#### FINAL OPINION

By Decision 86243 of August 10, 1975 in Application 56640, L.B.D., INC., a California corporation (which subsequently changed its corporate name back to Associated Freight Lines), was authorized to acquire several individual highway common carrier certificates of public convenience and necessity and a petroleum irregular route carrier certificate held by the former Associated Freight Lines, a California corporation (which later changed its corporate name to Best-Way Freight Lines Of Arizona).

As a prerequisite to the Commission's issuance of in-lieu certificates to replace various individual operating authorities, Associated Freight Lines (then L.B.D., Inc.) was directed to submit, for the Commission's approval, a proposed in-lieu certificate describing and consolidating all of its separate highway common carrier operating authorities acquired pursuant to Decision 86243.

Resolution 17873 of September 1, 1976, in Applications 56640 and 50526.

On September 14, 1976, Associated Freight Lines submitted the proposed in-lieu certificate. Upon review and appropriate modification by the Commission's staff, the in-lieu highway common carrier certificate now conforms to the scope of operating authority resulting from the consolidation of the separate authorities originally granted. The staff's revision of the carrier's proposed in-lieu certificate accurately restates the existing rights and will be adopted.

The action taken herein is for the specific purpose of implementing and finalizing the Commission's order in Decision 86243 by consolidating and restating: (1) the separate highway common carrier authorities; and (2) the petroleum irregular route carrier certificate now held by Associated Freight Lines. The restated authorities neither broaden nor change the intrastate, interstate or foreign commerce rights now held by that carrier.

Associated Freight Lines is placed on notice that operative rights, as such, do not constitute a class of property which may be capitalized or used as an element of value in rate fixing for any amount of money in excess of that originally paid to the State as the consideration for the grant of such rights. Aside from their purely permissive aspect, such rights extend to the holder a full or partial monopoly of a class of business. This monopoly feature may be modified or cancelled at any time by the State, which is not in any respect limited as to the number of rights which may be given.

### FINAL ORDER

IT IS ORDERED that:

l. A certificate of public convenience and necessity is granted to Associated Freight Lines, a California corporation, authorizing it to operate as a highway common carrier, as defined in Section 213 of the Public Utilities Code, between the points and over the routes set forth in Appendix A of this decision.

A. 56640 - CAS/jmw A certificate of public convenience and necessity is granted to Associated Freight Lines, a California corporation, authorizing it to operate as a petroleum irregular route carrier, as defined in Section 214 of the Public Utilities Code, between all points and places in the State of California as set forth in Appendix B of this decision. In providing service pursuant to the authority granted by this order, Associated Freight Lines shall comply with the following service regulations. Failure to do so may result in cancellation of the authorities: (a) Within thirty days after the effective date of this order, Associated Freight Lines shall file a written acceptance of the certificates granted. Associated Freight Lines is placed on notice that if it accepts the certificates it will be required, among other things, to comply with the safety rules administered by the California Highway Patrol and the insurance requirements of the Commission's General Order 100-Series. (b) Within one hundred twenty days after the effective date of this order, Associated Freight Lines shall establish the authorized service and cancel, amend or refile tariffs, as necessary, in the Commission's office pursuant to the in-lieu certificates granted by this decision. (c) The tariff filings shall be made effective not earlier than ten days after the effective date of this order on not less than ten days' notice to the Commission and to the public, and the effective date of the tariff filings shall be concurrent with the establishment of the authorized service. '(d) The tariff filings made pursuant to this order shall comply with the regulations governing the construction and filing of tariffs set forth in the Commission's General Order 80-Series. -3A. 56640 - CAS/j mw

- (e) Associated Freight Lines shall maintain its accounting records on a calendar year basis in conformance with the applicable Uniform System of Accounts or Chart of Accounts as prescribed or adopted by this Commission and shall file with the Commission, on or before April 30 of each year, an annual report of its operations in such form, content, and number of copies as the Commission, from time to time, shall prescribe.
- (f) Associated Freight Lines shall comply with the requirements of the Commission's General Order 84-Series for the transportation of collect on delivery shipments. If it elects not to transport collect on delivery shipments, it shall make the appropriate tariff filings as required by the General Order.
- 4. The certificates of public convenience and necessity granted in paragraphs 1 and 2 of this order shall be in lieu of and superscde all existing certificates of public convenience and necessity authorizing operations as a highway common carrier or petroleum irregular route carrier heretofore granted to or acquired by Associated Freight Lines pursuant to Decision 86243, which certificates are listed in Appendix C of this decision and are hereby revoked effective concurrently with the effective date of the tariff filings required by paragraph 3(b).

The effective date of this order shall be twenty days after the date hereof.

Associated Freight Lines, a corporation, by the certificate of public convenience and necessity granted by the decision noted in the margin, is authorized to conduct operations as a highway common carrier as defined in Section 213 of the Public Utilities Code for the following transportation:

- I. GENERAL COMMODITIES (with exceptions hereinafter noted) between all points and places, including service to all intermediate points, located within the described territories; located on the highways or roads designated (including points located within 5 statute miles laterally thereof where so indicated); and between all off-route points located in specified counties or portions thereof as follows: (See Note 1) (NOTE 1.) All references to lateral or linear mileage distances shown herein shall be construed to mean statute miles.)

