We have 63.018 MW on the waitlist.

We are changing the update on the website to include the bolded sentences: "PG&E has received contracts for review and approval that exceed the available capacity under the Electric Tariff for E-SRG. A waitlist for E-SRG was created. Until the E-SRG and E-PWF tariffs are replaced by a new tariff under Senate Bill 32, any capacity made available by contract terminations will be allocated to the waitlist. Due to the large volume of PPAs submitted for the E-SRG waitlist, PG&E is not accepting any further additions.
