## FINAL OPINION

By Decision 82952 dated June 5, 1974 In Application 54789, SXSTEM 99, a California comporation, was authorized to acquire the highway comon carrier certificate of mrans Western Express, Inc.

As a condition to the authorization to transfer the above certiricate, SYSTEM 99 was required to submit for approval by the Commission an in-lieu highway common carrier certificate. Said certiricate was intended to restate all of the existing certificates held by SISTEM 99 which it had previousiy acquired through purchase, or by the merger of certain of its affiniates. SYSTET 99 now holds certificates which were originaliy granted by the Commission to the following entities:

1. Blankenship Motors
2. Interilnes Hotor Express
3. Bay Freight Ines
4. San Diego - Imperial Express, Inc.
5. Lom Thompson, dba THOMPSON TRUCK IINES
6. Campora Fast Freight, Inc.
7. Trans Westem Express, Inc.

On February 7, 1975, SYSTEM 29 submitted its proposed in-11eu certiricate as required by Ordering Paragraph 10 of Decision 82952, supra. Upon review and appropriate modification by the Commssion's staff, the in-ileu certificate now conforms to the scope of operating authority resuiting from the consolidation of the separate authorities originaliy granted. This version is an accurate restatement of the existing rights and will be adopted.

The action taken herein is for the specific purpose of implementing the Comission's order in Decision 82952, supra, by consolidating and restating the separate highway common carrier authorities now held by SYSTEM 99. The restatement neither broadens nor changes the intrastate, interstate or foreign commerce rights now held by that carrier.

SYSTEM 99 is placed on notice that operative rights, as such, do not constitute a class of property which may be capitailzed or used as an element of value in rate fixing for any amount of money in excess of that originaily paid to the State as the consideration for the grant of such rigits. Aside from their purely permissive aspect, such rights extend to the holder a full or partial monopoiy of a class of business. This monopoly feature may be modified or cancelled at any time by the state, which is not in any respect limited as to the number of rights which may be given.

FINAL ORDER

## IT IS ORDERED that:

i. A certificate of pubilc convenience and necessity is Eranted to SYSTEN 99, a California corporation, authorizing it to operate as a highway common carrier, as defined in Section 213 of the Public Utilities Code, between the points and over the routes set forth in Appendix $\Lambda$ of this decision.
2. In providing service pursuant to the authority granted by this order, SYSTEM 99 shall comply with the following service regulations. Failure to do so may result in cancellation of the authority:
(a) Within thirty days after the effective date of this order, SYSTEH 99 shall file a written acceptance of the certificate granted. SYSTEM 99 is piaced on notice that if it accepts the certificate it will be required, among other things, to comply with the safety rules administered by the California Highway Patrol and the insurance requirements of the commission's General Order 100-Series.
(b) Within one hundred twenty days after the erfective date of this order, SYSTEA 99 shall establish the authorized service and cancel, amend or refile tariffs, as necessary, in the Comission's ofifce pursuant to the in-lieu certificate granted of this decision.
(c) The tariff filings shall be made effective not earlier than ten days after the effective date of this order on not less that ten days' notice to the commission and the public, and the effective date of the tariff filings shall be concurrent with the establishment of the authorized service.
(d) The tariff filings made pursuant to this order shall comply with the regulations governing the construction and filing of tariffs set forth in the Commission's General Order 80-Series.
(e) SYSTEii 99 shail maintain its accounting records on a calendar year basis in conformance with the appilcable Uniform System of Accounts or Chart of Accounts as prescribed or adopted by this Commission and shail file with the Commission, on or before April 30 of each year, an annual report of its operations in such form, content, and number of copies as the commission, from time to time, shall prescribe.
（I）SYSTEM 99 shall comply with the requirements of the Commission＇s General Order 84－Semies for the transportation of collect on delivery shipments．If it elects not to transport collect on deliサiny sinipments，it shall make de appropriate tariff fillings as required by が三 ت̈cneral Order．

3．The certificate of public convenience and necessity granted In paragraph 1 of this order shall be in feu of and supersede all exisutng certificates of public convenience ana necessity authorizing operations as a highway common carrier heretofore granted to SYSTEM 5Q：or its affiliates，or acquired by SYSTEM 99 through merger or transfer，which certificates are lIsted in Appendix $B$ of this decision and are hereby revoked effective concurrently with the نifcctive date of the tariff filings required by paragraph $2(b)$ ． The effective date of this order shall：be twenty days after the date hereof．

