## <u>O P I N I O N</u>

Dynamic Freight Corporation, a California corporation, (Seller) requests authority to sell and transfer and Safe Express, Inc., a California corporation, (Purchaser) requests authority to purchase and acquire a highway common carrier certificate.

The certificate was granted by Decision 81494, dated June 19, 1973, in Application 53923 and authorizes transportation of general commodities, with the usual exclusions between all points and places within the San Francisco Territory. According to the application Seller has discontinued operation and proposes to transfer the certificate to Purchaser for the sum of \$750.

Purchaser is a newly created corporation and has not engaged in operations. Its officers and stockholders are the same as those of Safe Inc., a licensed California corporation. The financial statements dated December 1980, of the latter corporation indicate a net worth of \$154,093 and gross profit of \$11,945.

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Seller has been a party to Pacific Coast Tariff Bureau, Agent, tariff publications covering the operations of the certificate to be transferred. Purchaser will adopt these tariffs.

Applicants have requested a deviation from the provisions of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure which require wide distribution of the application. Notice of the filing of the application appeared in the Commission's Daily Calendar of May 6, 1981. No protests to the application have been received.

Findings of Fact

1. The proposed transfer of the certificate would not be adverse to the public interest.

2. The requested deviation from the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure should be authorized.

3. The following order has no reasonably foreseeable impact upon the energy efficiency of highway carriers.

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## Conclusion of Law

The proposed transfer is in the public interest and should be authorized. A public hearing is not necessary.

The order which follows will provide for, in the event the transfer is completed, the revocation of the certificate presently held by Dynamic Freight Corporation, and the issuance of a certificate in appendix form to Safe Express, Inc., a California corporation.

Only the amount paid to the State for operative rights may be used in rate fixing. The State may grant any number of rights and may cancel or modify the monopoly feature of these rights at any time.

# O R D E R

IT IS ORDERED that:

1. Dynamic Freight Corporation, a California corporation, may sell and transfer the operative rights specified in the application to Safe Express, Inc., a California corporation. This authorization shall expire if not exercised by February 1, 1982, or within such additional time as the Commission may authorize.

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- 2. Purchaser shall:
  - a. File with the Transportation Division written acceptance of the certificate and a copy of the bill of sale or other transfer document within 30 days after transfer.
  - b. Amend or reissue the seller's tariffs. The tariffs shall not be effective before the date of transfer, nor before 5 days' notice is given to the Commission.
  - c. Comply with General Orders Series 100. 104. and 117. and the California Highway Patrol Safety rules.
  - d. Maintain accounting records in conformity with the Uniform System of Accounts.

3. If the transfer is completed, on the effective date of the tariffs a certificate of public convenience and necessity is granted to Safe Express, Inc., a California corporation, authorizing it to operate as a highway common carrier as defined in PU Code Section 213 between the points listed in Appendix A. 4. The certificate of public convenience and necessity granted by Decision 81494 is revoked on the effective date of the tariffs.

Appendix A

### SAFE EXPRESS INC. (a California corporation)

Safe Express, Inc., by the certificate of public convenience and necessity granted in the decision noted in the margin, is authorized to conduct operations as a highway common carrier as defined in Section 213 of the Public Utilities Code for the transportation of general commodities as following:

Between all points and places in San Francisco Territory as described in Note A.

Except that under the authority granted, carrier shall not transport any shipments of:

- 1. Used household goods, personal effects and office, store and institution furniture, fixtures and equipment not packed in salesmen's hand sample cases, suitcases, overnight or boston bags, briefcases, hat boxes, valises, traveling bags, trunks, lift vans, barrels, boxes, cartons, crates, cases, baskets, pails, kits, tubs, drums, bags (jute, cotton, burlap or gunny) or bundles (completely wrapped in jute, cotton, burlap, gunny, fibreboard, or straw matting).
- Automobiles, trucks and buses, viz.: new and used, finished or unfinished passenger automobiles (including jeeps), ambulances, hearses and taxis, freight automobiles, automobile chassis, trucks, truck chassis, truck trailers, trucks and trailers combined, buses and bus chassis.
- 3. Livestock, viz.: barrows, boars, bulls, butcher hogs, calves, cattle, cows, dairy cattle, ewes, feeder pigs, gilts, goats, heifers, hogs, kids, lambs, oxen, pigs, rams (bucks), sheep, sheep camp outfits, sows, steers, stags, swine or wethers.

