**DISABILITY RIGHTS ADVOCATES' RESPONSE TO TURN/CFC MOTION
AND MOTION OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO
REGARDING ADDITIONAL PROCEDURES FOLLOWING THE SAN BRUNO
PIPELINE EXPLOSION**

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February 7, 2011

I. INTRODUCTION

In accordance with Rule 11.1(e) of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, Disability Rights Advocates (DisabRA) files this response to the joint motion of The Utility Reform Network (TURN) and the Consumer Federation of California (CFC) seeking a coordinated and public investigation of the factors that led to the catastrophic gas pipeline explosion in San Bruno and other past pipeline disasters¹ and to the similar motion filed on the same day by the City and County of San Francisco (CCSF).² In their motion, TURN/CFC request that the Commission initiate a consolidated investigation, in which it would develop appropriate preventive and remedial measures to improve pipeline safety. CCSF similarly urges the Commission to commence a formal, public investigation in a coordinated Commission forum in order to meet its obligations to ensure safe and reliable gas transmission and delivery in California. DisabRA strongly supports these motions.

Shortly after the two motions were filed, Commission President Peevey indicated at a regularly scheduled Commission meeting that a consolidated docket would be opened shortly, and that the creation of such a consolidated action would be on the agenda at the next Commission meeting.³ DisabRA looks forward to the release of the agenda and the formal opening of an investigation.

II. A SINGLE, CONSOLIDATED FORUM WILL BEST SERVE THE INTERESTS OF THE PUBLIC

TURN/CFC and CCSF both acknowledge that the Commission responded promptly following the San Bruno explosion, and that it has already taken action and made information available to the public. Both also note, however, that the response has

taken place under the auspices of multiple formal proceedings as well as through informal processes. Such a dispersed response reduces the ability of those other than regular participants before the Commission to track all the action under way, and limits the opportunity for members of the public to provide input or otherwise participate. It also increases the risk that important aspects of the review will slip through the cracks, while decreasing efficiencies and forcing duplication of effort. Finally, the opaque nature of the dispersed review does not foster public confidence in either the process or the eventual outcome.

It appears that the Commission recognizes the concerns of the intervenors, as well as the similar concerns voiced by public officials and various media outlets,⁴ and intends to open a single, consolidated docket to address the issues raised by the San Bruno explosion. TURN/CFC recognized in their motion that the most appropriate forum might not be the docket in which the two pending motions were filed (the PG&E General Rate Case and associated investigation), and that the requested coordination and consolidation might be best conducted in a new proceeding. DisabRA agrees. Thus, to the extent that a new investigation is opened by the Commission at the next meeting, DisabRA would view that as an appropriate response.

III. CONCLUSION

For the reasons set forth in the TURN/CFC motion, the CCSF motion, and in the argument above, DisabRA supports the creation of a single, consolidated forum for to review of the San Bruno catastrophe and any other similar past disasters, and to develop appropriate preventive and remedial measures. A new investigation, as has been discussed at the most recent meeting of the Commission, would be an appropriate forum to achieve these ends.