11. Between Scotia and Arcata via U.S. Highway 101, including points located within 10 miles lateraliy thereor, subject to Restrictions \#1 and \#2.
12. Between Arcata and Alturas via State H1ghway 299, ineluding points within 20 miles lateraily thereof, subject to Restrictions $\# 1$ and $\# 2$.
23. Between Alturas and the Cailforma-oregon State Ine v1a U.S. Highway 395.
24. Between Bartie and the junction of State Highway 299 WIth State Highway 89 (northeast of Burney) via State Highway 89, inciuding points located within 10 miles laterally thereof.
15. Between Los Angeies and Sacramento via Interstate Highway 5 to its junction with State Highway 99 (near Wheeler R1dge), thence via State Hi khway 99, including points located within 25 miles lateraily of said route.
16. Between Sacramento and Redding (a) via Interstate HIghray 80, State H1ghway 65, State Highway 20 , State Fighway 99 and Interstate Highway 5 (east route); and (b) via Interstate Highway 80, State HIghway 113 and Interstate H1ghway 5 (west route), including points located within 20 miles lateraily of said routes.
17. Between San Francisco and Stockton via Interstate H1ghway 80, Interstate Hyghway 580, Inverstate Highway 205 and Interstate Highway 5 , inciuding points located within 25 miles lateraily of said route.

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18. Between the junction of State Highway 4 with Interstate fisghway 80 (near Pinolc) and Stockton via State Highway 4, inciuding points within 10 miles lateraily thereof.
19. Between the junction of State iifghway 4 with an unnumbered higizway (north of Byron) and the junction of said unnmbered highway with Interstate lifehway 580 (south of Bethany), including points located within 10 miles lateraily of sald unnumbered highway.
20. Between San Francisco and Roseville via Interstate Highway 80, inclucing points located within 10 miles lateraily thereof.
21. Between the junction of State Highway 99 with State Highway 262 (cast of Ricivale) and Pulga, via State H1ghway 162 to Orovilile, thence via State Highway 70 to Puiga, inciuding points located within 20 miles lateraliy of said route.
22. Between the Junction of Interstate Highway 5 with State Highway 20 (near Vililiams) and Upper Lake via State Highway 20, including points within 3 miles laterally thereof.
23. Between Upper Lake and iIddietom via State Highway 29 to its Junction with State Highway 275 ; thence via State Highway 175 , inciuding points within 3 miles laterally of saic route.
24. Between ilididletown and the junction of State Highway 53 with State Highway 20 (near Ciearlake Oaks) via State Fighway 29 to its gunction with State H1ghway 53 (near Lower Lake); thence via State Highway 53 , Inciuding points located within 3 miles lateraliy of sald route.
25. Between Los Angeles and San Bernarcino via State Higinay Il, thence via Interstate Highway 210 , thence via State Highway 66 (formeriy U.S. Highway 66), Including points located with 25 miles laterally of said route.

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26. Between Los Anceles Basin Torritory and Blythe via Interstate Highway 10.
27. Between Los Angeles Basin Territory and the River-side-Imperial County Ifne via (a) State Highway 60, Interstate Highway 10 and State Highway 111; or (b) via State Highway 60, Interstate Highway 10 and State Highways 111 and 86 .
28. Between all points within Imperial County Iying west of State fighway 111 comencing at the Riverside County line (near Durmid); thence via State Highway 111 to its junction with State Highway 115 (at Calipatria); thence via State Highway 115 through Holtville to its function with State Highway 98 (at Bonds Corner); thence due south along an imaginary inne drawn from the junction of State Highways 115 and 98 to the International Boundary Ine between the United States and Texico; and including the easteriy point of Glamis located on State Highway 78.
29. Between San Diego Territory and those points within the portion of Imperial County described in paragraph 28 above via Interstate Highway 8, inciuding points within 5 miles laterally thereof.
30. Between all points in that portion of Imperial County which lie either north or west of the main All American Canal.
31. Between San Diego Territory and Escondido via Interstate Highway 15, 1ncluding points located within 5 miles lateraliy thereof.
32. Between Escondido and the Junction of State Highway 78 with Interstate Highway 5 (south of Oceanside), via State Higinway 78, Inciuding points located within 5 miles laterally thereof.
33. Between Oceanside and Bonsall via State Kighway 76, including points located within 5 miles lateraliy thereof.

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34. Between Fallorook and Vista via San Diego County Road S-13, including points located within 5 miles laterally thereof.
35. Between Capistrano Beach and Montalvo via State Fighway 1, including points located within 25 miles lateraily thereof.
(NOTE I: All references to radial or lateral mileage dis-... tances shown herein shail be construed to mean statute miles.)
Except where otherwise specifically noted and pursuant to the authority herein granted, carrier shail not transport any shipments of:

1. Used househole goods, personal effects and ofifice, store and institution furniture, fixtures and equipment not packed in salesmen's hand sample cases, suitcases, overnight or boston bags, brief cases, hat boxes, valises, traveling bags, trunks, lift vans, barrels, boxes, cartons, crates, cases, baskets, pails, kits, tubs, drums, bags (jute, cotton, burlap or gunny) or bundies (completely wrapped in jute, cotton, burlap, gunny, fibreboard, or straw matting).
2. Automob1les, trucks and buses, viz.: new and used, innished or unfinished passenger automobiles (including jeeps), ambulances, hearses and taxis; freight automobiles, automobile chassis, trucks, truck chassis, truck trailers, trucks and trailers combined, buses and bus chassis.
3. Ilvestock, viz.: barrows, boars, bulls, butcher hogs, calves, cattle, cows, calry cattle, ewes, feeder pige, silts, goats, heifers, hogs, kids, lambs, oxen, pigs, rams (bucks), sheep, sheep camp outfits, sows, steers, stags, swine or wethers.

