So, we made it out of Prague (after a 7 hour drive lengthened greatly by the Polish "road" system), and are now enjoying the very tiny city of Krakow. We were smitten by its real charm and beauty the first day which is very unusual for us. It may have been because we came from such a manufactured - almost Disneyland - kinda place. Of course, it didn't hurt that the food here is really good (not the Polish food), and the pasteries look delicious.

So far we've had the best feta cheese EVER! We've already been there (Fabryka Pizzy) twice and Autumn will not allow it a third time. We've also found a hidden sushi gem and the best Polish foodie store. Don't laugh. There's actually good if not consistently better than Prague food here. But the sushi place... I asked, "is the fish local?" and then Autumn gave me a lesson in geography and I felt dumb. Luckily the chef didn't understand the inquiry. But the best part of the Sushi place was that it was a gay mecca - quite weird because up until now we've only seen older German ladies or lesbians (not sure which). The place either had straights with the male from a non-white place or gay men and us.

Krakow has 3 malls and yes, of course, we've been to all three thus far. We walk everywhere and it would seem far as it has 18 districts, but really it is tiny. It is nice and are glad that we're here enjoying feta cheese and walking through the 18 districts over and over again.

We went to Auschwitz today and not sure I can describe it in words; everyone should come and see it.
