

CPUC Hosts Public Hearing on Proposed AT&T/T-Mobile Merger July 7th



As you have undoubtedly heard, AT&T has announced a deal to acquire T-Mobile for \$39 billion. If approved, the new company would have 130 million wireless subscribers, making it the largest wireless carrier in the country. • How many retail jobs will be lost? How many T-Mobile retail centers will close in diverse communities?




- AT&T has made statements that indicate it may not retain low cost plans. What happens to the low cost plans offered by T-Mobile?