Used household goods, personal effects and office, store and institution furniture, fixtures and equipment not packed in salesmen's hand sample cases, suitcases, overnight or boston bags, brief cases, hat boxes, valises, traveling bags, trunks, lift vans, barrels, boxes, cartons, crates, cases, baskets, pails, kits, tubs, drums, bags (jute, cotton, burlap or gunny) or bundles (completely wrapped in jute, cotton, burlap, gunny, fibreboard, or straw matting).
  - 2. Automobiles, trucks and buses, viz.: new and used, finished or unfinished passenger automobiles (including jeeps), ambulances, hearses and taxis, freight automobiles, automobile chassis, trucks, truck chassis, truck trailers, trucks and trailers combined, buses and bus chassis.
  - 3. Livestock, viz.: barrows, boars, bulls, butcher hogs, calves, cattle, cows, dairy cattle, ewes, feeder pigs, gilts, goats, helfers, hogs, kids, lambs, oxen, pigs, rams (bucks), sheep, sheep camp outfits, sows, steers, stags, swine or wethers.
  - 4. Liquids, compressed gases, commodities in semiplastic form and commodities in suspension in

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liquids in bulk, in tank trucks, tank trailers, tank semitrailers or a combination of such high-way vehicles.

- 5. Commodities when transported in bulk in dump-type trucks or trailers or in hopper-type trucks or trailers.
- 6. Commodities when transported in motor vehicles equipped for mechanical mixing in transit.
- .7. Logs.
  - 8. Trailer coaches and campers, including integral parts and contents when the contents are within the trailer coach or camper.

#### LOS ANGELES BASIN TERRITORY

Los Angeles Basin Territory includes that area embraced by the following boundary: Beginning at the point the Ventura County-Los Angeles County Boundary Line intersects the Pacific Ocean; thence northeasterly along said county line to the point it intersects State Highway 118, approximately two miles west of Chatsworth; easterly along State Highway 118 to Sepulveda Boulevard; northerly along Sepulveda Boulevard to Chatsworth Drive; northeasterly along Chatsworth Drive to the corporate boundary of the City of San Fernando; westerly and northerly along said corporate boundary of the City of San Fernando to Maclay Avenue; northeasterly along Maclay Avenue and its prolongation to the Angeles National Forest Boundary; southeasterly and easterly along the Angeles National Forest and San Bernardino National Forest Boundary to Mill Creek Road (State Highway 38); westerly along Mill Creek Road to Bryant Street; southerly along Bryant Street to and including the unincorporated community of Yucaipa; westerly along Yucaipa Boulevard to Interstate Highway 10; northwesterly along Interstate Highway 10 to Redlands Boulevard; northwesterly along Redlands Boulevard to Barton Road; westerly along Barton Road to La Cadena Drive; southerly along La Cadena Drive to Iowa Avenue; southerly along Lowa Avenue to State Highway 60; southeasterly along State Highway 60 and U.S. Highway 395 to Nuevo Road; easterly along Nuevo Road via Nuevo and Lakeview to State Highway 79; southerly along State

San Francisco Territory includes all the City of San Jose and that area embraced by the following boundary: Beginning at the point the San Francisco-San Mateo County Line meets the Pacific Ocean; thence easterly along said County Line to a point one mile west of State Highway 82; southerly along an imaginary line one mile west of and paralleling State Highway 82 to 1ts intersection with Southern Pacific Company right-of-way at Arastradero Road; southeasterly along the Southern Pacific Company right-of-way to Pollard Road, including industries served by the Southern Pacific Company spur line extending approximately two miles southwest from Simla to Permanente; easterly along Pollard Road to W. Parr Avenue; easterly along W. Parr Avenue to Capri Drive; southerly along Capri Drive to Division Street; easterly along Division Street to the Southern Pacific Company right-of-way; southerly along the Southern Pacific right-of-way to the Campbell-Los Gatos City Limits; easterly along said limits and the prolongation thereof to South Bascom Avenue (formerly San Jose-Los Gatos Road); northeasterly along South Bascom Avenue to Foxworthy Avenue; easterly along Foxworthy Avenue to Almaden Road; southerly along Almaden Road to Hillsdale Avenue; easterly along Hillsdale Avenue to State Highway 82; northwesterly along State Highway 82 to Tully Road; northeasterly along Tully Road and the prolongation thereof to White Road; northwesterly along White Road to McKee Road; southwesterly along McKee Road to Capitol Avenue; northwesterly along Capitol Avenue to State Highway 238 (Oakland Road); northerly

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along State Highway 238 to Warm Springs; northerly along State Highway 238 (Mission Blvd.) via Mission San Jose and Niles to Hayward; northerly along Foothill Blvd. and MacArthur Blvd. to Seminary Avenue; easterly along Seminary Avenue to Mountain Blvd.; northerly along Mountain Blvd. to Warren Blvd. (State Highway 13); northerly along Warren Blvd. to Broadway Terrace; westerly along Broadway Terrace to College Avenue; northerly along College Avenue to Dwight Way; easterly along Dwight Way to the Berkeley-Oakland Boundary Line; northerly along said boundary line to the Campus Boundary of the University of California; westerly, northerly and easterly along the campus boundary to Euclid Avenue; northerly along Euclid Avenue to Marin Avenue; westerly along Marin Avenue to Arlington Avenue; northerly along Arlington Avenue to San Pablo Avenue (State Highway 123); northerly along San Pablo Avenue to and including the City of Richmond to Point Richmond; southerly along an imaginary line from Point Richmond to the San Francisco waterfront at the foot of Market Street; westerly along said waterfront and shoreline to the Pacific Ocean; southerly along the shoreline of the Pacific Ocean to point of beginning.
