via State iilghway 99 , and also the following routes:
(a) From the junction of Interstate Elghway 5 and 24 southeast of iewhail, thence via Interstate Highway 14 and unnumered highways througit Newhall to Saugus, thence via unnuabered highway to its intersection with Interstate Hichway 5 at a point 2.7 miles westerly of Saugus.
(i) State Hyghay 65 between the intersection of said aighway with U.S. Hichway 99 approxinately 4 miles north of Bakersficia, via Ducor, Porterville, Indsay, Exeter to its intersection with State H1 Ghway 198, thence via State Hichway 198 to Visaila, thence via unnumbered highways via Calgro,

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Orosi, Dinuba, Reedley, Sanger, and Clovis, thence via State Highway 168 and unnumbered hichway to its junction with U.S. Hichway 99, approximately 7 miles north of Fresno.

Route 27. Between Visalia and Lemoore via State Highway 198 via Kanford.

Route 28. Between Sacramento and Red Bluff via Interstate Highway So from Sacramento to its intersection with State Hichway 65 near Rosevilie, thence via State Hizhway 65 to its intersection with State Highway 20 at Marysvilic, thence via State IIfichay 20 to its intersection with State Highway 99 at Yuba City, thence via State Hichway 99 to Red Biuff, serving no intermediate points between ivorth Sacramento and Chico.

Route 29. Between Sacramento and Woodiand via State Highway 16 servine no intermediate points.

Route 30. Between junction of State Hychway 113 and Interstate Highway 80 west of Davis and Red Biuff via State Highway 113 to 1ts intersection with Interstate Hichway 5 near Woodianc, thence via Interstate Highway 5 servine no intermediate points.

Route 31. Between Red Bluff and California-Oregon State Inne via Interstate Hisinway 5.

Route 32. Between Weed and Cailfornia-Oregon State Iine via Highway 97.
