Additionally, we have met with the mayor of San Bruno and with community representatives (I believe on Tuesday, Oct. 4.)

More background is below:
Wed., Sept. 28 PM and again Thursday morning, our call centers received calls from the residents across Redacted from our hydrostatic test location, where an exposed riser was improperly secured by our contracted construction crews.

Rather than secure the pipe as required with a plastic capping, it was secured with a sack and tape. Although the entire segment of pipe had been completely vacated of gas, the wind pushed the residual gas odorant mercaptan into the neighborhood.

The contractor has since properly secured the pipe opening.
We have met with the City of San Bruno to provide an overview of what happened and are working with a pipeline expert that they hired to ensure that they are comfortable with our approach to mitigate the smell as we move forward.
