<u>OPINION</u>

By this application, High Sierra Express, Incorporated (applicant), a California corporation, seeks a Class B certificate to operate as a charter-party carrier of passengers with an area of origin within a 40-mile radius of its home terminal at 8410 East Compton Boulevard, Paramount. Applicant also applies for authority to issue its common stock.

After notice a timely protest was received from Golden West Charter Line (Golden West), a Class A charter-party carrier of passengers. A hearing was held before Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) Levander on September 10, 1981 and was submitted subject to receipt of a corrected exhibit showing applicant's financial condition, which has been received.

^{1/} No appearance was made for Golden West. In response to a telephone call from the ALJ, Golden West's owner informed the ALJ that Golden West waived its protest; it could not participate at the hearing due to problems caused by a major equipment failure on its new bus.

Applicant's Exhibit 1 and supplemental testimony establish that there is an existing and rapidly growing need for additional charter-party bus service from its area of origin to mountain resort areas in the vicinity of Mammoth Lakes; it is capable of providing that type of service with the 47-passenger intercity bus it owns.

Applicant shows a net equity of \$3,249 as of September 30, 1981. Applicant's president testified that its shareholders could and would invest additional funds needed by applicant.

<u>Findings of Pact</u>

- 1. Applicant has the fitness, equipment, and financial resources to perform the proposed service.
- 2. Public convenience and necessity require the service proposed by applicant.
- 3. Applicant should be authorized to pick up passengers within a radius of 40 air miles from its home terminal at 8410 East Compton Boulevard, Paramount.
- 4. Golden West did not appear to pursue its protest to the granting of applicant's requested certificate.
- 5. It can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the activity in question may have a significant effect on the environment.

Conclusions of Law

- 1. The Commission has no jurisdiction to regulate the issuance of stock by a charter-party carrier of passengers.
- 2. Golden West waived its protest to the granting of applicant's requested certificate.
- 3. Public convenience and necessity have been demonstrated and a certificate should be granted. Since there is a need for the proposed service, the following order should be effective today.

ORDER

IT IS ORDERED that:

- l. A certificate of public convenience and necessity, to be renewed each year, is granted to High Sierra Express, Incorporated authorizing it to operate as a Class B charter-party carrier of passengers, as defined in Public Utilities Code Section 5383, from a service area within a radius of 40 air miles from its home terminal at 8410 East Compton Boulevard, Paramount.
- 2. The Passenger Operations Branch will issue the annual renewable certificate on Form PE-695 as authorized by Resolution PE-303, when it receives California Highway Patrol clearances and evidence of liability protection in compliance with General Order Series 115.
- 3. In providing service under the certificate, applicant shall comply with General Orders Series 98 and 115 and the California Highway Patrol safety rules.

This order is effective today.
