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Respectfully shows:

Highway common carriers and express corporations are operating as common carriers pursuant to the authority of the Commission and in accordance with tariffs filed with this Commission; which tariffs are also subject to and governed by the National Motor Freight Classification NMF 100-N and supplements thereto.

An order is requested for the adoption of Supplement 3 to the National Motor Freight Classification NNF 100-N and to make such provisions applicable to the tariffs of highway common carriers and express corporations, which participate in and are listed in its Classification under authority of power of attorney. It is further requested that such authorization be concurrent June 20, 1987 with the national effective date of on one day's notice; that all common carriers be authorized and directed to establish such changes as may be prescribed in class and commodity rates and charges in connection with the transportation of exempt commodities; that common carriers be authorized to depart from Sections 460 and 461.5 of the Public Utilities Code and appropriate long and short haul provisions of the Constitution of the State of California to the extent necessary to carry into effect such changes; that all such changes be approved and adopted for application with the various tariffs; that any related revisions in numbering, referencing or format in the various tariffs, incidental to such changes, be authorized and established; and for such other and further orders as may be deemed reasonable and proper.

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The governing classification is periodically revised to correct technical inadvertencies and omissions that have been discovered in the publication of prior supplements and in order to keep the publication responsive to the current conditions and needs of commerce in the transportation of property by highway carriers. The procedures available to shippers and carriers to initiate such revisions and to otherwise protect their interests are known to the Commission and to such parties. Such procedures provide parties with

"...fair and full opportunity for public hearings for determination of changes and revisions as required." (Decision 74310 dated June 25, 1968, and as revised and amended by Decision 87498 dated June 21, 1977). To properly reflect intended results following such processes, the National Motor Freight Traffic Association, Inc., Agent, has authorized revisions which are published in supplemental form set forth in Exhibit A. This supplement is scheduled to take effect <u>June 20, 1987</u> unless otherwise provided therein, for application to tariffs covering areas other than California. The purpose of this filing is to obtain the authority necessary to make such provisions applicable to tariffs subject to jurisdiction of the California Public Utilities Commission and to promote the national uniformity and standardization in billing and collection practices found appropriate and desirable in the Commission's Decision 74310.

Attached hereto and by this reference made a part of this filing are the following exhibits detailing such revisions:

EXHIBIT A - Copy of Supplement $\frac{3}{100-N}$ to National Motor Freight

EXHIBIT B - Summary of changes

Certain changes in rates, ratings rules, regulations or charges will result from the adoption of Supplement <u>3</u>. A summary of such changes, including an explanation of the reasons for the proposed changes, is set forth in Exhibit B.

In addition to the justification of proposals set forth herein, Applicant refers to the facts and allegations set forth in Petition 401, as though reiterated herein. Said filings set forth the broader purposes and justifications for the program of classification revisions which will be

Ladies and Gentlement

Listed below is a summary of changes being proposed in the supplement. The symbol "A" indicates a proposed new item. Following the summary list will be found an explanation of each change or addition together with the National Classification Committee's reasons for the proposed change or addition. For simplicity the following abbreviations are utilized: LTL (Less Than Truckload); TL (Truckload); HW (Minimum Weight Factor); AQ (Any Quantity); PCF (Pounds Per Cubic Foot).

Item 168910

Item 168910, applying on "Recordings, Sound, or Sound Recording Blanks: Disc-type, plastic, non-breakable, in boxes," at classes 70 LTL and 45 TL, with a minimum weight of 30,000 pounds, is being amended to provide for compact discs. As amended, item 168910 will read "Discs, plastic, nonbreakable, in boxes," with sub 1 of the item applying on those discs "With metal reflective coating, including Compact Discs (CD's)," at classes 85 LTL and 55 TL, with a minimum weight of 30,000 pounds. Sub 2 of the item will apply on those discs "Without metal coating," at the present classes of 70 LTL and 45 TL, with a minimum weight of 30,000 pounds.

Compact discs (CD's) represent a relatively new concept in sound recording where sounds are digitally encoded on the disc. In making CD's, clear, molten plastic is molded into a disc of about 4 3/4 inches in diameter. Encoded data (sounds) are impressed on one side of the disc as a fine spiral track of tiny pits. The disc is then coated with a shiny film which is usually aluminum, but can be silver or gold, and a thin layer of plastic. The entire manufacturing process is very sophisticated technologically and must take place under strict clean room conditions as the pits of a CD are smaller than most dirt particles.

When played in a CD player, a low-powered laser focuses on the pits. The light reflects off the reflective coating and an optical sensor in the player reads the pits as a string of zeros and ones (bits). A microprocessor then converts the bits into sounds. Since the only thing that touches the disc during play is a beam of light, wear and distortion are greatly minimized, giving CD's an advantage over conventional, analog records.

Information submitted by the Recording Industry Association of America, Inc. (RIAA), shows that compact discs exhibit an average density of 19.1 pounds per cubic foot. The discs are packaged for shipment in fibreboard boxes which may be unitized on pallets or skids. There is no indication of unusual stowing problems; although, to avoid crushing, heavy freight should not be stowed on top of these products. Handling characteristics are comparable to those of other similarly packaged general freight. With respect to liability, when compact discs are properly handled and stowed, they are not unusually prone to damage and are not likely to damage other freight. While there is no indication of an unusual theft problem, care should be taken to prevent theft as compact discs are a popular consumer item and are relatively easy to steal (compared to LP's) because of their compact size. Information indicates value per pound ranges from \$12.00 to \$21.00, approximately.

Conventional, analog records, which are already classified in item 168910, will be embraced by sub 2 of the amended item, at the presently applicable classes and minimum weight.
