Summary

This afternoon, media outlets continued to report on PG&E's release of its long-term project planning list, usually localizing the story with information about pipelines in the local markets. A story on KGO-TV highlighted our proactive gas transmission replacement work currently going on in San Jose. Media Relations informed area outlets about the work taking place and conducted on-scene interviews. An article in Huffington Post pointed to the dual responsibilities of public and private sectors to maintain infrastructure, while an editorial in the San Francisco Bay Guardian focuses on pipeline safety issues.

PG&E Corp.'s (PCG) utility on Monday disclosed its 100 most important potential natural-gas pipeline repair projects, as the company faced heightened scrutiny from state and local officials following a deadly pipeline blast earlier this month.

PG&E released the list in response to a request Friday by the California Public Utilities Commission, which oversees California's gas pipeline system. The segment of gas pipe in San Bruno that exploded Sept. 9, igniting a fireball that killed four people and burned dozens of homes, was not among PG&E's 100 top-priority potential pipeline projects.

Since 1927, the city of Palo Alto has been running its own gas and electric utility — and instead of worrying about pipelines blowing up, the city recently won an award for safety.

Palo Alto workers inspected every inch of every gas pipe in 2009, and the steel pipes are replaced every 37 years — well ahead of the rated lifetime of the material. Oh, and by the way: gas and electricity are way cheaper in Palo Alto.