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## SAFE EXPRESS INC. (a California corporation)

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- 4. Liquids, compressed gases, commodities in semiplastic form and commodities in suspension in liquids in bulk, in tank trucks, tank trailers, tank semitrailers or a combination of such highway vehicles.
- 5. Commodities when transported in bulk in dump-type trucks or trailers or in hopper-type trucks or trailers.
- 6. Commodities when transported in motor vehicles equipped for mechanical mixing in transit.
- 7. Portland or similar cements, in bulk or packages, when loaded substantially to capacity of motor vehicle.
- 8. Logs.
- 9. Articles of extraordinary value.
- 10. Trailer coaches and campers, including integral parts and contents when the contents are within the trailer coach or camper.
- 11. Commodities requiring the use of special refrigeration or temperature control in specially designed and constructed refrigerator equipment.
- 12. Explosives subject to U.S. Department of Transportation regulations governing the Transportation of hazardous materials.

NOTE A

#### SAN FRANCISCO TERRITORY

San Francisco Territory includes all the City of San Jose and that area embraced by the following boundary: Beginning at the point the San Francisco-San Mateo County Line meets the Pacific Ocean; then easterly along said County Line to a point one mile west of State Highway 82; southerly along an imaginary line one mile west of and

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paralleling State Highway 82 to its intersection with Southern Pacific Company right-of-way at Arastradero Road; southeasterly along the Southern Pacific Company right-of-way to Pollard Road, including industries served by the Southern Pacific Company spur line, extending approximately two miles southwest from Simla to Permanente; easterly along Pollard Road to W. Parr Avenue; easterly along W. Parr Avenue to Capri Drive; southerly along Capri Drive to Division Street; easterly along Division Street to the Southern Pacific Company right-of-way; southerly along the Southern Pacific Company right-of-way to the Campbell-Los Gatos City Limits; easterly along said limits and the prolongation thereof to South Bascom Avenue (formerly San Jose-Los Gatos Road); northeasterly along South Bascom Avenue to Foxworthy Avenue; easterly along Foxworthy Avenue to Almaden Road; southerly along Almaden Road to Hillsdale Avenue; easterly along Hillsdale Avenue to State Highway 82; northwesterly along State Highway 82 to Tully Road; northeasterly along Tully Road and the prolongation thereof to White Road; northwesterly along White Road to McKee Road; southwesterly along McKee Road to Capitol Avenue; northwesterly along Capitol Avenue to State Highway 238 (Oakland Road); northerly along State Highway 238 to Warm Springs; northerly along State Highway 238 (Mission Blvd.) via Mission San Jose and Niles to Hayward; northerly along Foothill Blvd. and MacArthur Blvd. to Seminary Avenue; easterly along Seminary Avenue to Mountain Blvd.; northerly along Mountain Blvd. to Warren Blvd. (State Highway 13); northerly along Warren Blvd. to Broadway Terrace; westerly along Broadway Terrace to College Avenue; northerly along College Avenue to Dwight Way; easterly along Dwight Way to the Berkeley-Oakland Boundary Line; northerly along said boundary line to the campus boundary of the University of California; westerly, northerly and easterly along the campus boundary to Euclid Avenue; northerly along Euclid Avenue to Marin Avenue; westerly along Marin Avenue to Arlington Avenue; northerly along Arlington Avenue to San Pablo Avenue (State Highway 123); northerly along San Pablo Avenue to and including the City of Richmond to Point Richmond; southerly along an imaginary line from Point Richmond to the San Francisco waterfront at the foot of Market Street; westerly along said waterfront and shoreline to the Pacific Ocean; southerly along the shoreline of the Pacific Ocean to the point of beginning.