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4. Iiquids, compressed gases, commodities in semiplastic form and commodities in suspension in liquids in buik, in tank trucks, tank trailers, tank semitrailers or a combination of such highway vehicles.
5. Commodities when transported in buik in dump-type trucks or trailers or in hopper-type trucks or trailers.
6. Commodities when transported in motor vehicles equipped for mechanical mixing in transit.
7. Logs.
8. Articles of extraordinary value.
9. Trailer coaches and campers, including integral parts and contents when the contents are within the trailer coach or camper.
II. MERCHANDISE for moll oreer houses and their retail stores, subject to Restriction \#3: (See note 2 under Paragraph I) BETWEEN:

1. Antioch, Auburn, Bakersifeld, Chico, Coalinga, Concord, Corte Madera, Dunsmuir, Eureka, Fremont, Fresno, Gilroy, Grass Valley, Hanford, Healdsburs, IIvermore, Lodi, Lompoc, Los Banos, Los Gatos, Vadera, Martinez, Marysville, Merced, M121 Valley, Ilodesto, Petaluma, Pittsburs, Pomona, Porterville, Red Bluff, Redding, Riverside, Rosevilie, Sacramento, Sainas, San Diego, San Luls Obispo, San Rafael, Santa Ana, Santa Barbara, San Bernardino, Santa Cruz, Santa Rosa, Stockton, Taft, Tracy, Tulare, Turlock, Ukiah, Vacaville, Vailejo, Monterey, Ventura, Napa, Visalia, National City, Walnut Creek, Orovilie, Watsonville, Oxnard, Woodiand, Paso Robles, Yreka; and
2. Points within the San Francisco Territory; and

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3. Points within the Los Angeles Territory as described in Note D; and
4. Points located within fifty (50) miles of Oakiand.
III. FRESH FRUITS AND VEGETABIES in shipments weighing 5,000 pounds or more: (See note 1 under Paragraph I)

## FROR:

1. The Los Angeles Territory as described in Note D;
2. San Diego and all points located within a 25-mile radius thereof;
3. All points on State Highway 86 between Indio and El Centro, inclusive, inclueing points located within 25 miles laterally of said highway;
4. All points on Interstate Iighway 10 within Los Angeles Territory and between said territory and Rediands, inclusive, including points within 25 miles laterally of said highway;
5. All points located between Ventura and Perris, inclusive, on State Highway 126 to 1ts gunction with Interstate Highway 5, on Interstate Highway 5 to its function with State Highway 60, on State Highway 60 to its juaction with U.S. Highway 395, and on U.S. Highway 395, including ail points located within 25 miles Laterally of said highways; and
6. All points on State H1ghway 99 between Bakersfield and Fresno, inclusive, including points located within 25 miles lateraliy of said highway;

IO: San Francisco, Oakland, Alameda, San Leandro and Richmond.
IV. LUMBER AND FOREST PRODUCTS as described under the generic heading of "LUNBER GROUP" in National Motor Freight Classification NTF 100-C, supplements thereto or successive issues thereof: (Sce note 1 under Paragraph I)

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Between all points on and within 15 miles laterally of U.S. Highway 101 between Eureka and the Caifformia-Oregon State Iine, inclusive.

In performing the service herein authorized, carrier may make use of any and 211 streets, roads, highways and bridges necessary or convenient for the performance of said service, except as restricted below:

Restriction \#1: No local service is authorized between points located on U.S. Highway 101 between Trinidad and Scotia, inclusive, and points laterally adjacent to said highway, on the one hand, and on the other hand, points located on State Highway 299 from its junction with U.S. Highway 101 (near Arcata) to and including Willow Creek, and points laterally adjacent to said highway.

Restriction H2: No service is authorized at points located on State Highway 95 north of Wiliow Creek, or at points on State Highway 36 between Forest Gien and the junction of sald State Highway 36 with U.S. Highway 101 (at Alton), or at points located laterally from said state kighways.

Restriction \#3: Carrier shall not transport commodities which have been sold at retail by a retail meschant, and transported from a retail store or retall store warehouse to residences of retail customers, or transported from residences of retail customers to retall stores or retall store warehouses, when such transportation is performed in vehicles in the exclusive use of the retailer and providing no shipment exceeds 2,000 pounds in weight. Further, that the merchandise is for the use or consumption of retail customers and is not for use in the furtherance of an industrial or commercial enterprise; and provided that the retailer shall certify on the shipping document for each delivery that the merchandise was sold at retail to a retail customer.
